

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As I write this, thousands in California are fleeing for their lives, knowing that their houses and community structures are being destroyed by fire and there will be no such thing as returning to life as they knew it. As I write this, a caravan of migrants is walking toward the southern border of the United States, thousands of people fleeing violence, abuse, and poverty, hoping to find security and a chance to pursue a better life for themselves and their children. In the same way thousands of people are on the move all over the world. Truth be told, many of our ancestors came to this country for the same reasons. My paternal great grandfather came because he could not make a living in his village in Wissek, Germany, which is now a part of Poland. My maternal grandfather came from northern Germany to escape conscription into the Kaiser's army.

People are always on the move, often not by their own choice or under the best of situations.

"And Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. – Luke 2:4

God's people are on the move. In fact, they are always on the move. Joseph, we are told, had to take Mary, who was "great with child", to Bethlehem, a journey of about 100 miles, all on foot. According to Luke, they and thousands of others were on the move because Emperor Caesar Augustus, wanted to take a census. What did representatives of the dominant culture, the Roman soldiers, think about the many ragtag groups that slogged toward the towns of their birth? What disparaging remarks did they make? Did anyone suspect that God was on the move with these people?

After the census, after Mary "had been delivered", the holy family was on the move again because "an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." (Matthew 2:13) This time the trip was over 300 miles, done in stealth, not with a caravan, for they hoped to slip across the border unnoticed. There was little time to prepare for this journey and we know of no one who went along to support or encourage the little family.

God's people are always on the move. We could also say, people literally on the move always include God's people, for God "so loved [and loves] "the *[whole]* world."

Yes, God's people are always on the move, journeying from some place to a different place, from what we have known into the unknown, always yearning for a safe-place, a life-giving place, a place where we can make our home. Sometimes we have a choice, a new opportunity.

Even then the journey can be a bit frightening. Often we have no choice. Sometimes the journey is a literal one: moving from one residence to another to attend college, take a new job, or downsize because we are at a different stage of life. Sometimes the journey is a physical one: from health to less health, with little hope of full recovery of what we once were. Sometimes the journey is a spiritual one: a faith that had been comfortable and comforting, no longer seems to fit because we have grown up or are facing new challenges. Sometimes the journey is a communal or congregational one, where many face an uncertain future. Sometimes all of these journeys are taking place at the same time.

As we become aware of others who are "on the move" and as we, ourselves, experience the journeys of life, may we grow in compassion for our fellow travelers, share our resources as well, as we are ready, our reasons for traveling, and graciously receive the support of others. As we travel may we learn that a house is not the same as home.

Come and journey with us this Advent and Christmas. Discover with us that God not only sends us companions, angels and stars to guide us every day, but walks alongside us and knows the resting places as well as the way to find our true refuge, our true home. Be reassured that with God's help we will not only be secure as we travel, but also arrive in a safe place and experience a life that, while different from what we have known, is so much better.

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. – ELW p. 317

everything. Big—that is, great—things can come in small packages. And thanks to the tiny baby who grew up to share immeasurably huge love with the world, God can do great things through you, too!



THE PERFECT GIFT

Antoine de Saint-Exupéry said, "Love does not consist in gazing at each other but in looking outward together in the same direction." At Christmas we celebrate God coming to earth to look outward with us in the same direction, from our perspective and experience.

WINTER GIFT

"God ... does great things beyond our knowing. He says to the snow, "Fall to the earth"; likewise to his heavy, drenching rain. He shuts up all humankind indoors, so that all people may know his work" (Job 37:507, NABRE).

Snow, ice and cold can make winter a hassle. "Snow days" due to a blizzard may thrill students but usually inconvenience parents. But now and then, winter blankets the earth so heavily that it seems to quiet everything. We're granted permission to hunker down at home, snuggle close with family or pets, enjoy a book or movie, make cocoa or cookies, and rest. STEWARDSHIP FOR ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS

Many of us cherish everything about the Christmas season—except those incessant advertisements telling us to buy this and by that. We ask, "Where's Jesus in all this commercialism?"

This is the right question. Though it asks us to examine every aspect of our lives, stewardship also challenges us to question the role money plays in our personal lives and our culture.

Christmas presents are wonderful expressions of love that makes both giver and recipient feel good. At the same time, we want to be wary of advertising's lure to make us overspend, or to think that the cost of our gift is proportionate to our love.

Most of all, we need to be sure that the main point of our Christmas is not the gifts *we give*, but the gift *we receive* from God – Jesus. Here are some ideas:

- Challenge yourself to spend less for presents this year. Set a budget and stick to it.
- Attend worship regularly in Advent and Christmas.
- Give some handmade presents: A scarf or hat, a photo album, a batch of fudge, a card, a poem.
- Prayerfully read Advent daily devotions (Richard Rohr's *Preparing for Christmas* is amazing!).
- Give your time: a concert together, a shared meal, a day at a museum, a walk in the woods
- Use an Advent calendar to help you remember all that God has given you.
- Give service: wash a loved one's car, help clean the garage, paint a room, babysit for an evening.
- Play Christmas music that has religious themes (More "Silent Night," less "Frosty the Snowman.")
- Instead of buying a present, make a donation to a charitable organization in honor of your loved one (or check out ELCA Good Gifts!).
- Make a generous year-end contribution to your congregation.

Our thoughtful practices for Advent and Christmas not only make for good stewardship of our time, talents, relationships and money, they also help us to draw near to Our Lord and experience God's greatest gift to us.



Grace, Reading Back to School Giveaway



The lazy days of summer maybe the norm for some people, but not for the congregation and supporters of Grace, Reading's Back to School Event. For the past four years Grace has hosted this event at their location on the southern side of Reading.

This community project started when four congregation volunteers agreed to assist on a project suggested by Rita Wilk at church council. Rita's dream was to hold an event open to all community members, where needed school supplies and backpacks could be given out to students. Donations were obtained from Grace members along with other churches within the West Berks Mission District. Reaching the targeted recipients was simplified by piggybacking on the resources established by our Growing with Grace Tutoring program. This tutoring program serves two elementary schools located within a few blocks of the church.

In its infancy, this one-day event reached about 120 students with new and used backpacks / bags filled with school supplies. A limited amount of new underwear was given out as well.

To make a greater impact, additional funds were needed to expand the number of backpacks and supplies offered. Over the last three years, grants have been written and granted from Thrivent, Walmart, and the NEPA Synod (your Mission Support dollars at work).
