THE MISSION OF NEW JERUSALEM LUTHERAN CHURCH:

We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



"I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life." – John 14:6

The earliest Christians were called followers of the Way. It was followers of the Way that Saul tried to stop and even eliminate. He tried up until Jesus revealed himself on that road to Damascus, accused Saul of persecuting him, and called Saul to follow him. Saul listened and repented, which means he desired to and changed his ways. Jesus not only forgave Saul, Jesus used him to encourage others to also follow the Way, to follow Jesus.

In the coming months our worship will focus more specifically on asking the question: "What does it mean to be the church?" I say, "more specifically" because that is the question we are to continually ask ourselves: "What does it mean to be the church?" What does it mean to be followers of Jesus? Note that "followers" is plural.

To help us dig into this question, each Sunday during the summer we will include a reading from the book of Acts. This book is also known as "The Acts of the Apostles." It records how followers of the Way learned what it meant to follow Jesus together, how what we call "the church" developed.

The followers of the Way discovered that this wasn't a smooth path. There were lots of bumps, potholes, and bends in the road. They discovered that the path was not always clear, that they couldn't always see very far ahead. They discovered that while there were many understandings and forms of worship from their past that were to be treasured and were useful, there were some that needed to be discarded. There were also many new things to be tried, some of which would prove helpful. Even those that were helpful needed to be adapted for changing circumstances. Sometimes the followers were in agreement, other times God's Spirit used fellow believers to challenge one another in order for the movement to stay on the true path.

Acts is filled with stories of everyday people who were doing their best. Since we will be reading little sections at a time, I encourage you to read the whole book in just a few sittings. Having a map of Paul's journeys—often found in the back of your Bible—can help you make sense of all the comings and goings.

Pastor Peggy Hahn notes that we who are followers of Jesus, followers of the Way, are followers of a *movement*. As we read through Acts and think about what it means to be the church, I would encourage us to think about what she points out as characteristics of a movement. (I've included in parentheses a thought about how this might apply to us.)

 * A movement longs for people who know they are not yet there, rather than wanting to go back to what was comfortable. (As we seek to discern our future, we know we are not there yet.) * A movement does a reality check on core beliefs, convictions, and practices to make sure it is on track, rather than worrying about upsetting people with every decision, large or small.

(We know we can't please all the people all the time.

God does call us to care about each person, while at the same time, with the Spirit and Scripture guiding us, we are to keep on going, even if some complain or choose not to come along.)

* A movement is concerned about what behaviors are being formed as people become more like Jesus, rather than focusing on counting nickels and noses as the most important metrics.

(We continually ask, "Is what we are doing feeding faith? Are our efforts directed at helping people become followers of Jesus? Do they make a difference in how people are living their lives?)

All of this is a lot to think about and we need one another's wisdom and encouragement. And so I thank God that you are my companions as God's Spirit guides us to follow the One who is the Way!

CURRENT WORSHIP GUIDELINES

Our worship guidelines at present place responsibility for personal health and safety on individuals. Anyone who has not been vaccinated, is vulnerable, or is concerned about the vulnerability of another with whom they have close contact is encouraged to take the precautions they think necessary to protect their health. These are subject to change if the level of transmission rises. Currently masking is optional, though will be respected. Singing, passing the peace, communion at the rail, and fellowship after services have been resumed.

JUST IN CASE: UPDATED WORSHIP INFORMATION FROM COUNCIL

Please join us in praying that the spread of COVID-19 will decrease.

Meanwhile, join us in giving thanks to God for the gift of life and health *and* taking seriously the responsibility to take care of not only our own health, but also that of others, especially the vulnerable.

As members of Congregation Council watch case counts of COVID-19 fluctuate in our area, council has determined that if the levels of transmission in Berks County rise to the highest level according to <u>www.CovidActNow.org</u>, the following preventive measures will be put in place in our gatherings:

- 1. All persons will be expected to wear masks, except for those for whom this is not medically advisable.
- 2. All persons will be expected to practice social distancing.
- 3. At the time of the passing of the peace, we will simply signal a sign of peace to one another
- 4. Communion will be celebrated using prepackaged elements.
- 5. Fellowship activities, including sharing food, will be temporarily curtailed.

The website <u>www.CovidActNow.org</u> bases their ratings on: daily new cases, infection rate, and positive tests results. The ratings range from: 1=low, 2=medium, 3=high.

Again, we pray that we will not need to put these measures into place. We ask that, if we do, you not only be patient, but also support council members in working for the good of all, especially for the vulnerable.

