

Dear Partners in Ministry,

It's February. The days are getting longer. Even if it's cold, at least there is more light.

It's February. As we start this month it's still Epiphany, the season of light, the time when we think about the many ways Jesus revealed himself, how he showed people what he was about. The climax of Epiphany is the transfiguration, when Jesus climbed the mountain with three disciples and they not only saw him in a new light but heard God clarify, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!"

Seeing God in a new light. That's what our Christian journey is all about: continuing to see God in deeper, perhaps newer, ways. It's about experiencing God in ways that are meaningful for where we are in this moment in time. It's not that God is changing, it's that we get to know God better. So often we think we know a person well, only to discover a different dimension.

It's so easy when I am around my husband every day to assume that I know him, even know what he looks like. But that assumption can prevent us from deepening our relationship and treasuring how we are maturing. We need to take time and make the effort to engage in conversation, have new experiences and process them together. As a parent and a grandparent, every time I interact with my sons and their children, I see and hear things I wasn't aware of before. Often children and grandchildren don't realize how important getting together is for those of us who are older, that we want to continue to get to know them because we love them and want to love who they *really* are, not just some memories and assumptions.

February. This year we Christians not only observe Transfiguration in February, but mid-month we mark the beginning of Lent. This year Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday are on the same day. Some would note that that's appropriate, that Lent is about God's great love for us, about God calling each of us "beloved."

"In your light we see light." We need light in order to see. Different intensities and types of light alter our perception. When light is dim we may think we know what something is, but when the light is turned up or focused on what we are looking at we see it more clearly and may discover what we thought was there is something very different. There are also different colors of light, some whiter, some yellower, some bluer, etc.

There are some places I prefer bright white light, like where I am sewing, but there are others where a softer, yellower light helps me relax, enjoy being with people or watching TV. Even with the optimum type of light, some of us need corrective lenses to help us see more clearly and as our eyes change over time, these lenses often need to be adjusted. The section of Psalm 36 from which verse 9 comes starts with, "How precious is your steadfast love, O God!" As we grow in our relationship with God, God's steady love not only adjusts the "light" with which we see things, but it also continues to correct the lenses through which we view what is going on.

My prayer for each of you whom I care so deeply about, is that we will as individuals and together take the time to "look" for God at work in our midst, see what God is doing in our world. I pray we will be open and even expect to see and experience God in some new ways. May your personal devotions, Bible study, worship and working with others help you see Jesus ever more clearly, love him more dearly, follow him more nearly, day by day.

LUTHERANISM 101

With this newsletter we begin a series of articles on what Lutherans believe and do. These articles are being shared with our local Lutheran parishes.

What is Theology and Why does it Matter?

Theology is one of those subjects that causes some to flee in terror and others to fall asleep. Yet among those fortunate enough to pursue theological study as a vocation, it is wonderful, necessary, and fun. So, what is this thing that we call, "Theology?" The word itself derives from two distinct words in the language of the Ancient Greeks. Theos (geos) and Logos (logos). The first most accurately translates as "God," and some scholars (myself included) argue that it refers specifically to the God of the Israelites. The latter word means "word," "discourse." Thus, theology is a discourse about God, a study/ conversation regarding the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (Israel). The fact of the matter is that all who believe in the Triune God, are engaged in theology. Theology is neither useless and unnecessary, nor is it difficult and static.

"Don't we all believe in the same God? Why are we so divided? Why should we care about theological differences? What do we truly believe?" Each of these questions is valid, but each can be answered. Over the coming months it is hoped that we shall all see how one might respond to these inquiries. It is my endeavor to provide us with some valuable insight. Looking first at Scripture and next at Lutheran Doctrine, we shall see a rich tapestry begin to unfold. The result will be a deeper understanding of our faith, traditions, and very real relationship with the Almighty. Each day we are to seek a stronger connection to God. It gives us energy, nourishes our soul, and provides us with hope. So how do we strengthen this relationship? John 3:16 tells us that all who believe in Christ shall not perish but have everlasting life. It truly is that simple. The fact remains that we ought to respond with gratitude and a desire to know God more truly and faithfully. Do we not build our human relationships around knowing the other more deeply? We want to know the truth too. Believing the wrong things about people does not lead to healthy relationships. We need to know the truth about God and His ways. While no one person can ever fully know God, we can seek the correct path. That is where theology comes in.

Lutherans and Methodists, Roman Catholics and Greek Orthodox, Mennonites and Mormons. Along with so many additional Christian denominations, we each believe something different about God. Sure, there is much more similarity than difference, yet the differences do matter. Remember we are trying to know God faithfully and truthfully. While no one denomination can perfectly capture the essence of God, each one claims that it is the most accurate. There would be no point in its teachings, otherwise. As such, I a Lutheran, believe that Lutheranism is the most accurate at theological study and biblical interpretation. Not perfect, but the best we have so far. This is not to condemn any other denomination. Rather it helps us begin to comprehend why we are Lutherans and truly what we confess. Our modern world suffers from a lack of consistent truth-telling. The Church knows that Jesus Christ is the way, the truth and the life. Starting where it all began, let us dive into Lutheran Theology with God's Word. "Let there be Light!"

