

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Hearts.

As soon as the stores took down Christmas decorations, red hearts appeared everywhere to encourage us to think about Valentine's Day. (By the way, February is also National Heart Awareness Month.)

Saint Valentine. There were a number of priests named Valentine in Rome in the late third century. Here is the legend of one that seems to make some sense of why his name is associated with the exchange of "valentines."

According to Father O'Gara as reported by David Kithcart of the Christian Broadcasting Network, Valentine was a Christian priest in Rome at a time when emperor Claudias the second persecuted the church. Claudias also issued an edict that prohibited the marriage of young people. This was based on the hypothesis



that unmarried soldiers fought better than married soldiers because married soldiers might be afraid of what might happen to them or their wives or families if they died. Valentine worked to encourage couples to marry and to do so within the Christian church, but, because of the edict, he had to marry them in secret. Eventually he was caught, imprisoned and tortured for performing marriage ceremonies against the emperor's command.

The legend continues that while Valentine was in prison, one of the men who was to judge him was named Asterius, who had a daughter who was blind. Supposedly Valentine prayed with and healed the young girl. This amazed Asterius who, himself, then became Christian. However, because of his stand for Christian marriage, Valentine was sentenced to death in 269 AD. The story goes that the last words he wrote were in a note to Asterius' daughter which was signed, "from your Valentine."

We could say that Valentine had his heart in the right place.

Having one's heart in the right place. How many believers, including those whose names we do not know, have had their hearts in the right place and dared to obey God rather than "the powers that be"? How many have behaved in ways that did not go along with the current culture when they perceived that what the culture was promoting was not in line with God's will? We will never know, but we do know there have been many.

God continually calls us to check the health of our heart. God asks us to do this literally as part of caring for the bodies God has given us. God asks us to engage in exercise that will challenge and strengthen the muscles of our heart. God also asks us to figuratively check the health of our heart, to take time to be honest about how close our relationship is with God, and how well our passions, our efforts, the things we love and promote line up with what God loves and encourages. God asks us to engage in study, thinking and behavior that challenge our assumptions, challenge simply going along with the flow or avoiding something because it might be risky to stand up for what God wants. Like Valentine, God's Spirit is there to help us develop and keep a healthy heart.


FARM FAMILY APPRECIATION CELEBRATION – Saturday, March 16, 2019

ELCA GOOD GIFTS

Through the generosity of the members of New Jerusalem, 23 ornaments were hung on the Good Gifts tree. Other gifts may have been sent without our knowing it. According to the ornaments, the gifts members gave will provide:

THE \$TOVE FOR OLCHOKI

We have collected over 70% of the cost of providing one stove for Olchoki Primary School in Arusha, Tanzania. Using a \$7,500 loan from Operation Bootstrap Africa (OBA), the school was able to obtain 3 stoves and can now offer its 1,500 students one meal a day. A year and a half ago we committed to repaying the loan for one of the stoves. As of early January, New Jerusalem has received \$1,757 toward the stove and forwarded \$1,500 of that to OBA. Only \$743 to go.

MORE GOOD NEW\$

The \$25,354 we have collected to repay ourselves for repaying the parking lot brings us 68% of the way to the approximately \$37,000 cost for the project.

YOU'VE GOT MAIL

Starting with January 13th and continuing through February our second readings this year are from First Corinthians.

Pastor Paul Lutter reminds us that this time after Epiphany and before Lent "serves an important role in continuing what was introduced during the Christmas season." The Gospel stories focus "on the means through which God is being made manifest in the world in Jesus Christ." We hear stories of his baptism, his first miracle of turning water into wine, how he explained his mission to his home folk, the call of his first disciples, healing stories, and his explanation of what it means to be a disciple, what it means to live lives of radical love.

These stories are accompanied by lessons from Paul's letter to the new congregation in Corinth, a busy Greek port city where people from many cultures and religions mixed together. In these passages Paul focuses on how God gifts God's people with a variety of gifts from the Spirit, which gifts they are to use to help one another grow in faith, and to show God's radical love to others. On February 3rd we hear the familiar words of 1 Corinthians 13, where Paul explains that the purpose behind all these gifts is love. In the remaining readings, he goes on to explain that God's radical love shown in Christ Jesus not only enables us to live a new life here and now, but assures us of a new life to come on the other side of the grave.

To get a "sneak peek" at these lessons read 1 Corinthians 13 and chapter 15:1-20, 35-38 and 42-50.



WHAT'S IN A LABEL? CAN I DONATE FOOD TO THE FOOD BANK IF THE DATE ON THE CONTAINER HAS PASSED?

Many of us read the labels on the food we buy, but what they contain can be very confusing. Take for example the phrases: "Use by," "Best By" and "Expires". Many of us assume that it is not safe to use an item if the listed date has passed. This is not necessarily true.

According to the February 2019 Consumer Reports "On Health" newsletter and an online archived article by WebMD the following labels have these meanings.

The "use by" date is the date when manufacturers guarantee the product is at its best quality. The exception is infant formula. In this case the "useby" date is a safety date and should be carefully observed. The "use by" date on infant formulas is a date, selected by the manufacturer based on tests and other information, to inform retailers and consumers about the quality of the infant formula. Until that declared date, the infant formula will contain no less than the amount of each nutrient declared on the product label and will otherwise be of acceptable quality. The "use by" date is required by 9 FDA regulations on each container of infant formula. Source: FDA/CFSAN Office of Nutritional Products, Labeling and Dietary Supplements, July 2002.

The term **"expiration date"** refers to the last date a food should be eaten or used (WebMD). Some, however, question whether a product might, in fact, be good for some time after this date.

The "**sell by**" date tells the store when to remove the product from the shelves how long to display the product for sale. The issue is the quality of the item, not whether or not it is spoiled. The date listed is the last date the product is at its highest quality, but it is possible the item might be good for a very long time after that date.

