

Oh, you better watch out, you better not cry, you better not pout, I'm telling you why, is coming to town.

Dear Fellow Believers,

If the secular world can use our sacred carols to try to sell stuff, we can use its songs to talk about faith. So here goes:

You'd better watch out! This is a perfect Advent theme. We believe that God is not only coming in God's fullness to set everything in right relationship, the way God originally designed it, but we also firmly believe that God is already actively here, thought it isn't always obvious to the casual observer. So, it's our job to be on the lookout, to watch out and call attention to the ways God is already active in our world.

You'd better not cry. Two thoughts here: 1) It's perfectly all right to cry over the state of the world around us, to cry over the misuse and abuse of creation, to cry over injustices, to cry whenever we see fellow human beings suffering, to cry when we ourselves are threatened or hurting. In fact, it is our duty to cry out and protest when we witness that life is not the way God intended it. But at the same time, 2) knowing that God is present and is coming in God's fullness, knowing that Christmas is the celebration of God taking on our human form, then, why would we cry, unless it is out of thanksgiving and joy?

You'd better not pout. Agreed, if what we mean is we'd better not act like spoiled brats, bent out of shape when we don't get our way, when we don't have as much of what we *want*, but we still have what we need. We'd better not pout when others get more of what they need.

Why? Why watch out? Why think about crying? Why not pout? Because this is the season when we celebrate that **Jesus Christ is coming to town.** In fact, as we said before, He's already here, among us. The One whom God promised arrived when the time was just right and promised to be with us always.

The song goes on: **He sees you when you're sleeping.** Yes. **He knows when you're awake.** Yes. **He knows if you've been bad or good.** Yes. **So be good for goodness sake.** Well, let's think about this one. Unlike the point of this song, to encourage children to be good so Santa will bring them lots of toys, we do not do good in order to get things from God. We ask for God's help to do good, to live God's way, because God's already done so much for us. We ask for God's help to do good because it's the right way to live, the God pleasing way to live. We know that on our own we are not good to earn God's favor, though we may do good once in a while. But we cling to God's declaration in baptism that because of Jesus Christ, God will and does forgive us. When God looks at us, God sees the goodness of Jesus instead of the many ways we go wrong.

In this season of preparation for the coming of Christ and celebration of the Father's love, join with me in looking for the ways God is active and present in our world. Join with me in humbly and joyfully coming together to worship and adore the true Lord of all. And join with me in looking for new and varied ways to speak *God's* truth, even by borrowing messages and ways our secular and commercial world uses to try to get something from us.

May God's Spirit open our eyes and hearts to creative and effective ways to communicate God's love to a world that desperately longs for love and peace.

Blessings and joy this Advent and Christmas season!

HELPING HARVEST/TOPTON MOBILE MARKET - Tuesday, December 13, 2022 The Helping Harvest food distribution will take place on Tuesday, December 13, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 **p.m.** at the Brandywine Heights Intermediate/Middle School.

Since July 1, 2022 (4 distributions), the Topton Mobile Market has served 190 unique families. In



those four months, they have served a total 411 households with 1,056 people (229 children, 402 adults, and 425 seniors) and distributed 19,192 pounds of food. Since the beginning of 2022,

(10 distributions), we have served a total of 973 households with 2,463 people (523 children, 980 adults, and 960 seniors) and distributed of total of 48,665 pounds of food. The highest distribution was October 2022 with 119 households and the lowest was 71 households in April 2022.

They use the 12-steps of recovery and biblical comparisons as well as the Celebrate Recovery 8 Principles based on the Beatitudes. This is a safe place to come together to gain freedom and find healing from those struggles, hurts, habits, and hang-ups. Confidentiality and anonymity are taken very seriously.

There are no dues or fees to join, but they do accept a love offering. No registration is necessary. All you have to do is show up!

CLEAN-UP KITS FOR SURVIVORS OF DISASTER



In this season we think about Mary and Joseph needing a place to stay. Now imagine watching your residence flood to the second floor or be damaged by wind. Think about how thankful you would be if

someone showed up with supplies to help you clean up the mess.

Places which stockpile clean-up kits are critically low, if not empty. Join us in assembling these kits. A Thrivent grant will help us add to our donations.

