“Summertime, and the livin’ is easy”

*George Gershwin – Porgy and Bess*

Ever since summer meant a break from school, most of us have looked to summer as a time when the “livin’ is easy.” Even as adults, we look forward to evenings when we can sit out on the porch, or times for family picnics – times when we don’t have to worry that our plans might be interrupted by snow.

During the summer, many of us delight in the chance to get out on the water, the chance to swim or even go boating. But if you are going to get into the water, it’s important that you know how to swim, including how to float and let the water hold you up, how to respond when someone tries to rescue you and how to help others in distress.

As much as we look forward to summer, the livin’ is not always easy. Thunderstorms are more numerous. June 1 marks the start of hurricane season in the Atlantic and 2017 taught us only too well how dangerous those storms are! Since storms can not only literally and figuratively wash out or wreck our plans, but also wreak havoc in our lives, it is important to listen to the weather reports and watch the skies. Even when we exercise caution, storms can develop so quickly that we can’t get to land, or the shelters we counted on may not be strong enough to withstand their power. This is also true in life. Storms may overtake us with little or no warning or with so much power it overwhelms us.

Wondering where all this is leading? In our June Faith Formation event we will explore the story of Noah and be assured that God will carry us through the storms of life to a new future. In addition, the theme for VBS this year is *Shipwrecked*. During that week our children will not only learn that there are storms in life, but that:

- \* When you are lost and lonely, Jesus rescues!
- \* When you worry, Jesus rescues!
- \* When you struggle, Jesus rescues!
- \* When you do wrong, Jesus rescues!
- \* When you’re powerless, Jesus rescues!

Faced with the storms in our lives, these stories and sayings may seem too simplistic, yet there is so much truth to them! Jesus does rescue us, often in unexpected ways. In fact, the church, the gathering of Jesus’ people, has often been likened to a boat and the main area where we gather is called the “nave”, from the Latin word for ship. Here we gather each week to renew our relationship with the One who saves, as well as with other members of His rescue team. Here Jesus meets us, encourages us to be buoyed up by His love and the peace and support others extend to us. Here we learn from Him how to truly support others during the storms in their lives. Together we rejoice and give thanks that through Jesus, storms do not get us off course, off God’s course. With Jesus, no matter what the season, the livin’ is made much easier.

## Did You Know?

### SERPENT

A serpent coiled around a fruit-bearing tree symbolizes humanity's first sin, when Adam and Eve, at the serpent's tempting, disobeyed God by eating fruit from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. The Genesis 3 account is often referred to as "The Fall," and though it doesn't say so, the serpent is commonly understood as Satan.



### FATHER'S DAY – MORE THAN A DAY

Father's Day was first observed in America in 1910. In 1923 the third Sunday of June was set as the official day, and in 1924 President Coolidge recommended its national observance. Today it has a fixed place in the calendar of special days in our country.



But devotion to and pride in fathers does not need to wait for official approval. As long as there have been families, love and respect for fathers has existed.

## YOU'VE GOT MAIL!

In June and July our second lessons will be from the "Second" Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Many observe that this letter does not read as smoothly as some of Paul's other writings. There seem to be spots where the transitions are rough or abrupt or where something which was mentioned earlier is picked up at a seemingly odd place. Some speculate that this Second Letter is actually what a later editor compiled from snippets of several letters or fragments of letters.

We know, in fact, that what we call the second letter was actually at least the third, because in this "second" letter Paul makes reference to a letter that he sent which we do not have. The letter lost to us is one Paul wishes he had not sent because it was so harsh.

Despite having various "trains of thought", this "second" letter contains wonderful images and important, straight forward, words for us to ponder.

One of the issues Paul is addressing is the Corinthians' challenge to his authority. They accuse him of being inconsistent and question his motives and credentials. This leads Paul to attempt to explain how and what Jesus has called him to do, while trying not to sound defensive and authoritarian. He explores what it means to exercise leadership in service to Christ, "to proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake." He claims that we are but "clay jars" holding the "treasure" of God's mercy revealed to us through Jesus. (4:5,7)

Paul proclaims that we are ambassadors for Christ, called to the ministry of reconciliation. (5:20; 5:18) As such, the wealth (literal and figurative) that we possess is to be shared with others so that all will have what they need and "the one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little." (8:15)

In our last reading from this letter (12:2-10) Paul comments on the trials he faces on a continual basis, on his daily "thorn in the flesh" from which he prayed to be delivered. He writes that every time he asked to remove it, God assured him, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." (v. 9).

As we continue to grow in faith and as ambassadors who share the treasure of God's mercy, may we, too, experience the love and power of God that passes our human understanding and may "[t]he grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with [us] all." (13:13).

## STEWARDSHIP OF OUR PHYSICAL HEALTH

*The Apostle Paul writes, “Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own?” 2 Corinthians 6:19*

To be a steward/disciple is to be aware of all the gifts God has entrusted to you, and then to care for them and use them wisely for God’s purposes. This month we focus on our bodies. God has given each of us a physical body that, like an automobile, is a complex vehicle carries us along our road of life. To live the fullest life possible, like our cars, we need to take good care of our bodies.

We in the United States have significant room for improvement. The World Health Organization ranks the United States 31<sup>st</sup> for life expectancy on a ranking of 188 nations. And we are higher in our rates of cancer, obesity, diabetes, heart disease and other chronic medical conditions than many other developed nations.

Of course, everybody gets sick sometimes, and many of us suffer from health problems that have nothing to do with how well we are taking care of ourselves. Genetics play an important role in our health, as do environment and other factors.

With so many variables over which we have *no control*, it’s important that we do our best with the variables we *can* control.

For June, dedicate yourselves to being a better steward of your body. Even if you are in generally good health now, you can always improve. Here are some ideas:

- **Get a physical.** Knowing your markers of health, your doctor can then help set priorities and make a plan.
- **Move it!** Even small amounts of exercise improve health and wellbeing.
- **Go on a diet** that will lead to better health. Learn about the nutritional value of the foods you now eat, and ask your doctor for recommendations.
- **Stop smoking.** It’s the number one preventable health risk.
- **Sleep.** Getting eight hours of shuteye does wonders for body and mind.
- **Pray and meditate.** Spiritual disciplines lower stress, which improves physical health.

God gave us wonderful bodies to carry us through our life’s journey of discipleship. The better we care for it, the more fruitful our journey will be.

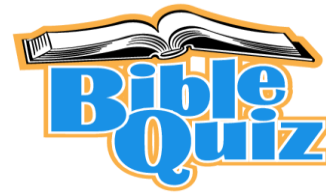
