

THE MISSION OF NEW JERUSALEM LUTHERAN CHURCH:

We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



"It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery." Galatians 5:1 New International Version

It is the beginning of July and we in the United States celebrate independence, celebrate freedom from domination by powers that did not care for needs of all those it governed. The Declaration of Independence from British rule was publicly read on July 4, boldly declaring: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.

Today many in our nation feel they are held captive by systems and leaders so focused on maintaining their own power that they are not able to effectively care for the people and resources of this nation and our world. Many among us feel helpless and think that there is little they can do. They say they are disgusted with "politics". Yet God calls us into "politics", into the activities needed to govern a country or area. Some among us point out that *partisanship*, not *politics* is the problem; that blatant one-sidedness and unwillingness to truly listen, negotiate or seek compromise for the good of all is what really holds us back. When it comes to politics we often forget that not only does God call us to care and work to secure care for all, we also forget that when we allow God to work through us, "mighty be our powers."

Mighty be our powers! In his book, *The Powers that Be*, Walter Wink reminds us that the God whom Jesus reveals is a God of power as well as mercy. He reminds us that God is passionate that God's kingdom of justice *is* to be brought in, but not by violence *or* passivity. Instead, Wink explains, Jesus taught his followers to find a *third* way to stand up for themselves and for justice for all by *unmasking* a system's cruelty and false premises. "The words and deeds of Jesus reveal that he. . .repudiated. . .the right of some to lord it over others by means of power, wealth, shaming, or titles." (p. 65)

Mighty Be Our Powers is the title of a book by Leymah Gbowee. In the late nineties she helped to organize and lead a coalition of Christian and Muslim women who used non-violent means to confront and overthrow Liberia's ruthless president and warlords. Together these sisters brought an end to the seemingly ceaseless and brutal civil war. They did this in very creative and daring ways: by sitting in public protest, speaking up, praying, persevering, and refusing to have sexual relations with their men until all war ceased. The war ended in 2003. Leymah received the Nobel Peace Prize in 2011.

Christ has set us free from the power of sin, from *any* power that would separate us and any part of God's creation from the way God intended it to be. Paul is clear: "Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by the yoke of slavery," including the slavery of feeling powerless.

In this season, when we remember our freedoms, let us continue to listen with fresh ears and study what Jesus came to teach. Let us pray that God's Spirit show us how to creatively and boldly use our powers for good. Let us pray that God would work through us to develop effective ways to stand firm for freedom and justice for all. Then let us praise God that when God works through us, mighty, indeed, be our powers.

GLAD YOU ASKED - HOLY COMMUNION

Some of you, including our confirmands, have asked why we have Holy Communion on the first Sunday of the month and festival services. Pastor Dennis Ritter gave us permission to share this article he wrote for a recent newsletter.

If, like me, you grew up in the Lutheran Church in this region of the country, you can remember a time when the celebration of the sacrament of Holy Communion occurred 4-6 times per year or very infrequently. Did you ever wonder why? Historically, there are 2 reasons of which I am aware.

First, there was a shortage of Lutheran pastors in the colonial and post-colonial periods of our country. Until we began to develop schools to train pastors here in the United States, it was customary to import them from Germany. It was not until Henry Melchior Muhlenberg was sent to the Americas by the church fathers in Halle, Germany that there began to be a concerted effort to identify and train native born clergy for service in Lutheran congregations.

Second, Lutherans like many new immigrants to this country had to make numerous adjustments, not the least of which was the adoption of the English language from such native tongues as Danish, German, Norwegian, Swedish, etc. Lutherans were also not in the majority from a denominational perspective and so they sought to fit in with the primary strain of Protestantism which was out of the reformed tradition (German Reformed, Dutch Reformed, Presbyterian and Methodist) which viewed the sacrament more as a memorial meal that was not necessary to celebrate more than a few times a year.

Because of these and lesser reasons, Lutherans in our region and other areas of the country fell into the practice of infrequently celebrating Holy Communion/the Eucharist.

In the 1970's, as part of a process of liturgical renewal that eventuated in the publishing of the Lutheran Book of Worship (LBW or green book) our seminaries and the national church began to advocate for celebrating Holy Communion on a weekly basis. While some congregations moved quickly to this practice, others in our area moved to adding a "few more" times to the "traditional" 4-6 times per year that had been the norm. Often this included celebrating the Sacrament of Holy

Communion on the first Sunday of the month and major festivals.

