Dear Sisters and Brothers,

According to Wikipedia, "in ancient Roman religion and myth, Janus is the god of beginnings, gates, transitions, doorways, passages and endings. He is usually depicted as having two faces, since he looks to the future and to the past." (While some say the month of January is named after Janus it was Juno, the head god, who was the designated "deity of the month.")

Scripture and witnesses through the centuries tell us that it is the God we know as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit who is the God of all transitions, both endings and beginnings.

As we enter the new year, 2020, we look back and we look forward. We look back and we look forward because God gives us the courage to do so.

We look back with fond memories of some of the events of 2019, memories that bring a smile to our faces and cause God to smile as well. For those memories that bring tears to our eyes, God stands by us with comfort and hope. When we experience regrets for things we have done and left undone, relationships and opportunities we have lost, God gives us the courage to admit that some of these losses were our own fault. God also assures us that God will not only forgive us, not only give us the strength to live with the consequences of our actions and inactions, but will even guide us to right some of the wrongs.

Like Janus, though, as we mark the coming of the new year we don't just look backwards. We look forward to what is to come. We look forward with expectation and hope, knowing that God goes with us. Sometimes as we look forward, we are anxious because we think about some of the things that might be coming: challenges, transitions, possible health procedures, etc. Once again, we are reassured that the God is and will be with us.

Through the centuries some Christians developed a custom of "chalking the doors" in the new year. This is usually done on the main entrance using sacred signs and symbols and a short liturgy asking God's blessing upon those who go in and out, who live, work, or visit throughout the coming year. An article on pages 8 and 9 gives more details.

One final note: I recently realized that when one says the numbers for the new year, they are the same numbers used to indicate clear vision (20/20).

In this new year, may God not only bless our goings and our comings, but also give us clear vision to see God and follow God's ways.

LOVE IN ACTION

Martin Luther King, Jr., whose life and legacy we

CHALKING THE DOOR

"Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love."

The Christian tradition of chalking the door is a sign that we have invited God's presence and blessing into our home or other space.

There is precedent for doing this. At the time of the Exodus the Israelites marked their doors with blood so that the angel of death would pass over their homes. Later, after giving them the ten commandments, God told the people, "These words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house... You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:9)

While it is not clear how the Christian tradition of chalking doors started, nor why it became associated with Epiphany, it exists in many countries. It can take place any time after Christmas, though most often on the twelfth night, January 5, Epiphany Eve. It may be done by a priest, or by a family using chalk that may or may not have been blessed. An article on the Alles German website tells us that in southern Germany "it is common to see groups of children called **Sternsinger** (literally star singers) go from house to house dressed in kingly costumes and carrying a star on January 6th. They sing a song, recite a poem about the three kings, write a blessing on the door frame and collect a donation for a charity. People they visit may also give them a treat—some chocolate, candy, etc.—no doubt to give them energy to carry on through the day."

So how do you chalk a door? First, get some chalk of any color. Next gather those who live or work in that building. Use a short liturgy and prayer. Next, taking turns, mark the doorway in the following way: 20 + C + M + B + 20. The first and last numbers indicate the year you are doing this. You can write this above, on, or on the side of the door.

The crosses, of course, stand for Jesus. But what about C + M + B?

Here again we have a variety of traditions. Some use the names traditionally given to the wise men:

Casper, Melchior, and Balthazar. Some also suggest they stand for the Latin "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means, "May Christ bless this dwelling!"

Like the Israelites who marked their doors with blood, some folk think this practice protects their homes from evil spirits. Others perform this act because it represents Mary and Joseph's hospitality to the Magi and all Gentiles. Overall, however, it is an invitation to God's presence in one's dwelling or other important space.

Why use chalk? Chalk is made of common elements of the earth and has many ordinary uses such as by teachers to instruct students or by children in their games and play. In the case of chalking the doors, chalk is used as an ordinary substance put to holy use. Since it is not permanent, it will not mar the building and the fact that it fades with time, calls us to rededicate our lives and spaces to God, and ask God's blessings on all who come and go through that door.

As far as a liturgy to use, one can simply use the blessing listed under the title for this article, and mark the doorway or base it on suggestions found on The United Methodist Discipleship Ministries Worship website:

You can use individual prayers, Bible readings, remembrances of the past, expectations for the future, and add verses of a hymn, and use the litany below:

A Blessing of the Home

Leader: The Lord is with you.

