

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God. - 1 John 4:7

Beloved,

This how the author of the letters known as First, Second and Third John addresses the community he dearly loves. Not only does he love them, but he calls and instructs them on how to be a community of love, a *beloved community*.

Jesus taught about the kingdom of God, where all would live in peace and harmony, the way God planned it from the beginning. During our time, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and other prophetic voices used the term of Beloved Community to describe the experience of God's kingdom in our lives today: moments of reconciliation and joy that break in and heal our many divisions.

Many of our members would describe New Jerusalem as a Beloved Community, a gathering of loving people who care for one another, for others and for the world God loves.

Communities change. We all know that. Communities change. Our Beloved Community is changing. Change does not have to be good or bad. Often it is just that, it's just change. We are often reluctant to see what has felt familiar and comfortable morph into a new form, but God's abiding promise is that God is doing a new thing.

Beginning in January our members will be invited to join in small groups to talk about the changes happening in our Beloved Community. These will be times to treasure what has been meaningful in the past and what is still meaningful in the present. These will be times to acknowledge that some things we treasured are no longer possible or meaningful. These will be times to identify what we hope we can carry into the future and to share visions of how this might happen.

In these months now between the Feast of the Father's Love (Christmas) and the Easter Celebration that death does not have the final word, that new life emerges from what appears to have been the end, let us listen for and pray for God's Spirit, the Spirit that breathed the church into being.

Times of change, times of transition, times of trying to discern the future can be challenging. This is true for our personal lives and for the life of our congregation. It is hard to be patient. It is frustrating to deal with the unknown. It can be tempting to lash out or to raise our hands as if to give up trying. I have every confidence, though, that this Beloved Community, our congregation, knows how and will love and encourage one another in these times. I have confidence, because love is of God, the God who has been with us in the past, is with us now, and promises to lead us into the future. I have confidence that the God who has been "our help in ages past" *is* "our hope for years to come."

Be at peace, knowing that you are loved. May God's Spirit fill you with courage, hope, and expectation as we begin this new year.

# UPDATED GUIDELINES FOR WORSHIP AT NEW JERUSALEM

- 1) For the time being, seating will be every other pew.
- 2) Masks are expected to be worn as an act of love and respect for others. Singing is to be done softly, and only when wearing a mask.
- 3) Communion will be held the first Sunday of the month in your pew.

The Worship and Music Committee, the council and our Task Force will continue to monitor the situation and will make modifications as they deem it wise.

# UPDATE ON RESETTLING AFGHAN AND OTHER REFUGEES

Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS) is working with the Allentown office of Bethany Christian Services Ministries to resettle Afghan and other refugees in our area. Basic household items are needed by these brothers and sisters, most of whom have come with little more that the clothes on their backs.

Since June they have resettled 30 family units in our area with 15 more expected by February 15<sup>th</sup>. On average one family arrives every 2 weeks. This is a huge effort. Volunteers are needed to manage donations, help set up new homes, move furniture, and transport and accompany people to medical and other appointments.

#### **2022: YOUR YEAR FOR GENEROSITY**

# "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity!" - 2 Corinthians 9:11

As you make resolutions and set goals for the New Year, be sure to include this one: "I will be more generous in 2022." It will bless you – and your community and neighbor!

The Bible makes clear that generosity leads to a more abundant life. Generous people experience one of those paradoxes of the Kingdom of God, where the last are first, the greatest is servant to all, and whoever loses her life for Christ will gain it. The paradox? Generous people get back far more they give.

First, a clarification: The paradox is NOT a financial strategy to maximize return on investment. That would be missing the point. Besides, there are more important things to give than money, such as time, service, kindness, forgiveness, compassion, love, and joy. And what we get back may not be quantifiable. How do you measure wellbeing and happiness?

Generosity's real "payback" is what and who we become when we cultivate a habit of giving. Giving transforms us into generous-hearted people, and generous-hearted people tend to experience a real abundance of joy, peace, love, and security.

