

LADDER

A ladder is sometimes pictured with a sponge

at the end of a long stick, reminiscent of the soldier offering Jesus vinegar to drink on the cross (Matthew 27:48). Thus, a ladder may symbolize Christ's Passion. In the Old Testament, Jacob dreamed of angels ascending and descending a ladder (or staircase, depending on the Bible version) set up between earth and heaven (Genesis 28:12). Both accounts show that through Jesus, our Savior, we—like the angels—have ready access to God, now and for eternity!


Our own dark days help us to

AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY RELAY FOR LIFE -KUTZTOWN UNIVERSITY May 29 and 30, 2015

Time to relay is coming fast. What is RELAY? Relay for Life brings together more than 3.5 million people to celebrate the lives of those who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and empower individuals and communities to fight back against this disease and to raise much needed funds for awareness and research.

We again have the following to raise money for the American Cancer Society: PURPLE SIGNS—\$50.00 – Signs "Decorate the Town Purple" (Kutztown). The signs can be purchased: in MEMORY, to remember a loved one who lost the battle; SURVIVOR, to honor anyone diagnosed with cancer; SPONSOR, anyone supporting and joining the fight against cancer. The signs are displayed in Kutztown for 2 weeks prior to May 29 and 30, and taken down during the week after relay.

LUMINARIES—\$10.00 – When the sun goes down on Friday evening of the relay – luminaries light the way under the stars as a moment of silence falls during a moving ceremony of remembrance. Luminaries are glowing bags that appear to be simply paper sacks filled with a weight and candles, but EVERY BAG REPRESENTS A LIFE THAT BATTLED CANCER. These can also be purchased to honor someone.

Our team will be holding a raffle at our Relay campsite during relay. Anyone wishing to donate something for the raffle, sign the sheet in the Narthex by April 5, or let Cheryl Wiltrout know by April 5. You don't need to have the prize in by that date, but Cheryl needs to know what will be on the raffle in order to print the tickets.

Four Lessons of Good Friday

The Rev. James Martin, S.J., author of *Jesus: A Pilgrimage* (HarperOne), writes that Jesus' suffering and death almost 2,000 years ago are very relevant to our 21st-century lives. He says Good Friday teaches us that:

- 1. physical and emotional suffering are part of life;
- suffering isn't always the result of [one's own] sin;
- 3. Jesus was fully human and thus understands our humanity; and
- 4. suffering isn't the last word.

"The message of Good Friday is incomplete without Easter," Martin writes. "The story of

the Passion is not simply of a man being brutally tortured, nailed to a cross and executed by the Romans. It's the story of a man who turns himself fully over to the Father's will, trusts that something



new will come out of this offering and receives the astonishing gift of new life."

Passover

On the last night before his crucifixion, Jesus shared what was called a Passover meal with his disciples. The origin of Passover is recorded in Exodus, Chapters 11-13.

It is the story of God's passing over the homes of the Jews enslaved in Egypt when death came to Egyptian homes. The night the "Passover" was to occur, the Jews were instructed to eat roasted lamb and unleavened bread. That was part of the menu Jews ate, and still eat today, on the night of Passover.

Passover is also related in part to the Jews' escape from Egypt as they passed through the Red Sea.

The lamb served at the Passover meal came to be called the "Paschal Lamb." St. Paul picked up on that with these words to the church at Corinth: "Our paschal lamb,



Christ, has been sacrificed" (1 Corinthians 5:7, NRSV). Peter also wrote: "You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways...with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish (1 Peter 1:18-19, NRSV).

Christ became the perfect sacrifice so that animals no longer needed to be sacrificed to bring about reconciliation with God. (See Hebrews, Chapter 10.)


Create a simple yet powerful Easter display.

What you need:

- · 3 wood blocks (small,
- medium, large) Acrylic paint (three pastel colors and white)
- Paintbrush
- Water
- Paper towels
- · Letter stencils and tape (optional)

What you do:

- 1. Paint each block of wood a different pastel color. (You can paint the whole block or just one side.)
- 2. When paint is dry, use white paint to write (or stencil) "He" on the smallest block, "is" on the medium block and "risen!" on the large block.
- 3. When blocks are dry, stack them from largest to smallest to proclaim "He is risen!"

