Dear Sisters and Brothers,

One of my favorite songs from a VBS I led years ago is “Promise Chain,” written by Jack Miffleton. It starts out:

We are the links in a promise chain, joining heaven and earth.

I picture a strong, but beautiful chain of precious metal, stunning in its mixture of colors.

As we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant/Lutheran Reformation later this month, I am mindful that Luther and the other reformers of the 1500s were links in the promise chain dating back to the first humans whom God created and pronounced “very good.” Despite their rebellion, God loved our ancestors and promised to send a savior. The leaders and prophets of Israel were links in the promise chain, reminding people of God’s will and God’s promise. Jesus was the fulfillment of the promise and those who followed him throughout the centuries helped to link *us* to Jesus. Now *we* are the links in that “promise chain” and we are privileged to work with God and others in the joining of heaven and earth.

On October 29th we will celebrate as our confirmands take for themselves the vows that their parents and sponsors made for them at baptism. We have spent over two years working together to understand, not only with our heads, but also with our hands and hearts, how much God loves us and the implications for our lives. (I say “our” because I have grown along with each of these young Christians and their parents.) We’ve not only met every other week for two hours during two school years, but also gone on retreats with other confirmands and pastors, helped plan worship at New Jerusalem, and participated in service with and to our fellow members. (The shut-ins still talk about how wonderful the cookies were.) In essence, the Confirmation Service on October 29th is a celebration of these shining links in God’s promise chain, as well as an affirmation by all present of their place in that same chain.

The date for confirmation was chosen over two years ago, knowing full well that this would be the Sunday that Christians throughout the world would celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. It was also about that time that the ELCA chose “Always Re-forming” as the theme for the anniversary. What a wonderful fit: seven young Lutherans affirming their place on the promise chain as Christians throughout the world celebrate and affirm their faith! Yes, the church is always re-forming.

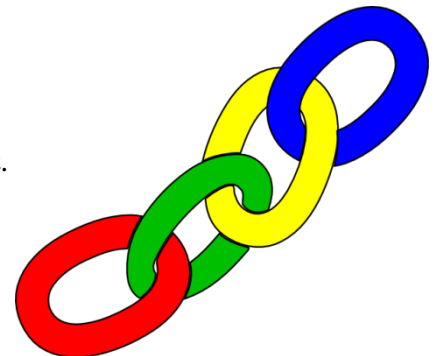
On October 15th we will celebrate the many vocations of our members, *vocation* meaning not just the way one earns a living, but ways God has called each of us to serve. As we do so, we will learn about the various ways God uses our links to join heaven and earth. We will also be better able to factor in the many gifts with which God has blessed us as this congregation continues to re-form.

Miffleton’s song ends with this joyous paraphrase of God’s invitation:

*Join the promise chain, and love will come to reign.
Span the oceans, hand in hand, join the promise chain.*

Join me in affirming your “yes” and celebrating God’s love.

YOU’VE GOT MAIL

During the end of September and the beginning of October our second lesson is from Paul’s letter to the Philippians, the first Christian church in Europe. The city was established by Philip II of Macedonia, father of Alexander the Great. It later became a Roman colony and was a key stop on an important trade route between Rome and its eastern empire. Paul founded the congregation in about 50 CE and visited it once. Paul and Silas had actually been imprisoned in Philippi but were released when there was an earthquake and the jailer had become a convert (Acts 16:16-34; Acts 20:6). Now he is writing to them from another prison, though we don’t know which city he is in. He is writing to thank them for a gift they have sent.

Despite being written from in prison, this is Paul’s happiest letter and it’s hard to not catch the joy as you read it through. His is a joy that does not come from his circumstances, but from his inner experiences of life in Jesus. The joy of life in Christ spills out into the lives of anyone who receives him. Christ is the one who shows us that God cannot be kept to oneself or hoarded. “It is this ‘spilling out’ quality of Christ’s life that accounts for the happiness of Christians, for joy is life in excess, the overflow of what cannot be contained in any one person.” (Eugene Peterson *The Message* p. 2133)

As you read through this short letter (4 chapters, 7 pages), you will find many passages we frequently hear in our readings and our hymns. I encourage you to read it through in one or a few sittings and then read it again in another translation like *The Message*.

Here’s a quick overview stringing together several of its verses:

Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say, rejoice! I find myself praying for you with a glad heart. I have never had the slightest doubt that the *God who started this great work in you would keep at it and bring it to a flourishing finish on the very day Christ Jesus appears. Meanwhile, live in such a way that you are a credit to the Message of Christ. Agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends. Think of yourselves the way Christ Jesus thought of himself, as a servant. Celebrate God all day, every day! Make it as clear as you can to all*

you meet that you're on their side. You can be sure God will take care of everything you need. So, rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say, rejoice! (phrases in italics from *The Message*. Used with permission.)

Here's how it works:

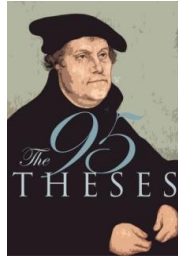
1. Pick up a Boyer's scannable key tag on the yellow table in the narthex, which can be carried on your key ring.

WOMEN OF THE REFORMATION

Although the names most often associated with the Reformation are male, women also played key roles in maintaining the integrity of the church. "Most were wives and mothers," professor Justin Holcomb writes. "Some were also authors, apologists, ex-nuns, and queens. All were faithful servants of Jesus."

Women who made notable contributions include:

- Katherine von Bora, the former nun who married former-priest Martin Luther.
- Argula von Grumbach, a Barvarian noblewoman who published letters and debated with university faculty.
- Olympia Fulvia Morata, an Italian scholar who lectured on the teachings of Luther and Calvin – and was persecuted and imprisoned.
- Jeanne d'Albret, queen of Navarre and a leader in France's Huguenot movement, who tried to peacefully resolve tensions between Catholics and Protestants.
- Marie Dentiere, an aristocrat who left an Augustinian monastery to speak in public—even on street corners!—about church reform.

