We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

With the beginning of Advent we enter a new church year. Our lessons focus on pondering on and preparing for the continuous coming of God into our midst. One of our Advent hymns asks,

O Lord, how shall I meet you, how welcome you aright? (ELW 241)

This church year most of our gospel lessons will be from Matthew. In the first, Matthew 24:36-44, we hear Jesus urge us to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly because he will come unannounced. In chapter 25 Jesus says that when he comes, he will divide people into two groups: those who have seen him and reached out to him in love and service and those who did not. Both groups will ask, "But *when* did we see you?" Jesus will then explain that whenever they encountered those considered the "least," such as strangers, the hungry, the sick, the naked, those in prison, and all those whom we usually don't "see," it was actually him. In other words, Jesus was everywhere – in disguise.

"I was hungry and you gave me food,... a stranger and you welcomed me,...sick and you took care of me,...in prison and you visited me." Mt. 25:31-40

God comes to us unannounced and in disguise. God certainly came in an unusual disguise when Mary laid the baby Jesus in a manger. It is also hard to recognize God in the man crucified as a criminal. In Matthew 25 Jesus tells us he also comes to us disguised in the other, especially in the other who is outside the circle of folks to whom we normally relate. Jesus comes to us in those "at the far boundaries of our care and concern," who are "on the periphery of our lives." (Richard Beck)

In his book, *Stranger God*, Richard Beck says, "People are strange. . .and that makes it hard for us to welcome the God who comes to us in strangers, who comes to us in disguise. Since it is hard to welcome the stranger, Beck writes about *hospitality*, the kindly and generous reception of guests. He goes on to point out, "when we listen to stories of hospitality in the Bible, we often get the characters reversed. Often we see that when we offer hospitality we are being *like* Jesus, and no doubt we are. However, we don't show hospitality in order to be *like* Jesus. We show hospitality to *welcome* Jesus.

Strange, and stranger come from estrange, means foreign, alien, unusual, and unfamiliar. We humans react with caution when we encounter something that is unusual and unfamiliar, especially if it is another person. That reaction is meant to keep us safe. So, when God comes to us in a stranger, God takes us out of our comfort zone and we often feel awkward and anxious. Despite this awkwardness and anxiety, Jesus bids us to expand our circle of caring.

So, how do we become more hospitable to those outside our normal circles? We can do so by first making it a *habit* to *deliberately see* those whom we wouldn't ordinarily be aware of, like people in the check-out lines, clerks at the stores, "people on the outside edges of our lives" and, second, by *responding in brotherly love*. Just saying "Hello. How are you?" is a sign of hospitality and opens the door to a relationship. All the collections we take at church for outside groups are other ways to expand our awareness of and service to Jesus who comes to us in the other.

In this season of Advent, let us ask "Who are the people at far boundaries of my care and concern, the people I don't normally "see" or think about? Let us ask God's Spirit to help us see them and respond in friendliness and brotherly love, to help us see and respond to Jesus.

Help us to search the shadows for your children, God of Advent, so we may take them by the hand, bring them into the light of hope and grace, honor them for their gifts and recognize them for who they are: your beloved children. Amen. – Thom M. Shuman, Christmas Eve in the Diner

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

The following items were discussed and decisions made at our council meetings on November 11:

- The Gifts Policy document was approved and will be added to the continuing resolutions of our constitution. This policy guides the congregation on when and how to accept gifts that are offered and how to retire tangible gifts that are no longer of use to the congregation's mission.
- Approval was given to install a new doorbell system which will include three locations for the chimes: the office, the fellowship area and the basement. This will increase our safety when only a few people are in the building.
- The \$910 received from our volunteer involvement at the Oley Fair will be used to repay what was spent to repaye the parking lot.
- The annual meeting was scheduled to be February 9th with February 16th as the snow date.
- The \$240, representing 5% of our income from fundraisers, will be split evenly between the Salvation Army, Lyons Fire Company, Brandywine Food Pantry and the Topton Legion Honor Guard.

Did You Know?

HOLLY

Holly was first used by pagans to decorate for the festival of Saturnalia. When Christians began celebrating Christmas in honor of Christ, they adapted that decorating practice to reflect Jesus' life and death. Holly's pointed leaves symbolize the crown of thorns and its red berries symbolize Christ's

blood shed on the cross. Because holly thrives and its berries retain their brilliance even in harsh winter conditions, non-Christians saw it as a symbol of eternity—which is fitting for Christians as well.



THE PROMISE OF THE FUTURE

A nursing home resident who longed for fresh Georgia peaches discovered a pit overlooked in his serving of canned fruit. In an old coffee can, he planted the stone, which sprouted! The man gave the small tree to friends to plant. Years later, the peaches were so abundant the neighbors had to give some away.

Lila Docken Bauman recounts this story for the *Christian Century*, saying the man who took that

gamble "did not live to see [it] grow into the tree that ultimately produced this harvest. But when he looked at that pit years ago he saw the promise of fresh fruit. ... 'Who despises the day of small things?" asks the prophet Zechariah. It's in



those small things that the promise of the future rests.

Just so, some 2,000 years ago, in a small baby born in a tiny town – both seemingly inconsequential – rested "the promise of the future" – the salvation of the whole world.

"O LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM"

In 1865, a young American preacher named Phillips Brooks spent time in an around the fields of Bethlehem. On Christmas Eve, he attended worship in the Church of the Nativity, located on the site where tradition says Jesus was born.

Brooks was so spiritually touched by the experience that he later wrote a hymn for children to sing on Christmas Eve in his Philadelphia church. Lewis Redner, the church organist and Sunday school superintendent, composed the music for the beloved hymn, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Today it appears in most denominational hymnals. Brooks, a giant of a man physically (6'6" tall), was known throughout America as an eloquent and dominant force in the pulpit.

There is a large statue of the gifted man of God in front of Boston's famous Trinity Church, where Brooks last served. His death in 1893 was a major event in Boston. Upon learning of his passing, a 5-year old girl exclaimed, "Oh, Mama, how happy the angels will be."



DECEMBER 2019 ACTIVITIES

Light the Way

Make some Christmas candles to remember Jesus, the Light of the world.



What you need:

- Unlined white notecards
- Hot glue (and adult help)
- Yellow tissue paper
- Mini muffin liners
- Clothespins

What you do:

- 1. Roll a notecard from side to side into a "candle" tube. Secure with glue.
- 2. Insert a piece of tissue paper "flame" in one end.
- 3. Glue the other end to a muffin liner. Then glue the liner to a clothespin.

We Love...because God first loves us. We Love...others because each person is a child of God. We Love...by expanding our understanding of others and allowing people to be truly who God made them to be. We Love...because God is love.

These were just a few of the takeaways from We Love... 2019, a day of learning to help congregations be more opening and welcoming to LGBTQIA+ individuals and their families. For many participants this was uncharted territory, as they are learning what all those letters actually do mean (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual/Aromantic plus many more).



For others, there was still plenty to learn as we explored the

intersection between sexuality/gender identity and faith and discussed how the church can be a place where people do not feel they have to hide their sexuality or gender identity in order to feel the love of God and others.



The keynote speaker was Jamie Bruesehoff, a writer and advocate in New Jersey. She is married to an ELCA pastor and is the mother of three children, the oldest of whom is transgender. Workshops included safety basics, welcoming language in worship, what scripture has to say about homosexuality, bisexuality visibility, and parents sharing stories of when their children came out and how the church was both helpful and hurtful.

In the blink of an eye, the Lord increased our offerings to total \$6,000. What a gift!"