Community: And also with you.

All: Peace be to this house (or office, or other place) and to all who live, work, and visit here.

L: The three wise men came to Bethlehem in search of the Lord. They brought to him precious gifts: gold to honor the newborn king, incense to the true God in human form, and myrrh to anoint his body, which one day would die like our own.

L: Let us pray. O God, you once used a star to show to all the world that Jesus is your Son. May the light of that star that once guided wise men to honor his birth, now guide us to recognize him also, to know you by faith, and to see you in the epiphanies of the daily experiences of our lives.

L: Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord—Jesus born of Mary—shall be revealed.

C: And all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken it.

All: As the Wise Men once sought your brilliant light, O Lord, so may we seek to live and work in your splendor.

L: O God of Light, bless this (our) house and this (our) family. May this be a place of peace and health. May each member of this family cultivate the gifts and graces you have bestowed, dedicating our talents and works for the good of all.

L: Make this house a shelter in the storm and a haven of rest for all in need of your warmth and care. And when we go out from this place, may we never lose sight of that Epiphany star.


C: As we go about our work, our study, our play, keep us in its light and in your love.

People in turn mark the doorway with one or more of the symbols: 20 + C + M + B + 20

L: May we, in this place, and all who come to visit, to work, and to play, remember these things throughout the coming year. May all who come and go here find peace, comfort, joy, hope, love, and salvation, for Christ has come to dwell in this house and in these hearts.

All: May we be Christ's light in the world. Amen.

Whether or not you choose to follow this custom, may you find that God is present and blessing the places where you dwell and go.



Open Arms Senior Connection - Arndt's, Easton



For over 17 years, grants totaling more than a half million dollars have been made possible through mission support giving. Grant applications are received by the Witness and Service Ministry Team and are awarded based on the outreach the grant will accomplish.

The story that follows is written by the founders and the current program director of Open Arms Senior Connection. It tells of an inspiring ministry that got its beginning because of a vision, the need to help others, and the available grant funds that allowed it to thrive.

Over ten years ago a small Welcome and Outreach committee at Arndt's Lutheran Church in Forks Township was looking for another ministry that could use their resources. The congregation came together to modify their existing spaces using funds predominantly from a Transforming Congregations grant and a Witness and Service



grant, both of which are mission support grant programs available through the Synod.

Today "Open Arms Senior Connection" continues as a two-day a week program for older adults in the greater Easton community. Realizing that the time some of the participants spend at Open Arms might be the only times during the week that they enjoy a meal with someone, or have any human contact at all, inspires the congregation to make the program as effective and impactful as possible.

The success of this program is due in great part to two paid codirectors and all the volunteers. The program runs on a budget of about \$1000 per month, which goes toward daily beverages and snacks, basic supplies, and salaries.

Donations, fundraisers, and Witness and Service grants from the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA has allowed this program to reach and provide long term benefits to hundreds of older adults in the region.

Sharing Life - St. Mark, Allentown



Sharing Life is the brain child of Sue Krasley, a parishioner of St. Mark's, who worked at Allentown State Hospital and who had concerns about individuals losing peer relationships due to the closure of the hospital in 2010. At the time, Pastor Brindjar graciously and enthusiastically afforded the opportunity to begin our mission by opening the doors of St. Mark's for a monthly gathering.

What originated as a modest idea of serving a monthly luncheon nine years ago has expanded into a much sought-after experience by our community; it now includes monthly Craft days led by St. Mark's talented artists Brenda Mann and Charlie Orbin.

As our events grew, our attendees have become diverse; and today, monthly events not only include individuals formerly served at Allentown State Hospital, but also embrace individuals with Intellectual Developmental Disabilities as well as the community at large.

Throughout the years the echo and sentiment of Pastor Brindjar's mantra can still be heard: "Stay Calm and Carry On". Due to the success of our mission, and because we often find ourselves serving upwards of 120 individuals each month, we have adopted another mantra: "fishes and loaves."

Because of St. Mark's willingness to take a risk and open their doors and hearts, our mission isn't just about serving individuals lunch. More important is offering to individuals our acceptance, an opportunity to form new friendships, and a welcome to a faith-based community. All activities and luncheons are free to participants and are funded lovingly by our mighty Committee members, St. Mark parishioners, and community donors.
