"The reports of my death are greatly exaggerated" is a popular misquote attributed to author Samuel Clemens, better known by his pen name, Mark Twain. The tongue-in-cheek quote is based on a letter he sent to a newspaper reporter who had asked Twain about rumors that he was dying. This quote, however, is often used to humorously comment on a person's absence from society or to refer to something that appears dead or hopeless but still has a slim chance of success.

The reports of the demise of our church are also "greatly exaggerated." Since leaders of the congregation have been open about our work to discern the future of New Jerusalem, the rumors are out there that we're done. We've even heard some people say they have slowed or ceased sending in support because they're not sure we have a future. But *this is Christ's church* and we know that Christ's church will endure to the end of the ages when Christ will return and God's rule will come in its fullness.

As time passes and circumstances change, families take on different configurations. In the same way, the gathering of those who identify as the congregation of New Jerusalem is in the process of adapting to changes within and around us. This is turning out to be a very interesting process to watch. On the one hand, we were experiencing a decrease in the number of people attending worship and able to provide leadership. On the other hand, attendance has recently been increasing at worship, our times together are becoming livelier and more interactive, some who have not come in a long time are joining in, and newer folks are stepping up to help. On the one hand, there were things we said we could no longer do, like large community meals and making shoo-fly pies. On the other hand, members are excited about figuring out other ways to have get-togethers and are planning a soup and something else (to be decided) sale in April. Go figure! God has a way of continuing to surprise us. Nevertheless, we do need to continue to prepare for possibilities the future might hold.

Many among us are personally trying to figure out how to downsize our homes. We know the time will come when we will no longer live in as large a place as we now inhabit, so we look around and wonder, "What will I keep? What served a purpose, but I won't need any longer?" In the same way, during the coming months, we need help to thoughtfully look at and sort out what we have as a congregation, so that we arrange to preserve what is important and either give away or throw away what is no longer needed. Just as you need to be selective when packing your bags for a trip so that you aren't slowed down by trying to drag along heavy bags, we need to be ready to travel more lightly into the future.

While we have no crystal ball to see into the future, leaders of our congregation have been actively involved in getting to know the needs and opportunities for ministry in our community as well as joining with other congregations to figure out how we might better meet some of these. (You hear about some of these efforts when we report on Congregational Conversations, Ministries with Youth, and the Brandywine Heights Ministerium.) Through these interactions, we not only get to know our fellow Christians better, but we are discovering innovative ways to minister together. Our council members have met on separate occasions with those of Trinity, Hope, and Christ Mertz in order to get to know them and learn more about their congregations. In January, we will meet with the council from St. Paul's, Mertztown. Council and Cemetery Board members are in the process of clarifying the boundaries and deed restrictions on our property in case God calls us to sell the church building. On my part, I have been working with synodical and national leaders to explore a variety of configurations for ministry in a time when many congregations are facing the same challenges we are, and many are without pastoral leadership. All of this will help us be ready to respond to the opportunities for continued ministry that we have no doubt God will place in front of us.

It's not always easy to adapt to change and not knowing what is coming can give rise to anxiety. There are many days I wish God would hurry up and let me in on where all this is headed. At times like that it helps to recall something Cory Ten Boom recounted. One day when she was greatly distressed her father said this to her, "Do you remember when you were little and we were going to take the train? When did I hand you your ticket?" To which she replied, "Just before we got on the train." In this way her father assured her that God would give her what she needed when she needed it.

God will give us what we need when we need it. That doesn't mean we can just sit back and pretend that nothing will change. It does, however, mean that we can confidently face the future because we know God travels into the future with us.

In the meantime, we'll do our best to keep you informed about what we know and what we are doing, and we ask for your help with rumor control.

God's rich blessings for the New Year and all that it brings.

CLEAN-UP KITS FOR SURVIVORS OF DISASTER

Natural disasters don't stop during the winter. Once again tornadoes have ripped through the south. It's

hard to imagine watching your residence be ripped apart by wind or flooded to the second floor. Those of us who have had others help us in our time of need can imagine how



thankful we would be if someone showed up with supplies to help us clean up the mess.

Join us in providing the articles and assembling these badly needed clean-up kits. A Thrivent grant will help us add to our donations. Here's the list of needed. **Please get them to church by January 22nd.**

- ♦ One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (if reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Advertisement on the outside acceptable).
- ♦ One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener.
- Five scouring pads (no stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging).
- Seven sponges, including one large.
- One scrub brush (with or without handle).
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose dry- cleaning towels (no terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. Remove from packaging).
- ♦ One 32-64 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent.
- One 16-34 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap.
- ♦ One 12-40 oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles).
- One package of 36-50 clothespins.
- ♦ One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line).
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; no surgical masks).
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-surgical, durable for multiple-use. Remove from packaging).
- One pair of work gloves (cotton with leather palm or all leather).
- ♦ 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (remove from packaging).
- ♦ One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (pump spay bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes also acceptable).