The following is a list of items for each clean-up kit. Please get them to church by **January 22nd.**

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (if reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Advertisement on the outside acceptable).
- One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener.
- Five scouring pads (no stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging).
- Seven sponges, including one large.
- One scrub brush (with or without handle).
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose drycleaning towels (no terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. Remove from packaging).
- One 32-64 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent.
- One 16-34 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap.
- One 12-40 oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles).
- One package of 36-50 clothespins.
- One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line).
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; no surgical masks).
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-surgical, durable for multiple-use. Remove from packaging).
- One pair of work gloves (cotton with leather palm or all leather).
- 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (remove from packaging).
- One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (pump spay bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes also acceptable).

HELP TURN PLASTIC BAGS INTO SLEEPING MATS FOR THE HOMELESS

St. Peter's UCC has started collecting plastic bags like the ones you receive from the store and volunteers weave them into sleeping mats for the homeless. HOMELESS AWARENESS BLANKET REMEMBRANCE EVENT

The ELCA Witness in Society office is partnering with several synods, advocates and foundation partners to organize a Homeless Remembrance Blanket awareness event in Washington D.C. on December 21, the longest night of the year. The event, which includes invited bishops, members of Congress, Administration officials, dignitaries and nonprofit advocacy organizations, will be gathering hundreds of blankets from across the country in a symbolic art installation on the U.S. Capitol lawn near the Christmas tree. The event will bring greater attention to those of us struggling with homelessness on the coldest nights of the year. Interested advocates are welcome to participate in-person at the U.S. Capitol or join the full-day event virtually. Blankets will be arriving from each state in the country, with letters and invitations to lawmakers to visit an agency or ministry with those experiencing homelessness in their district. Please consider donating a blanket or joining us in the nation's capital on December 21 for the event, or on January 4, to deliver blankets and letters to members of Congress. 

HAVE YOURSELF A HOLY LITTLE **CHRISTMAS**

The "Christmas season" seems to begin earlier every year. Some stores had Christmas stuff on the shelves weeks before Halloween. What madness! We go dashing through the stores to the beat of *Jingle Bells*; and we go "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" until we crash from exhaustion.

Revelry and gift-giving are fine and fun, but if we're not careful they can snowball out of control.

Stewarding a Holy and meaningful Christmas means balancing the commercial with the spiritual. Here are some tips:

Observe Advent: The four weeks *before* Christmas Day comprise the Advent Season, a time to prepare for Christmas through prayer, song, worship, and spiritual disciplines. Lean into the spirit of Advent. Advent devotionals can help (I recommend Richard Rohr's Preparing for Christmas).

Observe the Christmas season: The church calendar lists the *season* of Christmas from Dec. 24 to the feast of Epiphany on Jan. 6. Until the 20th century, these 12 Days of Christmas were the time for celebration and partying. Make them special in your life and family.

Cut the consumerism: Limit your shopping and spending by setting a strict budget or gifting the people in your life with homemade presents, favors, or ways to spend time together.

Party hardly: For some, Christmas is an excuse to overeat and drink to excess. Moderate your consumption.

Most importantly, pray: Ask God to help you and your family craft a meaningful and joyful Advent and Christmas. Ask God to send you wisdom, resources, and people who can journey through the spiritual season with you.

By carefully stewarding your faith life, Advent and Christmas can be a time for real spiritual growth.

With the help of a Thrivent Grant our busy shoppers were able to obtain 156 items to donate to the Food Pantry last month. These were supplemented by additional items as well as fresh fruits and vegetables from our members. At present more than 30 family units and over 70 individuals are relying on the food bank for assistance.

Help, of course, is an ongoing need.

Donated items most helpful right now:

coffee (regular), instant coffee, fruit juices (all kinds), sugar, flour, cooking oil, evaporated milk, Spam, canned chicken and dumplings, beef stew, scalloped /other potato products, pasta and rice sides, Chef Boyardee-style canned foods, soups (ready- to-serve, vegetable beef, New England clam chowder), spaghetti sauce (plain and with meat), Hamburger and Tuna Helper, pancake mix and syrup, canned fruit, salad dressings, ketchup, mayonnaise, snacks of all kinds (including pretzels, chips, pudding, cookies, etc.)

Personal Care Items: toothbrushes, combs, brushes, deodorant, shampoo/conditioner

Cleaning and Disinfectant Products: including dish soap and laundry detergent.

Christmas is the harvest time of love. Souls are drawn to other souls. All that we have read and


thought and hoped comes to fruition at this happy time. Our spirits are astir. We fell within us a strong desire to serve. A strange, subtle force, a new kindness,