Why was this growth in the frequency of celebrating Holy Communion encouraged? For Lutherans, it represented the recovery of at least 2 strands of our Lutheran Christian heritage.

Biblically, it was faithful to Paul's teaching regarding the Sacrament in 1 Corinthians 11, where in part we read, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes (11:26)."

Historically, it was faithful to the teaching of Martin Luther, who was a strong advocate for the daily celebration of the Eucharist because "those who claim to be Christians should prepare themselves to receive this blessed sacrament frequently (The Large Catechism)," and "The Lord's Supper is given as a daily food and sustenance so that our faith may refresh and strengthen itself and not weaken in the struggle [against sin and evil] but grow continually stronger (The Large Catechism)."

Luther referred to as "the food of the soul (The Large Catechism)." I pray that you will find it to be so as well!

Some wonder whether having taking part in the Lord's Supper frequently would take away from it being a *special* meal. Can we humans ever get too much of hearing and receiving signs that someone loves us and is there for us? It may be true that some times seem more special than others, but there are other times when we may not think we need to hear it and are surprised by love when we least expect it or feel worthy of it. Can we ever get too much assurance that God loves us and is with us as closely as the bread and wine we receive?

Did You Know?

SPARROW

Birds in general symbolize God's presence.

Sparrows represent God's concern and care even for those thought insignificant. In Jesus' words, "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. ... So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows" (Matthew 10:29, 31, NIV).

We fast on the 21st of the month to fortify our advocacy in solidarity with families who are struggling with hunger. We fast to be in solidarity with neighbors who suffer famine, who have been displaced, and who are vulnerable to conflict and climate change. We fast with immigrants who are trying to make a better future for their families and now face the risk of deportation. We fast in solidarity with families on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), when 90% of the benefits run out for families, making the remainder of the month a hungry time.

JOIN ELCA ADVOCACY AND PRESIDING BISHOPS OF THE ELCA AND THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH AS, TOGETHER, WE:

PRAY for our nation's elected leaders and for all who struggle with hunger and poverty.

God of compassion, whose Son became poor for our sake: Help us to see the face of Christ in those who are poor, and in serving them to serve you. Give us generous hearts so that those living in poverty may have adequate food, clothing, and shelter. By your Spirit move us to affirm the dignity of all people and to work for just laws that protect the most vulnerable in society; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. FAST to call attention in our own minds and actions the needs and circumstances of the poorest among us; and

ACT by urging our elected representatives to continue funding crucial safety net programs.

CURRENT ACTION: APPROPRIATIONS FOR DOMESTIC HUMAN NEEDS

As Lutherans, we are called to protect, support and uplift those who lack access to basic human needs—a roof over their heads, food and decent employment. As a church we can make part of the difference in the lives of our poorest brothers and sisters, but without government assistance programs, millions

of Americans would be unable to feed their children, find employment or locate adequate housing. Some of these important programs include:

- WIC (Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Woman, Infants, and Children) – WIC helps low-income mothers and their children access nutritional benefits.
- Federal Unemployment Benefits and Allowances These funds support low-income people struggling to find permanent employment.
- Low-income housing Assistance, community development and homelessness prevention – These programs assist homeless and low-income people to find viable housing.
- The Second Chance Act This law affords grants to non-profit organizations, state and local government agencies and registered Indian tribes to provide educational, mental health substance abuse and job-training programs for individuals transitioning out of the prison system.

COMMUNING WITH GOD

After Apollo 11 landed on the moon on July 20, 1969, pilot Buzz Aldrin requested via radio that people pause to give thanks for the achievement in

their own way. When his broadcast ended, Aldrin read a verse from the Gospel of John and took communion, which his church had sent to space with him.

"It was interesting for me to think: the very first liquid ever poured on the

moon, and the very first food eaten there, were the communion elements," the astronaut said. "At the time, I could think of no better way to acknowledge the enormity of the Apollo 11 experience than by giving thanks to God."




Life is more interesting when you have a diverse "mix" of friends. Show your variety of buddies how much they mean to you by making this snack for (or with!) them.
