

Dear Fellow Members and Friends of New Jerusalem,

Pentecost is coming. It will be here on May 19th. Often this day is referred to as the birthday of the Christian Church because it was on that day that the Holy Spirit showed up dramatically in wind and fire and in followers of Jesus speaking in many languages so that all around could understand what was going on and be drawn into the circle of believers.

But what is the "church?" In 1530 the reformers drew up a document called *The Augsburg Confession* to clarify and defend what Lutherans believe. This document is our foundational document as Lutherans, kind of like our constitution. In it the reformers defined the church as "the assembly of saints in which the gospel is taught purely, and the sacraments are administered rightly." (Remember, "saints" are those who have been made right with God on account of Christ, those whom the Holy Spirit has gifted with faith.) In other words, the *church* is the *community* of saints, the community where the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. And this community is both local, as in New Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church, and universal. (The word *catholic* with a small "c" means universal.) Bottom line:


I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together. All who follow Jesus all around the world, yes, we're the church together. -Avery and Marsh

So, in other words, when we profess that we believe in the Holy Spirit, we follow this with describing how the Holy Spirit works. The Spirit builds the community of believers, the community where the good news of Jesus, the gospel, is preached and the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper are administered. Bottom line, even though we often refer to the building in which the community of saints worship as the "church," the church is the community, not the building.

So what's with the verse, "we have these treasures in clay pots." Think back to how, in the second story of creation, Genesis 2, the Lord God stooped down, scooped up dust or clay, formed the human, and breathed life into its lungs. I think that is the image Paul is referring to. God has placed these treasures, the gospel and the sacraments, in "clay pots," in a gathering of humans. Therefore, we also highly value this gathering of "clay pots" that is known as New Jerusalem Evangelical (good news) Lutheran Church. Even as we work to divest ourselves of the building where we have gathered and worshipped for so many years, we highly value the community, the congregation, that continues because of the treasure it holds. While we are not sure of how we will continue to meet and function as a community of believers, the treasure is there within our midst.

This year on Pentecost we will welcome two young men into confirmed membership of our community. After two years of study, God's Spirit is leading Carson and Logan Seip to affirm the vows made for them at their baptisms, and we will celebrate! The boys have not only been studying with me and worked hard to learn the catechism and the stories of our scriptures but took part in a confirmation retreat which led them to fall in love with Bear Creek Camp. They have also participated in numerous youth activities in our area and have always been willing helpers in worship and projects around our property. Please make every effort to join us and the boys.

THIS TREASURE IN EARTHEN VESSELS

¹⁻²Since God has so generously let us in on what he is doing, we're not about to throw up our hands and walk off the job just because we run into occasional hard times. We refuse to wear masks and play games. We don't maneuver and manipulate behind the scenes. And we don't twist God's Word to suit ourselves. Rather, we keep everything we do and say out in the open, the whole truth on display, so that those who want to can see and judge for themselves in the presence of God.

³⁻⁴If our Message is obscure to anyone, it's not because we're holding back in any way. No, it's because these other people are looking or going the wrong way and refuse to give it serious attention. All they have eyes for is the fashionable god of darkness. They think he can give them what they want, and that they won't have to bother believing a Truth they can't see. They're stone-blind to the dayspring brightness of the Message that shines with Christ, who gives us the best picture of God we'll ever get. ⁵⁻⁶Remember, our Message is not about ourselves; we're proclaiming Jesus Christ, the Master. All we are is messengers, errand runners from Jesus for you. It started when God said, "Light up the darkness!" and our lives filled up with light as we saw and understood God in the face of Christ, all bright and beautiful.

⁷⁻¹²If you only look at us, you might well miss the brightness. We carry this precious Message around in the unadorned clay pots of our ordinary lives. That's to prevent anyone from confusing God's incomparable power with us. As it is, there's not much chance of that. You know for yourselves that we're not much to look at. We've been surrounded and battered by troubles, but we're not demoralized; we're not sure what to do, but we know that God knows what to do; we've been spiritually terrorized, but God hasn't left our side; we've been thrown down, but we haven't broken. What they did to Jesus, they do to us-trial and torture, mockery and murder; what Jesus did among them, he does in us-he lives! Our lives are at constant risk for Jesus' sake, which makes Jesus' life all the more evident in us. While we're going through the worst, you're getting in on the best!

