

"This Is My Father's World"

Our Father's world: late Spring and summertime are such wonderful times to explore the wonders of our Creator's world, the world God loves *so* much!

"And to my listening ears..." In early June, Cliff and Sue Schlenker, my husband, Rick, and I along with 7 others from our synod will travel to Saxony, Germany, to meet brothers and sisters in faith. Together we will explore their hometowns, Berlin and Wittenberg. Since English is not the native language of our hosts, nor German ours, we will need to listen intently to one another in order to understand what each person is saying. We will also listen intently for what God's Spirit is saying to us through the discussions we hold with our new friends and our visits to areas not only rich in Reformation history, but also facing challenges of modern life, especially the challenge of refugees.

"...[A]ll nature sings, and round me rings the music of the spheres." The music of birds and crickets and flowing streams, warm dark clear nights perfect for star gazing, the conversation and laughter of friends and children: yes, the world in our area is filled with wonder-filled sights and sounds. What other areas of God's creation will you explore this summer? In the sights and sounds we experience we can truly "rest [ourselves] in the thought of rocks and trees, of skies and seas... [that] declare their maker's praise."

But all is not always well with this marvelous world that God has created. We humans misuse and abuse our natural resources. Our brothers and sisters in Germany struggle as we do with the issues of how to provide meaningful employment and sufficient resources for all within their borders as well as how to be compassionate to those who are desperate for refuge. They struggle as we do to choose wise leaders who care not just for their nation, but are able to appreciate the larger international picture and negotiate for justice throughout the world. They struggle as we do with concerns over terrorism and war in the Middle East and elsewhere.

Since God, who with great enthusiasm created everything that exists and tenderly formed humankind in God's very image, that means every human being that we meet or hear about is our sister and our brother. Every human being, near or far, challenges us to see and welcome God in him. Every human being calls us to reflect God to her and the rest of creation through our lives and actions. Even as we continue through the election process in our nation, we are called to remember that we are not to engage in mudslinging or bear false witness against anyone whom God has created. Rather, we are called to use "our listening ears" and to humbly and prayerfully contemplate and evaluate what each candidate and party proposes. We are then called to support by words and actions what we hear God calling us to do for the good of every sister and brother and all of creation.

This is my Father's world; oh, let me not forget that, though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet. This is my Father's world; why should my heart be sad? The Lord is king, let the heavens ring; God reigns, let the earth be glad!

Mission Support (Benevolence)

Of the \$1,623 our congregation contributed as benevolence to the synod in 2014, \$746 was forwarded to the national church.

In 2014 the ELCA used 15% of the funds it received from all its synods (\$112 of our donation) to **support and develop current and future leaders in the ELCA** by:

- a) supporting the work of 8 ELCA seminaries and 26 colleges and universities;
- b) offering events and leadership opportunities for youth and young adults;
- c) recruiting, preparing and implementing a system for assignment of 9.250 rostered leaders; and
- d) identifying, connecting and providing ministry resources and opportunities for networking for lay leaders.

Our national church used another 15% to **coordinate and support churchwide ministries** by:

- a) maintaining constituent databases;
- b) preserving and maintaining archives;
- c) equipping congregations and synods with resources to assist in risk management and other legal matters;
- d) providing office space, equipment and human resources for staff; and
- e) processing 131,000 gifts to ELCA ministries.

ELCA Campaign *Always Being Made New* Reaches 40% of Its Goal.

"At a time when some wonder if the church has the capacity to be engaged in the world, we are actually extending our work. Truly, together we can do more." wrote ELCA presiding bishop, Elizabeth Eaton.

Launched in 2014, the campaign seeks to raise \$198 million to help sustain and expand the ministries of the church through four priorities: Congregations, Hunger and Poverty, Leadership and Global Church. The additional resources will help our church grow our communities of faith, form new leaders, welcome our neighbors, overcome malaria, confront hunger and poverty, accompany our global churches and so much more.

Let's Love Trees

God must love trees, because he made so many of them. Where would we be without trees? They


provide us with wood, fruits and nuts. They're home for birds, squirrels, monkeys and other animals. Children climb them, build "houses" in them and hang swings from their limbs.

Trees help keep homes cooler, thus lowering the cost of air conditioning. They fight global warming, add nutrients to the soil, and help clean streams and rivers.

Trees can increase a home's value by up to 15 percent. They also add beauty to a neighborhood with their amazing colors and restful shade.

They're God's gift to us and they bless us in more ways than we might imagine. Just think: Where would Zacchaeus have been without a tree? (See Luke 19:1-10)





The Peacock's Symbolism

The beautiful peacock is likely one of the lesserknown Christian symbols. Based on an ancient myth that its flesh doesn't decay after death, early Christians appropriated the bird as a symbol of immortality. The molting of its tail feathers each year to be replaced with supposedly more beautiful

ones led to use of the peacock as a sign of resurrection and glorification.

Additionally, the eye-like pattern in the peacock's tail

feathers made it a symbol of conscience and of God, who sees all. However, the peacock also represents arrogance as it struts to show off its plumage. During the Baroque period, the peacock was often part of artwork at the 10th Station of the Cross, depicting Jesus stripped of his clothing—atoning, according to some teachings, specifically for our sin of vanity.

Early Christians believed peacocks shriek when they catch sight of their feet, which they consider ugly. Christians took this as a reminder that we, too, should lament our spiritual imperfections that detract from the beauty of life lived in Christ.


