

We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Since we have barely started Lent, but Easter will arrive before the end of the month, this is a challenging newsletter to put together. Should there be a black cloth or a white one hanging on the cross? So often we try to avoid the present times, the in-between times, times for reflection. Instead, we want to jump ahead to the next holiday. Barely has school begun than we see ads for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Lent is a time to reflect on the center of our faith: the ministry, suffering, death, and *then* the resurrection of our Lord. In the early church Lent was a time for people who wanted to be baptized to study and prepare to take their places as full members of the family of believers. These people, called *catechumens*, studied the fundamental teachings of the faith in order to be ready to publicly declare in front of the congregation: "I believe!" "I believe in God the Father, Almighty. . . ! I believe in Jesus Christ. . . ! "I believe in the Holy Spirit. . .!" Then, during the darkest hours of the night before Easter, as part of the Easter Vigil, they would shed their old garments, be baptized outside the church, be clothed in new white garments, and, with the entire congregation, enter the darkened church with candles to celebrate the first Easter service and have their first opportunity to commune at the Lord's Table.

"I believe!"

On March 11th our confirmands will travel to Bear Creek Camp to join youth from several other Lutheran congregations on retreat and explore the Apostles Creed where we say "I believe" three times.

"I believe!" we say each Sunday. "I believe! I believe! I believe!" But what does this mean? In a culture which often says, "I believe" when it means "I think", this can be very confusing.

Early in our studies our confirmands discussed the difference between the questions the Bible and our faith address and those addressed by science and history. Science and history deal with theories about the nature of reality which our senses can perceive, questions about "How much? Which kind? Where? How? When?" When new information comes along, we change what we think. People used to be sure the world was flat, the sun revolved around the earth, or that Pluto was a planet. That's changed.

The Bible and our faith address different questions, questions about "who" and "why." Who is responsible for creating and sustaining all of creation? Whom can we ultimately trust and for what? What gives meaning to our lives? Whom shall we serve?

The Apostles' Creed is a statement of faith, about in whom we put our trust. Trust. That is the key word. In the Apostles' Creed we say that we trust the God we know as Father, Son and Holy Spirit: the God who, with great love, created and sustains all that exists; the God who loves each part of that creation, including each of us, so much that God will stop at nothing, not even God's own suffering and death, to bring all the parts of creation back into right relationship with God's self; the God who is more powerful than evil and death and continues to work to build community between humans, God and all creation. This is whom we trust with our whole lives, with everything we have. This is the One who gives meaning to our lives.

Let us pray for our confirmands and for each other during Lent, that as we thoughtfully journey through *these* moments of our lives God's Spirit will help us to deepen our trust in God, so that, in the face of trying times and, especially, on Easter morning we can say, sing and shout, "I believe! I fully trust that in God, goodness *is* stronger than evil, even the evil in which I participate! I fully trust that life in Christ *is* stronger than death! Hallelujah! Praise the Lord!"

U.S.AMEN MISSION TRIP

I was pleasantly surprised when Pr. Doty asked me to write about my mission trip to Costa Rica this past January. My late husband, David Schwoyer, and I joined New Jerusalem in 2004. David and I had discussed joining the senior Peace Corps, but it never came to fruition. So, when a friend of mine started volunteering with the U.S.Amen Mission in Costa Rica, I began to think about joining them.

U.S.Amen was founded in 2002 by Indy Vormbrock as a follow-up to the lifelong AMEN mission work of her late parents, Misael and Amina Lopez. Indy is a Nicaraguan-born U.S. citizen from Houston, TX. Her father began his mission work in Nicaragua and later moved it to Costa Rica. Her mother continued it after his death.

Costa Rica, lying between Nicaragua and Panama, a complete coast-to-coast segment of the Central American isthmus, is a Spanish speaking Roman Catholic nation. With an average temperature of 70° F to 81° F, it has no real summer or winter. It does however have a rainy season from May to November.

I was a member of the "A" Team that goes to Costa Rica after the rainy season to do necessary heavy duty and/or construction work along with sharing the gospel. The gospel is shared via "street-evangelism" and "bible school" for children and adults at *Iglesia Tierra Prometida/*Church of the Promised Land and *Iglesia Christiana de Peters/*The Christian Church of Peters in the very small nearby village of Petres.

U.S.Amen owns property in Grecia ['gray-shia'] which serves as a central gathering point for the mission teams. All meals are served there. Daily reviews are also shared each evening amid a spirit of fellowship. Housing is provided in Grecia. U.S.Amen built *Iglesia Tierra Prometida*, a small church with an attached Sunday school on the property. Last year they installed "indoor plumbing" to replace "The Vormbrock-Walton". This year the Sunday school portion needed the roof repainted along with cement finishing of the indoor and outdoor walls.

In addition to Indy and Tom, the "A" Team consisted of 19 members of three Houston, Texas Baptist churches; and six of us from Pennsylvania. Team members arrived on Friday, New Year's Day. Saturday we boarded a catamaran for Tortuga Island in the Pacific, a "Fun Day" for team building. I was one of two new folks.

Sunday we worshipped at *Iglesia Tierra Prometida*. Members of our group, the Martin's, have a band. All the Texans know some Spanish and had prepared several Spanish hymns for the service. I was able to join in, with the words in front of me and someone next to me with whom I could "lipread". It was fun.

I requested to be assigned to "construction". Nelson had suggested I also try street evangelism because it could really be a new experience, so on Monday morning I went along with the evangelism team and joined the Grecia bible school effort in the afternoon. Tuesday I became part of the cementing crew. We finished cementing by Wednesday, which allowed me to join the Petres Bible school Thursday morning. Friday we organized a field day in the park at Petres. I helped lead finger crocheting of bracelets with beads woven into them.

On Friday evening we worshipped at *Iglesia Christiana de Peters*. The preacher noted our multiculture aspect. As we sang "How Great Thou Art" in Spanish, I found my PA German self singing "Wie Gross Du Bischt" during the chorus. Since some of our team sang in English, it was a truly multi-culture moment!

A little more about street evangelism: Since thievery is a very real problem in this area, buildings and yards everywhere are barred. Therefore, one cannot knock on doors. "UPE" [oo-pay] is the term used to announce one's self as a visitor; which, as street evangelizers, we did from outside the barred entrances.

"Street evangelism" for this English speaking Episcopalian/Lutheran was quite an encounter. Randy would read scripture and our Grecian, Emilio, would interpret. Before we parted, we asked our participants whether they would like to pray, inviting Christ into their lives. Five were interested and willing. One of them, 24-year-old Jesus [hay-suess], provided my "high" of the day. He met us outside the family gate and told us that he had been praying for someone to talk to him about the Lord! Since he did not look well to this 'ole' Mum', you will find him on our prayer list. We conversed with two other men on the street. One of them had quite a discussion with Randy. Like the others, they both prayed willingly before we left.

I thank the Lord for the privilege of having served on the mission trip. I have been invited to return and will be praying about that possibility. I also was surprised to learn that the March "team" is a Texas Lutheran church.



Did You Know?

PELICAN

In the Middle Ages, the pelican came to represent Jesus' sacrifice of his blood for the

world. According to legend, a mother pelican, in times of famine, would pluck open her chest and feed her young with her own blood. An alternate myth was that she fed her dying young with her



blood to revive them, losing her own life in the process. The depiction of a pelican with a drop of blood on her chest is called "the pelican in her piety."

TAKING UP THE CROSS

"That's her cross to bear," it's said of someone's hardship or inconvenience. The challenge might be as serious as poverty or as trivial as crabby neighbors. However, when Jesus called people to "take up their cross," he didn't mean it that way. Nor was he referring to anyone imposing suffering on another.

When Jesus said, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take

up their cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24 and parallels), he spoke of a radical new way to engage a society that more often called people to take up



swords and fight for self-preservation. He called people to peace, not violence—and from being self-focused to following him.

That is also Jesus' call today. The cross isn't a euphemism that lets us dismiss someone's suffering. We don't appoint someone else to bear it. When we choose the cross, we do so for ourselves in response to Jesus' invitation that, one way or another, ultimately leads through death to new life.

DELIVER US

We sing and say "hosanna" every Palm Sunday but hardly ever in between. So what does that word mean?

That first Palm Sunday, crowds spread their

cloaks before Jesus as people had before Jehu to proclaim him king (2 Kings 9:13). They waved palm branches in greeting—a



celebration (Leviticus 23:40). And, of course, they shouted, "Hosanna!"

This was an exclamation of "a people in distress [addressing] their king or their god," explains Bible scholar William Barclay. Drawn from Psalm 118:25, hosanna is Aramaic for "save now." By the time of Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem, Barclay says, hosanna may have "become to some extent only a cry of welcome and of acclamation, like 'Hail!'; but essentially it is a people's cry for deliverance and for help in the day of their trouble."

"Hosanna!" is the plea of an oppressed people to the one they recognize as their true king: Jesus, their Savior.

In honor of his 10th year Pr. Sigurjónsson suggested coming to NEPA to begin a motorcycle Mass here! So he and a group of Icelanders will come this June to help lead and guide the Motorcylce Mass.

The vision and hope is that this will be a worship-centered event focused on bringing people together in the name of Jesus to break down walls and stereotypes: from minorities to ecumenical, cultural, or marginalized peoples. Planned for the weekend of June 25-26, the event will include music, food, and fellowship, all centered around the worship and praise of God.

The hope is to hold the event at St. Paul, Dallas and in the surrounding community in connection with the Dream Ride, a motorcycle ride/fundraiser that supports the Special Olympics which last year raised over one million dollars.