¹³⁻¹⁵We're not keeping this quiet, not on your life. Just like the psalmist who wrote, "I believed it, so I said it," we say what we believe. And what we believe is that the One who raised up the Master Jesus will just as certainly raise us up with you, alive. Every detail works to your advantage and to God's glory: more and more grace, more and more people, more and more praise! ¹⁶⁻¹⁸So we're not giving up. How could we! Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without his unfolding grace. These hard times are small potatoes compared to the coming good times, the lavish celebration prepared for us. There's far more here than meets the eye. The things we see now are here today, gone tomorrow. But the things we can't see now will last forever. (2 Corinthians 4, The Message)



This just in from Seafarer's International gives us an insight into the work of this ministry that we have been supporting.

March 28, 2024

Dear Pastor Ruth,

In the wake of the heartbreaking news of the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapse in Baltimore this morning, our hearts are heavy with sorrow for the lives lost and the families left reeling from this tragic event. We are called to embody Christ's love and compassion, particularly in times of crisis.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the seafarers and their families who have been profoundly impacted by this disaster. Many of these seafarers rely on the now-disrupted transportation routes to access essential services and provisions, facing uncertainty and hardship in the aftermath of the collapse.

We are grateful to have Rev. Vitalii Guz, our dedicated port chaplain in Baltimore, and Rev. Bob Schmitt, recently retired but still volunteering, who are on the ground, offering solace to those in need. They are helping us assess the situation, and plan the most effective ways we can be of service in the days, weeks and months to come.

This morning, Vitalii writes, **"We are now just** working out what we can do for the sailors, we are collecting information and trying to find out how we can help."

Your generous donations help us extend compassion by:

- 1. Through Pastors Guz and Schmitt, offering immediate assistant to seafarers stranded or impacted by the collapse.
- 2. Providing essential supplies, including food, water, and medical aid, to those in distress.
- 3. Facilitating transportation arrangements to ensure the safe passage of seafarers despite the disruption caused by the collapse.

Your contributions will serve as a beacon of hope for those facing dark days ahead. Together, as a community united in faith, we can make a tangible difference in the lives of seafarers in need.

May God's grace and comfort surround all those impacted by this tragedy, and may our collective efforts bring Easter light in the midst of darkness. "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you." (Isaiah 43:2)

FROM MEMBERSHIP TO DISCIPLESHIP

Then he said to them all, "If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will save it." – Luke 9:23-24

We should not be surprised that Jesus' call to discipleship is challenging—our biblical counterparts also struggled to follow this life-changing, world-altering summons.

In recent months, I've been sharing my thoughts about the key "pivots" Luther Seminary is living into this year and beyond. Our third pivot is one of focus, from the idea that we simply need more members in our Christian congregations to the idea that thriving communities of faith are those that develop a culture of practices and relationships that connect people with the living God and faith to daily life.

Our inherited patterns of congregational life have often focused on membership as a measure of success. The problem is not with membership itself but rather when we assume that members know how to be disciples and that membership is a sign of vitality in the work of the Holy Spirit. In fact, we ought to assume that all Christians are struggling to be disciples, that we all experience challenges in our faith journeys, and that Christian communities are already empowered by the Holy Spirit to intentionally cultivate discipleship.

We trust in the Spirit to give us strength and wisdom as we find ourselves on this road of Christian faith. Our faith is strengthened when we receive God's promises in Word and Sacrament. We also know that Christ calls and claims followers outside of traditional contexts all the time.

....[i]n membership-based church models, we often think we alone have to find the money to keep the doors open, to maintain whatever it is we have done before. But the continuity of Christ's church isn't up to us—it's up to the Holy Spirit.

We need to tell each other this story of discipleship: That it's not about us but about Jesus. That we will lose our lives for the sake of the gospel and in losing our lives will gain everything we hope for. That the hope of the gospel is that we have a God who will not abandon us.

Our congregational life, the church doors we do or do not walk through each Sunday, are changing. But what it means to be a flawed, forgiven, faithful disciple set into community has not changed since Jesus first called Simon, James, and John.