**REFORMATION MILESTONE:
CELEBRATION AND REPENTANCE**

October 31, 2017, marks the 500th anniversary of the start of the Protestant Reformation, when Martin Luther posted his “95 Theses” on a church door in Germany. This wasn’t an unusual act at the time; Luther was simply welcoming scholarly debate. But his ideas opposing certain teachings and practices of the Roman Catholic Church led to a monumental shift in Christianity.



Along with other reformers, Luther taught that Scripture is the supreme authority for the believer; that salvation comes by grace alone, through faith alone; and that baptism gives all full access to God in Christ (“the priesthood of all believers”), so there’s no need for an intermediary such as a pope, priest or saint.

Initially, the reformers intended not to leave the Catholic Church but to reform it. But those who protested church practices became known as Protestants, and eventually, multiple denominations arose—Lutheranism, Presbyterianism, Anglicanism and others—and did, in fact, separate from the Roman tradition.

Sadly, woven amid the good intentions to rightly teach and live the faith were sins on all sides: Luther hurled insults “with the best of them”; the pope excommunicated him and had other reformers executed; the beliefs and faith of theological

opponents were regularly disparaged. As Heinz Josef Algermissen, a present-day Roman Catholic bishop in German, states: “In commemorating the Reformation, we cannot just see it as a jubilee, but should also admit our guilt for past errors and repent on both sides for the past 500 years.”

(as of August 8, 2017)**

Donated items most helpful right now:

Coffee, ketchup, mayonnaise or miracle whip, sugar, snacks, and laundry detergent.

The pantry is currently in need of the following items:

Canned Fruits: sliced peaches, mandarin oranges, pears, fruit cups, etc.

Canned Items: especially those with meat, such as beef stew, chili, chicken breast, chicken a la king, tuna, ham, Spam, spaghetti, ravioli, lasagna, etc.

Potatoes: instant mashed or scalloped, or other potato products

Soups: especially Progresso brand

Condiments: mayonnaise or miracle whip, brown mustard, ketchup, salad dressing, pickles

Coffee: regular, decaf and instant, tea

Fruit Juice: grape, cranberry, apple

Extras: jelly, peanut butter, marshmallow fluff

DISASTER RESPONSE

Will suffering and disasters never end? The storms and earthquakes of August and September have certainly brought extreme damage to our western hemisphere. Hurricane Harvey was one of the most catastrophic storms to hit the U.S. in a decade, and Hurricane Irma was the longest-lasting powerful hurricane ever recorded in the world. Then came the earthquakes in Mexico and Hurricane Maria in the Caribbean. As we watch the photos, our hearts cry out, "How can we help?"

Psalm 46 proclaims: "God is our refuge and our strength. A very present help in trouble." One of the ways God is a very present help in trouble is through the ways the people of God reach out to help others who are in need.

The ELCA was mobilized on the ground in the areas of impact even before the storms hit. Lutheran Disaster Response, through its network of local affiliates and partner organizations, is responding to these storms and will be there throughout the long-term recovery. Lutheran World Relief is busy partnering with other aid organizations to get out quilts and hygiene kits. All of this can happen quickly because people have been filling the warehouses with supplies over the past months. Now it is imperative that we gather what is needed so it can continue to get out and then be stockpiled for future events.

What can we do? 1) Pray for all survivors and for responders. 2) Help to contribute what is requested

to reputable organizations. (Money given to reputable organizations is the most helpful at this stage.) 3) Help spread the word to others on how they, too, can help. 4) Continue in our efforts even after the stories are no longer considered "news." It will take years and years to rebuild. Once the media leave, people often feel forgotten and that only adds to their despair.

Here are ways we at New Jerusalem have been proactive and are continuing to respond:

- 1) We've been saving the 5 gallon buckets from the syrup used in baking shoofly pies. These are needed to hold clean-up supplies. At the end of this article you will find a list of supplies that are needed for filling the buckets. They can be brought to the church and put in the coat closet area.
- 2) Earlier this year a few of us started assembling quilts to be distributed by Lutheran World Relief. Now we need more hands to help as well as material that can be used for filler such as thin blankets and bedsheets that can be used as backs for the quilts. Some work, such as sewing pieces together to make tops or knotting the layers together, can be done at home. We also hope to have an assembly "party" in the not too distant future. Please contact Sue Schlenker, Betty Eshbach, or Pastor Ruth if you are curious or interested.
- 3) We continue to encourage financial donations to Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR), since **100%** of all funds go directly to those in need and LDR has an excellent reputation for leadership as well as working with other partners.
- 4) Anyone with investments or insurance through Thrivent could help us get grants for supplies for the quilts or for purchasing some of the needed cleaning supplies.
- 5) We will continue to pray for all involved in these disasters while not forgetting those who have other needs.

SUPPLIES NEEDED FOR EMERGENCY CLEANUP BUCKETS:

- Four **scouring pads** – no stainless steel, Brillo pads or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in)
- Seven **sponges**, including one large (no cellulose sponges due to mold issues)
- One **scrub brush**
- Eighteen **reusable cleaning towels** (e.g. Easy

Wipes)

- One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of **liquid laundry detergent**
- One 16-28 oz. bottle of **liquid disinfectant dish soap**
- One 12-16 oz. bottle of **household cleaner** that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- One package of 48-50 **clothespins**
- **Clothesline**, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Five **dust masks**
- Two pairs of non-surgical **latex gloves**
- One pair **work gloves**, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon **trash bags** on a roll and removed from carton
- One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol **insect repellent**

All cleaning items must be new—all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened.


What you need:
