

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

When we think of February, we think of hearts.

The American Heart Association promotes February as National Heart Month. Before the New Year's celebrations were over, the local Dollar Tree was putting out Valentines.

John 3:16 reminds us that God's heart is filled to overflowing with love. While we know what it is to love a number of individuals, a group, an organization, and a country, God loves the whole world. God loves the whole world, not just in general, but loves each individual plant and creature, grain of sand and drop of water. God loves those I know as well as those I don't know and may not even know exist.

The heart is responsible for pumping blood throughout the body, making sure every cell is fed, cleaned and repaired so that the body can grow and stay healthy. Maybe we can think of the church as God's heart, responsible for pumping God's love throughout the world, helping every "cell" of God's creation be what it was meant to be.

Just as the heart itself cannot touch every cell but has to pump the blood to do the work, we as individuals, as a congregation, and as a wider church cannot touch every soul. We can, however, do our share as part of that heart muscle. We cannot feed and clothe and provide shelter to each person in the world, but we can and do provide items for the food bank and funds for ELCA Good Gifts/ELCA World Hunger. We cannot shelter every cold person, but we make quilts for Lutheran World Relief and scarves and hats for seafarers. We can give to Lutheran Disaster Response to help those whose homes have been destroyed from wind, water, storm and fire so they can rebuild not only a dwelling, but their lives. We cannot give the gift of peace to every child, but we can help put a smile on their faces with gifts for Christmas and we can work through our legislators to insist on peace and justice. These gifts we offer get "pumped" around our community and around the globe.

Just as the different muscles that make up the heart must beat in rhythm, must expand and contract in a coordinated way, we as individuals and the church must learn to beat in rhythm. This is why our local exploration of ministries we can do together (aka Congregation Conversations) is so exciting. This is why our participation in Synod Assembly and in opportunities like Learning Ministries Day, the Confirmand Retreat and our East Berks Mission District are so important.

Each cell of the heart muscle must also be fed, cleaned and repaired by the same blood that it pushes through the body. In the same way, we as individuals, a congregation and the church need to read God's word and need to gather together to literally hear God's voice more clearly while it cleans out the misunderstandings and even evil that can try to grow in us. We need the support for growth that only God's voice heard and experienced through others can bring. Through worship we also experience what it means to be part of "something grand," something that is life changing for us and for others.

God's heart is filled to overflowing with love. Jesus is God's valentine to us. May this letter also be a valentine from me to you, expressing how much I love how each of you and this congregation, how much I appreciate how you only "pump" the love you have received from God not only outside our congregation, but also within it, also to me. SPIRIT ON TAP

GIRLS HELPING GIRLS. PERIOD.

Girls and women in communities all across the United States and around the world are missing school and work because they simply can't afford basic necessities to help them feel clean, necessities like tampons and pads. Those items are not covered by food stamps and some families are forced to cut back or choose between other critical purchases. It is calculated that one in five teenagers in the U.S. misses school and/or extracurricular activities because they don't have access to the basic feminine hygiene products.

A Berks County program called Girls Supporting Girls. Period. believes feminine hygiene is a matter of basic health and human dignity. Members are dedicated to educating people on the need and collecting and distributing products. They give their clients a full year's supply of products and are spreading the word that it is easy to help. This program is part of a national and international program working to address "period poverty."

The U.S. organization, Girls Helping Girls. Period., was started in December 2014 by sisters Emma Joy, 16, and her sister Quinn, 12, in South Orange, NJ and collects tampons and sanitary napkins for needy women and girls near their community. Other organizations may be known by names such as Helping Women Period. All are part of a response to increasing international awareness of challenges that girls and women face.

We at New Jerusalem are going to collect feminine hygiene products during March and September. Those who would prefer to make donations of cash or check to New Jerusalem to assist in this project are asked to clearly designate they are for "Girls Helping Girls. Period." These funds will be used to buy more products. One of our members will take what is collected to local programs which can distribute them to individuals. Providing what may seem like a basic necessity can truly change lives.

Our thanks to those who are bringing the need to our attention and seeking to dispel the stigma that is often associated with a basic health need.

ELCA PRESIDING BISHOP ISSUES PASTORAL MESSAGE ON IRAN CONFLICT

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9).

The current crisis between the United States and Iran is worrisome for many of us in our church, in our nation and in the world. Our country and Iran need urgently to find ways to resolve our differences through a de-escalation of the current crisis, using diplomacy and other peaceful means. Armed conflict and war are always tragic for those directly involved and often as well for civilians, who also may suffer under punitive sanctions. These situations are evidence of broken relationships. Our social statement, "For Peace in God's World," offers guidance:

We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America share with the Church of Jesus Christ in all times and places the calling to be peacemakers
The basis of the Church's peace-calling is in God's final peace, the peace of God's eternal reign. That calling is to proclaim the Gospel of God's final peace and to work for earthly peace.

For our part, we have a window of opportunity to stop the current conflict before it worsens. We should appeal now to our elected officials to pursue the path of dialogue and diplomacy with Iran — for our sake, for the sake of the people of Iran and for the sake of the world God so loves.

STEWARD YOUR LIFE: CULTIVATE A HEART OF LOVE

Jesus taught, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven." – Matthew 5:43-45a

Red hearts, flowers and chocolates remind us that February is the uncontested month of love.

It's excellent (and easy) to love those close to us, but Jesus tells us to go wider, deeper, riskier – to love even our enemies. In so doing, Jesus says, we become children of God.

This challenges us to embrace love as the key discipline and develop a heart so full of love that it flows to even our enemies. Isn't that how we're supposed to live as disciples? It's just good stewardship of our lives.

For this "month of love," practice loving your enemies.

The effort is especially timely in our season of discord, when our loudest voices encourage us – through name-calling, denigrating, lying, smearing – to hate those with whom we disagree. Even calling them "enemies" is too much (they're really neighbors!).

Loving our "enemies" doesn't mean we agree with them or tolerate bad behavior. It means respecting, listening, discussing, refraining from anger and revenge. Here are some ideas for loving our enemies:

- Jesus gives us the first step: Pray! For them and for you!
- Stop seeing them as enemies. They're our neighbors whom God loves.
- Resist hate, the very thing our culture encourages.
- Treat everyone as you would want to be treated.
- Lastly, keep praying.

By embracing love as a spiritual discipline, we cultivate a heart of love that opens our lives to the transformation Jesus dearly desires for us -- to be children of God. Now that's good stewardship.

Did You Know?

SHEPHERD'S CROOK

The shepherd's crook is a symbol for Jesus, the Good Shepherd. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). The crook also symbolizes the shepherds who visited the baby Jesus in Bethlehem. It's also used in connection with King David, who worked as a shepherd when he was young.

BRANDYWINE FOOD PANTRY NEEDS

Lent, the church-year season that begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26 this year, is a time of penitence and spiritual renewal. Some people give up a luxury or vice during Lent as a form of self-denial; others undertake a project that benefits others.

The point isn't to denigrate ourselves or to see how

much we can do without. Instead, Lent helps us reflect on Jesus' death. As Timothy Keller writes in *The Reason for God*: "The Christian Gospel is that I am so flawed that Jesus had to die for me, yet I am



so loved and valued that Jesus was glad to die for me. This leads to deep humility and deep confidence at the same time. It undermines both swaggering and sniveling. I cannot feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone. I do not think more of myself nor less of myself. Instead, I think of myself less."



This tasty treat doubles as a game to play with a buddy.




What you need:

Mission Trip to Puerto Rico



Imagine riding in one of two fifteen-passenger vans, both navigating a narrow two-lane road that twisted and turned up into the tropical mountains of central Puerto Rico. The views were spectacular. Palms, giant philodendron, and the fiery flowers of the Flamboyant Royal Poinciana tree grace the roadsides and green mountain walls. Small, compact, and humble homes supported by what looks like toothpick legs hug the steep slopes. A morning journey brought the volunteers to the town of Comerío, where the streets have yielded to the mountain's natural topography, reminiscent of the hilly streets of San Francisco.

On June 30, 2019, under the guiding eye of Lutheran Disaster Response working through Lutheran Social Services of Puerto Rico, 25 Lutheran volunteers from 5 Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod churches traveled to Puerto Rico to repair homes damaged by Hurricane Maria.

The volunteers divided into four teams. One team repaired a house needing to have the roof power washed and sealed, as well as its interior ceiling and walls scraped and painted. This house had stood empty for the past two years and was unlivable in its current state. The family who had lived there pre-Maria were hoping to return to their home as soon as possible.

Thanks to God and the excellent guidance and organization of Lutheran Social Services of Puerto Rico, the team was able to power wash their roof and seal it. They scraped ceilings and painted the interior of their home. Much

of their nearly new furniture, now moldy and warped, still awaited removal. All their kitchen appliances had been destroyed.

And yet, because of the hard work of the team, and a generous grant from The Witness and Service Ministry Team supported through Mission Support giving to the Synod, the work was accomplished. Donations of various gift cards from a number of congregations enabled the team to purchase a new refrigerator for the family. What a joy to see faces of hope as these homeowners came so much closer to reclaiming their home. Truly the team used its hands to do God's work!