Lent is not for the faint-hearted. It demands that we, like Thomas, put our hand into the side of the crucified Christ.


Lent is not tidy.

New Name, Same Mission

"God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble." - Psalm 46:1

In order to expand its ability to serve increasing numbers of refugees and immigrants who seek to live in safety here in the United States, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services has changed its name to Global Refuge. With more than 100 million people around the world displaced from their homes, the organization has seen tremendous growth in the need for their essential and innovative services. As part of its mission to build a bigger table to welcome and serve newcomers, the leaders have made a decision that they believe will allow the organization to meet this historic moment.

You see, many who have heard the name Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services have wondered whether the organization only helps resettle Lutherans or whether you have to be a Lutheran to get involved. This name change will help clarify the organization's mission to serve those in search of refuge, regardless of religious affiliation. It will also reflect that the organization partners with other communities of faith.

This was not a decision the organization took lightly. The Board of Directors spent over 18 months exploring how to expand and protect their mission in these challenging times.

Board Chair, Bryn Parchman writes, "LIRS was forged in faith 85 years ago, and its faith-based identity is integral to their work of welcome. Having grown up as a Lutheran, it is a gift to me — and I trust to you as well — to embrace the future with fresh and innovative programs to fulfill our mission of welcoming the newcomers in our midst."

She continues, "While we have adopted a new name, our mission, vision, and values remain unchanged. Our relationships with the Lutheran community continue, including with congregations and affiliates who are integral to the co-sponsorship model of welcome. We will continue our efforts to engage interfaith communities in our work as well, as the need to grow our movement of welcome is greater than ever before.

"During my years of service on the Board, I've witnessed the impact of working with dedicated partners and affiliates united by the common purpose of 'welcoming the stranger' so that all those compelled to flee in search of refuge and a better life are embraced and supported."

"Like you, I am inspired by the stories of newly arrived immigrant and refugee families who are building a future filled with hope. And I am saddened to know how many precious children of God yearn for even a glimmer of hope. And so I am reminded of the words of Martin Luther: 'Everything that is done in the world is done by hope.'"

"There is so much more we can do — and must do — to offer hope, to provide refuge, to those who need it most."

"An important note is that our legal name remains: Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service so NO changes to wills, estate plans or legacy endowments is required or necessitates an action on your part. Continued support can be addressed to LIRS or Global Refuge."





Advent Shares: Hope Out Loud

Support from the HOL! (Hope Out Loud!) Capital Campaign saw Advent members participate in dozens of projects – some new, some one-time; some existing ministries were expanded or refreshed. The dedicated members of Advent who truly care about people in need were very active and supportive. One member shared: "When I had some tough years, my church came through for me! That experience changed me in big ways. I vowed that I would get involved more and & pay it forward". Helping others has made me a happier Christian." There are so many completed (and ongoing!) projects. These ministries are wide-ranging and varied – food, clothing, shelter, blankets, books, and prayers. Cookies at Christmastime.

Advent members help men, women, babies, children, people in prison, people in recovery from addictions, hungry people – in our community, our country, and around the world. Members have said that they feel joy in providing the services and the looks on the faces of the recipients reinforce joy there too. Some of the projects receive seed money from Thrivent Action Teams. Some of our favorite ministries and activities are Bombas Socks donations, books and Bibles for Berks County Prison, Christmas Cookies for Common Ground, the Hungry Yard Sale, Family Promise, our Little Free Library and Little Free Pantry, the (new in 2020) Prayer Team, and the many clothing drives.

As one example of the positive impact in the community: The Little Free Pantry was filled and emptied on the same day. We cannot keep it filled fast enough. Through our \$250.00 Thrivent Action Team sponsorship by members of different committees, we can grocery shop and fill our shelves in Advent's grocery shelves. We fill up my grocery cart three times a week and go outside to our Little Free Pantry. Within hours it had been emptied. Praise God for Thrivent and Advent's church members in helping fill our community's bellies with happiness through our wonderful blessed giving! Another goal of the HOL! The campaign was to increase the use of technology in our church life. In the middle of the pandemic, we premiered a fresh, beautiful, new website to tell people about Advent – reaching out in a modern way to share God's word and work with our neighbors, friends, and people who want to learn about God. This new website increases our visibility in the community and provides valuable information for members and visitors alike. Seeing new people attend and join our church brings



joy, creating more of a sense of "community". We continue to be inspired by: 1) Jesus' examples of sharing, healing — "love our neighbor as ourselves", (2) a thirst for learning about our faith through study and worship, (3) the need for support in our local and global community, (4) Reflection on our blessings and those less fortunate, (5) and, socializing with others while providing service.