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Help Bring Camp Noah to Children in Maryland

Join Pastor Ruth in setting up two Camp Noah ministries in Crisfield and Princess Anne, Maryland, July 25-31. Volunteers, fleece blankets, Kids Kits and funds are needed to bring this specially designed day camp program to at least 85 children who were impacted when Hurricane Sandy devastated the area. People who volunteer with Camp Noah report feeling privileged to see God's

Spirit actively changing lives and feeling that they have received at least as much as those they served among. To learn more and to help in any way, see the bulletin board or speak to Pastor Ruth.

Who, What, Where, etc.

Camp Noah is specifically designed for children in first through 6th grade. These camps provide a safe, fun atmosphere for children to tell their stories, grieve their losses, build resiliency skills and find hope for the future. The curriculum taps into and supplements the unique ways children process and heal from trauma. As a result young survivors feel less isolated, express and accept their many difficult feelings, develop new friends, identify support systems, relax and enjoy themselves. Camp Noah can provide children and families with a foundation from which they can move forward in defining and accepting what will become their "new normal".

A total of 50 volunteers are needed to staff the two camps. These volunteers can include up to 10 mature 16-18 year olds. Much like for a VBS, volunteer teams bring the skills and energy needed to provide fun, compassion, attentive listening and support for children and families who have been through the trauma of a disaster and the difficulties of recovery. Team members need to possess the heart, skills, and maturity to effectively work with children. Once assigned to a team, members are trained and then work together to divide up the responsibilities and prepare for the camp. Since children are vulnerable and they are to be not only respected but also protected, all staff and volunteers working with Camp Noah must complete an individual application process, have positive references and pass a child abuse clearance process. Anticipated registration fee is \$125, with assistance available for those who cannot afford that.

Team members will travel to Crisfield on Saturday, July 25. On Sunday they will worship in local congregations and then set up the sites where the camps will be held. Housing and most meals will be provided for the volunteers. Funds are available to assist with transportation.

More info about Camp Noah

The Camp Noah program was developed and is administered by Lutheran Social Service, Minnesota (LSS Minnesota). Since 2006 Lutheran Congregational Services (LCS) has been partnering with LSS Minnesota to provide teams of volunteers and funds to deliver the program where needed across the nation. LCS teams have traveled outside eastern Pennsylvania 12 times. In 2011 and 2012 LCS hosted and staffed camps in its home territory in response to the gas explosion in Allentown and severe flooding in Bradford County.

The camp is basically free to all children. The children who attend the camp must have been affected by a disaster or trauma and have completed kindergarten but not yet entered into 7th grade. Each camp is limited to 50 children each—with children participating in small groups of 6-8 for discussion and craft activity times.

The daily schedule for children (Monday through Friday, 8:30-3) includes worship, Bible study/disaster recovery support, singing, crafts, camp games and fun activities done in small groups as well as breakfast, snacks and lunch. The camp experience ends on Friday afternoon with a closing celebration, after which the national team cleans up,

Fleece Blankets and Kids Kits

A tied fleece blanket is given to each child participating in a Camp Noah. These colorful blankets do much more than warm bodies. Children are deeply touched by the thought that someone cared enough to make them a pretty cover. It is just one more expression of how God's love comes to them through others. Children often reach for their blankets during story time or when they are feeling uneasy or sad. Each camper is also given a Kids Kit, which contains the pencils, crayons, water paints, etc. needed to complete the projects.

To make a fleece blanket, 1) take two 72 inch pieces of fleece in colors/patterns which are gender neutral and appropriate for the older end of childhood (Campers range from 6-13). Please stay away from specifically themed prints such as sports, Disney, hunting, etc.) 2) Lay one on top of the other on a flat surface, making sure that the correct side if face outward. 3) Cut fringe approximated 1 inch wide, 4-5 inches long around the entire rectangle. Make sure you cut the two pieces simultaneously so the fringe strips are lined up. (You will need to remove a square of fabric at each corner). 5) Match up the two strips (one from each piece of fleece) and double tie them. 6) Repeat around the whole blanket until all of the fabric strips are tied.

To assemble a Kids Kit:

1) purchase:

- (1) 8-count broad line Crayola brand washable markers (classic colors)*
- (1) 8-count washable Crayola brand watercolor paints with brush.*
- (1) glue stick
- (1) 24 count box of Crayola brand crayons*
- (1) kids-sized scissors
- (1) black pen
- (1) pencil
- (1) pencil sharpener
- (1) 5 ounce container of Play-Doh (any color)
- 2) place in a gallon size zip lock bag and it's a Kids Kit

Funds are needed to offset the costs of training, transportation and supplies needed at the camps.
