

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

SUMMER SABBATH

Like many, I went swimming for the first time this year on Memorial Day. It felt so good! How about you? Do you like to swim?

I must admit that usually I'm not one to dive right in. I'd rather ease in, getting used to the coolness of the water. Once I've adjusted, then it's fun to jump or dive. How about you? Like a number of you I first learned to swim in a creek, specifically the Catskill Creek near the little village of Oak Hill, New York. Our father took us there every Saturday and Sunday during the summer. We'd go late in the afternoon when the tourists who had been swimming would be returning to their boarding houses for supper. We went then because our adventure in the creek was also not just recreation, but, since we had no running water or bath tub at our summer house, it was our only opportunity to get fully immersed. So after folks had left we'd go down to the end of the swimming section, down to where the creek started to run shallow, and we'd soap up and wash our hair, letting the flowing water rinse us off. By the time the stream had gone several more miles to reach the next section where people could swim, the water would no longer be soapy.

I don't know about you, but the hardest part about learning to swim was learning to relax and trust the water to hold me up. Somehow I learned this in the creek. When I learned to trust the water swimming became a luxurious experience: being able to float on my back and gaze up into the blue sky, watch the clouds, look up at the tops of the trees while rocking gently in the current. And

then there was learning how to coordinate my muscles with the buoyancy of the water so that I could go below the surface and come back up. Diving opened up other worlds: seeing the bottom of the creek bed, retrieving objects and, with later training, learning how to potentially rescue people.

Summer is a time to enjoy the water and many other outdoor experiences. Summer is a time to sit back or lay back and luxuriate in God's wonderful creation. Summer is definitely a time for Sabbath: time off from the



activities that lead us to think that we are in charge of our lives. When we keep Sabbath, we remember that it is God who is in charge. Like first learning to swim, it can be very scary to let go of our desire to control everything, very scary to let ourselves "float" in God's loving care. But as we ease in, as we learn to trust God to keep us "afloat," we may find that we come to see the world and our lives in a whole new way. We are also likely to find that these experiences of Sabbath leave us feeling refreshed, cleansed, even bathed in the wonder of God's love.

May this summer be a time when we encourage one another to grow in "letting go and letting God." May it be a time when we luxuriate in the wonders of God's creation. May it be a time when we allow God to lift our burdens, lead us to new places and maybe even help us develop new abilities. May this summer truly be a time of Sabbath.

BLESSINGS FOR THOSE TRAVELING

At the Learning Ministries Day workshop we were introduced to the resource: <u>For Everything a Season:</u> <u>75 Blessings for Life's Milestones</u> by the Nilsen Family. Mary Nilsen has graciously given our congregation permission to use excerpts from the book for our newsletters and worship. Here is one for those traveling:

PREPARATION: This blessing can be initiated by those remaining behind, as a way of sending off loved ones, or by those traveling. Place a bowl of water on a table for making the sign of the cross.

WELCOME: *For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven. We pause to ask for God's presence to be with (name) during this journey.*

PRAYER: Good and gracious God, as this journey is about to begin, help me/us to trust that you have good things in store. Watch over all who travel. Make us ever mindful of your presence. Amen.

BIBLE TEXT: It is the Lord who goes before you. God will be with you; God will not fail you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed. Deuteronomy 341:8

REFLECTION: As the Bible says, God will be with you wherever you go. Reflect on the nature of your journey: Where are you going? Why are you going there? How long will you be there? Think about, write in a journal about or where: What is it about this journey that you anticipate with joy? What is it about this journey that you anticipate with apprehension?

RITUAL ACTION: Make the sign of the cross on your own forehead, if you are alone, or on the foreheads of all who are traveling. If some are traveling and others are remaining behind, have those remaining make the sign of the cross on the forehead(s) of the traveler(s), saying, **Remember God goes with you.**

In some families, one spouse/parent travels often on work related matters and can easily lose touch with the family. Consider these actions: Every night both those traveling and those at home write in a journal about their highs and lows of the day, a journal that can be shared when the traveler returns. Or, draw a picture of some special part of the day. Sharing these memories can be an important part of welcoming the traveler home.

BLESSING: May we always remember that God goes with us wherever we go. Amen.

PROTECTION FROM ABUSE

At their May 27 meeting, the Congregational Council of New Jerusalem adopted a Protection of Minors Policy and Procedures. The committee which developed this policy is now finalizing the forms that will be required to fully implement this policy. You may wonder why we are doing this at this time.

As of January 2015 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania clarified and expanded 1) its background check requirements for volunteers who work with children and youth programs and 2) its list of who is a mandated reporter.

Now any employee 14 years of age or older who applies for a paid position as an employee responsible for the welfare of a child or having direct contact with children is required to submit a) the Pennsylvania Criminal History report, b) the Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance and c) the Federal Criminal History report from the FBI. Any volunteer 18 years of age of older is required to submit the first two of these reports. The Commonwealth requires that volunteer agencies and congregations have to have processes in place to record and keep background check information current. The congregation will now require and pay for such checks for employees, council members, and any volunteer who works with children's activities.

As to whom is considered a mandated reporter, **now any individual paid or unpaid, who on the basis of the individual's role as an integral part of a regularly scheduled program, accepts responsibility for a child, is considered a mandated reporter.** The Commonwealth defines a program, activity or service as any public or private educational, athletic or other pursuit in which children participate. This would include Sunday School, Confirmation Class, campfires, etc. A mandated reporter is required to make an immediate report of suspected child abuse if they have reasonable cause to suspect that the child is a victim of child abuse under any of the following circumstances:

1) the mandated reporter comes into contact with the child in the course of employment, occupation and practice of a profession, or through a regularly scheduled program, activity or service; or

2) the mandated reporter is directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance or training of the child, or is affiliated with an agency, institution, organization or the entity that is directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance or training of the child; or

3) a person makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that an identifiable child is the victim of child abuse; or

4) an individual 14 years of age or older makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that the individual has committed child abuse.

While mandated reporters are required to make a report by calling Childline 1-800-932-0313 and completing form CY-47 to the County Children and Youth Services, **all adults who suspect child abuse are encouraged to do the same.**

The (proposed) newly adopted church policy contains many more specifics. At a later date training will be made available to staff, parents, volunteers, and any interested members of the congregation.

Please pray for all children, that they may be granted safe and secure environments with loving adults who care for them.

THE ORIGIN OF FATHER'S DAY

One Sunday in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd listened to a sermon honoring mothers. Her mother had died some years before, so her father had raised her by himself. Dodd wondered why there wasn't a day to honor fathers, so she arranged a tribute to her father at a church in Spokane, Washington. The date was June 19, 1910. Many people believe this was the beginning of Father's Day.

Another account holds that a West Virginia church held a tribute service for fathers in 1908, following a mine explosion that killed 360 men. Regardless of which story is correct, President Calvin Coolidge was the first president to designate a special day to honor fathers. In 1924, he proclaimed the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.

FLAG DAY

Since the early 1800s various groups have observed a day to display the American flag. Presidents Woodrow Wilson (in 1916) and Calvin Coolidge (in 1927) issued proclamations marking June 14 as National Flag Day. But it wasn't until August 3, 1949, that Congress approved June 14 as a day of national observance. President Harry Truman signed it into law.

The American flag has changed designs more than any other flag in the world. In fact, the United States didn't have a standardized flag until 1912! And even after standardization, the flag changed three more times with the addition of new stars representing new states.