The old saying is most certainly true: The open palm holds more than the closed fist.

For 2022, set a goal to be more generous. Start by increasing your charitable giving above last year's offering, but also aim to give away your time, to serve your neighbor, to be lavish in compassion, extravagant in love.

Pray that God will guide you and help you experience the paradox: Givers get back more than they give away.





Covid-19 Update & Guidelines

The Latest Situation: The Covid-19 pandemic continues to generate fear, concern, confusion and division across the country and within our own Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. The most recent developments – some troubling, some hopeful – include:

The rise of new variants, especially "omicron";
The ongoing and in many cases, increasing numbers of new cases;
The continued reluctance and refusal of some to get vaccinated, or to wear masks;
On the good side: the increased opportunities for testing, for boosters, and for vaccines for all ages.

Here in our Synod, I now encourage us to use another trustworthy source of information to help guide our decisions concerning the pandemic: the "Covid Act Now Coalition." This non-profit, web-based resource brings together non-partisan experts in medicine, law, and public policy, to provide objective data and analysis. Their website is being consulted as a reliable source by synods and congregations across the ELCA. From their site, we can see clearly that things are still very threatening here in NE Penn: all 14 of our counties have threat levels of "VERY HIGH" or "SEVERE" – Berks, Carbon, Lehigh, Northampton, and Schuylkill all are in that worst category. Additionally, the vaccination rate is at or below 60% for 7 of those 14 counties. Most of these numbers are worse than the data for many of our neighboring synods, including the Southeastern Penn Synod, whose leaders have nonetheless chosen to put in place stricter guidelines than we have. I believe we can become safer and return to "normal" sooner if we follow their lead.

#### Dr. Luther Shows The Way:

Almost exactly 500 years ago – in November 1520 – Martin Luther published one of his most ground-breaking treatises: "On the Freedom of a Christian." He begins the document with this famous declaration: "A Christian is the most free lord of all, subject to none. And a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone."

He goes on to describe how God, through Christ's sacrificial love for us on the cross, has granted us the grace and the freedom to make our own decisions; but this freedom does not release us to disregard the truth, or our call to care and concern for our neighbor. Luther writes: "Therefore [Christians] should be guided in all [their] works by this thought and contemplate this one thing alone, that [they] may serve and benefit others in all that [they do], considering nothing except the need and the advantage of [the] neighbor."

So "what does this mean?" The inconvenience of mask wearing; and even the threat of temporary cold-and-flu reactions to vaccinations – these are simply the sacrifices we are called to make, as "the dutiful servants of all, subject to everyone." It is within this traditionally and theologically Lutheran framing that we maintain our vigilance; and update our guidelines here.

#### Covid-19 Continued...

Latest Synod Recommendations: As we prepare for the larger crowds of Christmas Eve – and with Lent, Holy Week and Easter not far away – I am recommending the starting, the continuation, or the resumption, of any and all common-sense and good-neighbor precautions, including:

 Proof of vaccination or a negative test for all indoor events

 Indoor masking
 Good air circulation, including open windows where feasible

 Social distancing, frequent washing and other effective protocols

Furthermore – at their January 15 meeting, I am encouraging our Synod Council to discuss and decide upon further appropriate actions, which may include mandates that all Synodsponsored indoor events require masking, proof of vaccination, and/or proof of a negative test. As the duly elected governing body of this Synod, your Synod Council has the right and responsibility to make these decisions for Synod gatherings. When it comes to our individual worshipping communities, our authority is more limited; Synod Council (and myself) can only make clear and strong recommendations – based on the best science, on good conscience and on our common love for our neighbors, especially those who are most vulnerable. In other words, all congregations have the "freedom of a Christian" to decide for themselves how they will choose to act – or refuse to act. I invite us all to follow our baptismal call and Lutheran heritage, to follow God's will and God's love for all.