HELPING OTHERS TO "SEE" JESUS -LUTHERAN BRAILLE WORKERS

Did you know that there is an organization dedicated to bring the Word of God to the 253 million people throughout the world who are blind or visually impaired. Their materials are completely free of charge, in Braille, specialized large print and audio-digital formats. The Bible and other Christian materials are provided by over 15 languages in every part of the globe.

For the past 78 years Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) has produced and distributed over 14 million volumes of Christian material in 40 languages, to 164 countries. LBW has never charged a recipient to receive these materials since it believes financial ability should never prevent the Word of God from being shared with this underserved population. Much of the work is done by volunteers in various parts of our country.

In addition to providing materials around the world, when LBW began producing specialized large print Bibles for use by prisoners and chaplains, they found that within a few weeks orders had been placed for over 15,000 volumes. During the COVID pandemic, there were even more requests. One chaplain said that when these Bibles made it into the library, the number of incidents among the prisoners dropped precipitously.

When a woman in our local area who had been blind from birth started receiving volumes of the Bible in Braille, she couldn't wait to tell others that for the first time she, too, could stand at the lectern on a Sunday and read the scripture.

UPDATE ON LWR WORK IN UKRAINE

Lutheran World Relief (the organization that distributes the quilts we send, as well as personal care kits and other supplies) reported that over half of Ukraines's children have been displaced from their homes because of the violence. The latest LWR newsletter shared how Iryna Sukhota, a child psychologist and Ukrainian refugee is working in a temporary kindergarten/daycare for Ukrainian refugee children in Krakow, Poland.

"As soon as we heard the first sounds of shots, I immediately told my family: we're packing up and leaving, because it was very important to me to save my children, myself. I understood that by saving myself I'll be able to help others, and we left immediately. I realized that as a child psycologist that children now require attention most of all."

Iryna works with children to stabilize their wellbeing and gives parents information about what happens to children and how they can be helped.

LWR works through people like Iryna to reach the millions of children displaced within Ukraine and around the world.

In addition to working with children and shipping quilts and personal care kits, our love in action through Lutheran World Relief looks like:

- emergency funds for Ukrainian refugee families in Poland
- food, shelter and emergency supplies
- ongoing support for St. Martin Lutheran Church in Krakow, Poland which has established a hostel for Ukrainian women and children.
- medical supplies and support for emergency medical services.
- support for protection services for refugee women and children who are facing sexual exploitation.



Gaining Strength: Stronger Together

"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you..." [Isaiah 43:2] This is the promise God made to the people of Israel, in a time when the whole nation was suffering the consequences of their turning away from their primary mission: to love God and love neighbor – especially, neighbors with the least advantages, status and resources. For our time, our church, and our synod, one of our most troubling issues is the sin of racism. Isaiah goes on to say: "Bring forth the people who are blind, yet have eyes, who are deaf, yet have ears!" [Is. 43:8] This speaks to the first step to take into those troubled waters: opening our eyes and ears to see and listen – with minds and hearts willing to go beneath the smooth surface and stir up the stories and truths that, though troubling, will clear the way for God "to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." [Is. 43:19] + Bishop Christopher deForest

On May 22, 2021, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod hosted a virtual conference called "Trouble the Water," an inaugural day of racial justice worship and workshops. The goal of this event was to help our congregations to be more welcoming to Black, indigenous, and people of color; and to focus on racial justice and reconciliation within our churches, communities, and synod.


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Participants were welcomed with a brief introduction to what we hoped to accomplish, and a request for participants to join us in that troubled water – to be willing to experience the discomfort caused by the ripples, and to plan to ride the waves of change and progress that we hoped to create. The organizers started with a land acknowledgment, acknowledged our shared national history of racism and discrimination, and explained that such historical acknowledgment was not about blaming us as individuals today, but about understanding how we came to be where we are in order to understand how to move forward together.

Next, we all worshiped together with song, prayer, and a sermon by Rev. Dr. James Thomas on "The Sins of Racism." Following worship, The Reverend CeCee Mills delivered an incredibly powerful keynote address, and after that two sets of concurrent workshops were offered. The first set of workshop options included Understanding Microaggressions, Trauma-Informed Neighborhood Engagement, Understanding Implicit Bias, and a presentation on the community organizing group POWER Northeast. The second set of workshops included Seeing and Disrupting Racism; Understanding White Privilege; and Church Together (led by ELCA Director of Racial Justice Jennifer De Leon).

The "Trouble the Water" event provided important space for honest, difficult conversation: wrestling with systemic racism and naming our complicity in a broken, inequitable system. Your gifts cultivate a Synod culture that listens to the stories of all people and actively works towards reflecting the Kingdom of God. Our ELCA has a mission of encountering 1 million new, young, and diverse people with the Good News in Jesus Christ. Thank you for your faithful, generous, and consistent giving to Mission Support.
