Dear Friends,

I am writing this in mid-December, hoping to get ahead a bit before putting the finishing touches on Christmas services and waiting for the Spirit to help me focus on sermons for the upcoming weeks.

As we prepared for the 5 p.m. Christmas Eve service this year, I asked our youth what they thought we should have for our Birthday Party for Christmas. "Glow sticks!" one said. "We definitely need glow sticks!" The rest agreed, so I went shopping for glow sticks.

Turns out there are many kinds of glow sticks: some for emergencies, some large, some small, some you can bend into shapes and some, I learned, come with connectors so you can link them together to form bracelets and necklaces.

I haven't figured out yet whether there is a limit to how many glow sticks you can link together. I'm sure someone has tried to figure this out and one of our youth will soon let me know. For now I'll wonder: What if we gave every person enough glow sticks so they could make a circle big enough to wrap around them and one other person? Would it be hard to choose who would share the circle? What if everyone in church connected their glow sticks and held onto that circle? Would we feel the warmth and energy of God's Spirit connecting us to one another?

We plan to attach a ribbon and a thought to each glow stick we hand out as a party favor. What if we gave each person plenty of glow sticks so each could pass on a glow stick to folks he or she met? Would you light the stick before presenting it or let the person light it when he or she wanted to? What would you say as you handed one away? Would you give more than one away, so that person could also pass on the thought?

Christians call these weeks after Christmas *Epiphany* and *time after Epiphany*. These weeks in January and early February we think about how Jesus was revealed to others; first to the wise men, then in his baptism, then to the disciples and, finally, in the Transfiguration. We think of this time as the season of light, "light that shines in the darkness", light, as the writer of John continues, "that the darkness did not overcome". In this season we not only celebrate Jesus coming in the flesh long ago and how he was revealed to others, but we also celebrate his continued coming into our lives and our world, his coming to shine in the darkness of our lives. We remember not only the way Jesus shines, but his command, "Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven."

This January, let's think of ourselves as glow sticks, glow sticks that need never fade. Let us think of ourselves as individual glow sticks sent out to spread the light of Jesus and to pass that light on to others. Let us also think of ourselves as connected with others who share the light of Christ. Let us be open to the imaginative ways the Spirit will connect and use us to bring the light of God's love to others.

Shine, Jesus, shine! Bring your light into our lives and shine through us to others! Amen!

2018: YOUR YEAR OF GRATITUDE

Think of the three happiest people you know – people whose lives effervesce with joy and peace. Chances are they also have a profound thankfulness for all that God has blessed them with. They also seem to live with a sense of contentment. Reflect for a minute. Isn't that the case?

By contrast, you may also know folks who are considered wealthy but are profoundly UNhappy. Likely they not only fail to exude thankfulness for their wealth, but they also mistakenly believe they need even MORE possessions to be happy. Isn't that right?

Now, which kind of person do you tend to be?

Thankfulness. Happiness. Contentment. These joyful characteristics work together, reinforcing one another. Human experience proves this simple fact to be true: People who are grateful for all they have and all they are tend to be happy and content. Moreover, don't they also tend to possess spiritual depth and emotional maturity? A coincidence? Hardly.

Thankfulness, happiness and contentment interact, but gratitude holds the key. Develop gratitude, then happiness and contentment follow. It doesn't work the other way around. With prayer, devotion and simple exercises, the Holy Spirit will lead you to deeper spiritual maturity and more happiness. Here are some ideas for you and your family.

- **Pray daily.** Ask God to give you a greater sense of thankfulness. And then thank God for all the day's blessings.
- **Chart thankfulness.** On a big wall calendar mark one thing for which you're thankful to God. Invite other family members to do the same. When you get in the habit of looking for them, you will find blessings everywhere.
- **Keep a "blessing list."** Write down the things you are grateful for. Then as you say your nighttime and morning devotions, pray over the list: "God, I'm thankful for *this*, and I'm thankful for *that*." Revise the list as needed.
- Start a refrigerator "gratitude board." Using sticky notes, post on your refrigerator the things for which you are most grateful. Use a different color sticky note for each family member. Keep the board updated.
- **Send out thank-you notes.** Buy a box of inexpensive thank you notes and send one every week. Go deep, thanking not only the folks who have given you a present or done a favor for you, but also those whose love, support, friendship, laughter, energy or presence are important to you.
- Make a "thank offering." Express gratitude in a tangible way by making a contribution to your congregation or favorite church cause. Make the donation "just because," or in honor or memory of a loved one, or on the occasion of a special event or blessing in your life.

Adopt one or more of these exercises as a spiritual discipline and, with God's help, you will develop the attitude of gratitude that will bring more satisfaction, greater happiness, spiritual depth and emotional maturity to your life. Blessings for 2018.

THE FREEDOM OF FORGIVENESS

Martin Luther King Jr. called forgiveness "a permanent attitude," as opposed to "an occasional act." Maintaining a forgiveness mind-set leads to peace and freedom.

Author and pastor Max Anders experienced that freedom in seminary.

After cheating on a Hebrew final, he was distraught and confessed his sin to God and the professor. "I felt deeply cleaned. Pure. Holy," Anders writes in 21 Unbreakable Laws of Life. "I wanted to laugh and cry at the same time. I wanted to run and jump and dance. The burden was lifted. ... I was free!"

By contrast, he writes, "If we don't ask for forgiveness when we wrong someone, we lose our moral authority; the debris of sin begins to accumulate in our hearts, choking our conscience... Others know when we sin against them, and if we don't make it right, it hurts our reputation as well as God's"

A PENGUIN "PARABLE"

During storms, emperor penguins huddle for warmth, taking turns at the center and on the

perimeter of the group. While incubating eggs, up to 6,000 male penguins have been observed clustering for shelter against the harsh Antarctic winter. Partially grown chicks gather in protective "creches"



(French for "cribs"); often surrounded by a colony of adults, these groupings ward off predators and cold.

In stormy times, humans also need supportive groups; we can't survive alone. A church family allows us to take turns giving and receiving care. Amid social upheaval, injustice, illness, natural disaster, and any loss or crisis, God invites us to gather for protection and warmth. In the church community, we support and strengthen one another and are empowered to go out again into the less-sheltered world.



ANOTHER BURNING BUSH

A church youth group in Arizona went to New Mexico to fix up homes for low-income Native-Americans. When they returned, one of the teenage boys spoke during a worship service. He told the congregation about the good the group had done, but he also told about a unique spiritual experience that he'd had.

The group had held vespers outdoors each day as the sun set. One day as dusk approached, he noticed a dead bush that seemed to demand

his attention. He was fascinated because the bush glowed as though it had a large glistening ruby in its branches. For him it was an epiphany, a unique memorable revelation of the presence of God. It was a



spiritual event that burned deeply into his spirit.

From a burning bush, God once summoned Moses to do his bidding. Like Moses, this boy experienced something special. His heart and mind were open to the call. Are we prepared to notice burning bushes along life's way?


THIS IS THE DAY




- Wooden craft sticks