The "**best if used by**" date refers only to quality and not safety.

"Guaranteed fresh" usually refers to bakery items and again refers to quality, not safety.

The **"pack"** date is when the item was packed and may be in a code set by the manufacturer.

In answer to the question, "Is it safe to eat food past its use-by or sell-by date?" the Consumer Report article responds: "Usually, yes. Manufacturers provide such dates to help consumers decide when a food is of best quality. In both cases, a product should be safe if handled properly until spoilage is evident. Spoiled foods often have an off-odor and off-taste. But look for other signs, such as changes in texture or color."

The WebMD site offers information on "How Long are Foods OK to Eat?" as well as other food safety tips. Go to <u>https://www.webmd.com/a-to-z-guides/features/do-food-expiration-dates-matter#2</u>.

As far as donating items to the food bank, you may donate items that have a date that has passed. Providing the item does not appear to have spoiled, the food bank will place the item on a separate table that indicates the date of best quality has passed. People are then free to decide whether to take and use the items.

Timothy Keller, in The

Meaning of Marriage, describes the duality this way: "To be loved but not known is comforting but superficial. To be known and not loved is our greatest fear. But to be fully known and truly loved is, well, a lot like being loved by God. It is what we need more than anything. It liberates us from pretense, humbles us out of our self-righteousness, and fortifies us for any difficulty life can throw at us."




DECEMBER 2018 YEAR-TO-DATE INCOME AND EXPENSE

Did You Know?

CHI RHO

"Chi" and "rho" are the first two letters in the Greek spelling for Christ (XPICTOC, pronounced "Christos"). The blending of these two letters into

one symbol formed a "sacred monogram." Early Christians created many such symbols as codes to indicate their discipleship while avoiding detection by Roman



persecutors. Many variations of the Chi Rho symbol exist, incorporating a cross, a shepherd's crook, the Greek letters alpha and omega, an anchor and other images.

Note from Pastor Ruth: I frequently use the chi rho when taking notes in place of the word "Christ" or as the beginning of the word "Christian."

Years ago, some started using the symbol "X" at the beginning of the word "Christmas," so it read "Xmas." Others who probably didn't know the origin of this practice protested, "Keep Christ in Christmas." Yes, we definitely want to keep Christ in Christmas, at least in the meaning and observance of Christmas. But when you see "Xmas," you might stop and think that it may have actually started by folks who were using the chi rho to talk about "Christ's mass" which got shortened to "Christmas."

THE CHURCH AS MOSAIC

A mosaic consists of thousands of little stones. Some are blue, some are green, some are yellow,

some are gold. When we bring our faces close to the mosaic, we can admire the beauty of each stone. But as we step back from it, we can see that all these little



stones reveal to us a beautiful picture, telling a story none of these stones can tell by itself.

That is what our life in [the church] is about. Each of us is like a little stone, but together we reveal the face of God to the world. Nobody can say: "I make God visible." But others who see us together can say: "They make God visible." [Christian] community is where humility and glory touch.

STEWARDSHIP OF LOVING RELATIONSHIPS

Jesus said, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." – Mark 12:31b

Jesus said, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." – Matthew 5:43b

Red hearts, roses and chocolates are everywhere, so

it must be February—the month of love! There's certainly nothing wrong with celebrating romance between you and a special someone, or love among



and a special someone, or love among family members, or best friends who are always there for one another.

But our inner-circle folks represent only a sliver of the people Jesus calls us to love. And let's face it: they're the *easy* ones to love. Jesus calls us to a higher plane of love; to love everyone. This means not just the people about whom we are ambivalent, but our actual enemies and those who persecute us.

Such love is a tall order, especially today, when hatred and demonization is rampant. Our political, media and social cultures encourage us to demean everybody with whom we disagree or who is different from us. Though it may be impossible to reach Jesus' ideal, as stewards and disciples of Jesus, we can do better.

- Turn from hate. It may be too much to love our enemies, but we can start by turning from hatred. When negative feelings arise, refuse to marinate in them. Pray for guidance and strength.
- Remember that loving your enemy doesn't mean approving of who they are, what they do, or letting them escape responsibility for their actions. It also does not mean you cannot protect yourself or others from harm.
- Imagine them as a broken, imperfect child of God (just like you!), who needs God's love and mercy.
- Pray for them. Ask God to lead them, guide them, fill their lives with healing. Ask God to give them the kind of loving heart that you are hoping to develop in yourself.

If you do these things consistently, with God's help you will have transformed your heart, your life and our world.





Food Pantry Expansion in Dingmans Ferry



Holy Trinity in Dingmans Ferry has been operating a food pantry for 30 years. In recent times, as the number of families coming to receive supplemental food has grown, Holy Trinity has partnered with state and local government, local businesses, the Delaware Valley School District, and the community to purchase and collect food to distribute.

Barbara Hupfer, the Holy Trinity Lay Assistant, coordinates the pantry, ordering food, recruiting and training volunteers and scheduling and meeting with food pantry recipients. The pantry is open 5 days a week.

In recent years the need for additional space for storage, freezers and distribution of food became critical. The congregation was blessed by a \$100,000 gift from a parishioner who volunteers in the pantry and a grant from the Land Share Act of Pennsylvania for \$50,000 to pay for the 980 square foot addition onto the church.

Bishop Zeiser came to preside over the dedication of the new pantry. He spoke about recognizing the mission of God being shared in the church and the community, including the county and local elected officials who were present.



The congregation is filled with joy

over this growing ministry that daily serves people in need. Each month, over 150 families are given supplemental food including, cereal, canned goods, meat, vegetables and a variety of staples. The congregation is blessed by being a blessing.
