

THE MISSION OF NEW JERUSALEM LUTHERAN CHURCH:

We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

March is said to come "in like a lion and go out like a lamb." The first part of the month is known for its strong winds.

I recently read a suggestion that we let the strong winds of March remind us of the movings of God's Spirit among us, much as the mighty wind blew among the disciples and crowds at Pentecost and birthed the church. Indeed, God's Spirit is often described as a wind or breath.

This year we will spend the entire month of March observing Lent, when we particularly focus on how Jesus' journey to the cross relates to us and our world. Traditional piety (ways of showing reverence, respect and devotion) includes fasting, alms giving and prayer and meditation.

Many of us are familiar with the practice of **fasting** or giving something up for Lent. Fasting helps us become aware of how we relate to that which we are giving up or restricting. Fasting doesn't need to be limited to food. We can also fast from doing certain things. Since Americans often feel overwhelmed by things which "take" their time, one suggestion for a Lenten act of piety might be to simply keep a log on how your time is *spent* and ponder how that relates to your relationship with God. Time is in many ways a great leveler: each of us is given 24 hours per day.

When it comes to **almsgiving**, did you know that monies designated "benevolence" on offering envelopes go directly to our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod (NEPS) of the ELCA. Check out the pages toward the end of this newsletter for a breakdown of how

the exact amount our congregation contributed in 2014 was used by the synod and the ELCA. (NEPS forwards half of monies received to the national church.) Please note: you can increase the amount sent by the congregation by including a donation for "benevolence" with your offering. In this way you will increase support to the Lutheran Home and other ministries of Diakon, training of seminarians through our Philadelphia seminary, youth ministry, services among the hungry and poor, world hunger and disaster response and many other ministries.

This year parishioners throughout the Brandywine Ministerium are encouraged to join together each Wednesday of Lent as well as Maundy Thursday and Good Friday for **prayer and meditation** that supplements their personal devotions. Our congregation will host *two* services on Good Friday, with hopes that people who are not able to come out in the evening will be able to join in the 2 p.m. worship.

Back to the phrase, "March comes in like a lion and out like a lamb." May the Spirit of God blow through our lives so that as we focus more and more on the "Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," we will be ready to *celebrate* what lies beyond the cross. God was not finished with Jesus on Good Friday. God was just getting started. In the same way, God is not done with you or me. May the Spirit blowing through our lives this season, make space for God to do something in and through us.

175th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION INFORMATION AND A LITTLE **BIT OF HISTORY**

On April 20, 1840, the cornerstone of the first New Jerusalem Church was laid. On October 3 and 4, 1840, the church was dedicated. Because of these dates, the Anniversary committee chose the following dates in 2015 to celebrate 175 years of worship at New Jerusalem Church, now New Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church:

April 19 — 10:00 AM Worship service with Communion. Bishop Zeiser will be our guest preacher to help us celebrate the anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone.

October 4 — 10:00 AM Worship service with Communion. Rev. Michael Reist will be our quest to help us celebrate the anniversary of the dedication of the 1840 church.

The Waiting Game

Life involves lots of waiting. We wait in groups, in lines, in cars. We wait for packages, for the bus, for the sun to rise. We wait in doctors' offices, at the post office, at the DMV. Waiting implies we're at someone else's mercy, but it's also usually linked to hope. Perhaps that's why Paul Tillich called waiting a metaphor for faith. Why would one wait if there weren't the firm belief that the object of one's wait will eventually materialize?

Waiting can be enervating, which is why Isaiah 40:31 is so promising: "They who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." Yet waiting is tough if you have nothing to do while waiting. That's why Jesus, when talking about waiting, also talked about working — work for the night is coming. Sometimes it's less tiring to work than it is to wait.

There's a lot of waiting during Lent. You're waiting for a payoff. You're waiting for the Resurrection. You're waiting for spiritual growth. And then you realize this isn't waiting at all. It's life. It's joy. It's opportunity. It's blessing.




Income Required per Month — Based on 2015 Budget Passed by Congregation

In Like the Spirit

In many places, March is notoriously windy: "In like a lion ...!" Though I don't like the damp chill that's often part of the transition to spring, I love windy days. Something about the air's movement — a gentle breeze or ferocious gale blowing through trees, against the house, in my hair — breeds excitement in me, anticipation that something new is astir.

How fitting that in conversation with Nicodemus, Jesus said, "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit" (John 3:8, NRSV). Like Nicodemus, we fail to comprehend the Spirit of God. But Jesus reminds us that though we can't see the Spirit, we feel his love, see his actions of justice and hear his sounds. These include kind words, bold preaching, weeping for another, shared laughter and songs of praise.


Use this fun family activity to remember to pray for other people.
