Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Paradise. We watched in horror as Paradise burned. We can only imagine how its residents felt and what they continue to experience. Ashes. 85 people dead. More than 80 percent of the homes destroyed. Ashes. For many of the residents, everything they had had been reduced to ashes.

But the ashes didn't just affect them, they blew eastward. Even 3,000 miles away, some of the grey weather we experienced in the weeks that followed, was attributed to ashes from Paradise and the surrounding area.

Paradise. When God created Eden it was also called Paradise, a place where everything and every creature lived in harmony with its Creator as well as everything and everyone else. That was God's plan, but something happened to disrupt Paradise (we call it sin) and that something spread like wildfire throughout creation and especially between humans. Ashes. It seemed that God's plan had been reduced to ashes.

Last fall Shane Edwards lost everything he had in Paradise. He posted a picture of all that remained: part of his fireplace. His friend, Shane Grammer, saw something else: a blank canvas and asked permission to paint that fireplace "to help people see beyond the burned building, to see that people like him cared—that Paradise could be a thing of beauty again." (Cathy Free, Morning Call, February 9, 2019) Grammer painted a mural of a woman in black and white and referenced Isaiah 61:3-4, . . .to provide for those who mourn in Zion—to give them a garland (a thing of beauty) instead of ashes."

Soon others in the town offered places for Grammer to create beautiful black and white murals.

Lent is a time when we ponder ashes: all that is broken, out of harmony, destroyed. Lent is a time when we ponder the ashes of our lives and our world, of our hopes and our dreams, while at the same time we ponder how God has acted and continues to intervene so that we and the world are not left in ashes but are rebuilt into the thing of beauty he designed from the beginning. We ponder Jesus.

One of my favorite hymns for Lent is called Ashes. It was written by Tom Conry.

We rise again from ashes, from the good we've failed to do. We rise again from ashes, to create ourselves anew. If all our world is ashes, then must our lives be true, An offering of ashes, an offering to you.

As we journey through this Lenten season, may God also grant us the eyes to not only see the ashes of our lives and our world, but to also see the beauty God is bringing forth from what looks hopeless. As we offer God our ashes, may we let God not only use them to create something beautiful, but use us to share God's vision and promises with others.

> We offer you our failures, we offer you attempts; The gifts so fully given, the dreams not fully dreamt. Give our stumblings direction, give our visions wider view, An offering of ashes, an offering to you.

ASHES

We begin our Lenten observance with Ash Wednesday when those who desire it can have ashes in the sign of the cross placed upon their foreheads.

Sally Foster-Fulton tells us that there are many theories about where the tradition of the ashes began.



Some say it represents our mortality and reminds us of the story of creation when God breathed into the dust, and out we came: "From dust you have come, and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:19)

Some say it is a symbol of mourning and has its origin in times long ago when the cooking fire was in the living quarters, and the hearth needed constant tending so that the ashes didn't cover everything in the house. When there was sorrow at the center of a household and folk were preoccupied with that overwhelming event, the tragedy would be obvious in people's ashen appearance. Gradually, people intentionally wore the ashes as a sign of sorrow. ("Resources for Ash Wednesday" Wild Goose Publications. Used with permission.)

We read in scripture that when people were in mourning or when they became aware of and repented of their sin, they would sit in sackcloth (think burlap) and ashes.

Nobody really knows where the tradition began, but the symbolism of using ashes is profound. What is even more profound is how God in Jesus responded and continues to respond in mercy to those who acknowledge and respond to God's call to repentance.



CHALICE AND CROSS

The chalice with a cross rising from it symbolizes

Christ's obedient suffering, even unto death. The cross is called a "passion cross," with pointed ends that represent suffering. We remember that in the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus begged his Father that the "cup" of suffering be taken from him. But ultimately, he prayed, "



from him. But ultimately, he prayed, "Not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39, NIV).

HOLISTIC STEWARDSHIP FOR LENT

For centuries Lutherans have observed Lent with passionate devotion and prayerful attention to spiritual disciplines. These faith practices strengthen our souls and open our hearts to the resurrected Christ at Easter.

This year, try developing a sense of holistic stewardship for your life. Stewardship, of course, looks at how we use not just our financial abundance but <u>all</u> the blessings that God has given us—our health, our family and friends, our faith, our time, our intelligence, and so on.

Just as holistic medicine takes a "big picture" view of physical health as a dynamic interconnection of our body's systems, holistic stewardship helps us see and appreciate all our gifts in relationship to one another. For instance, how does your stewardship of time interact with your stewardship of your relationships or health? How might more-thoughtful stewardship of your time improve your relationships or your health? How might better stewardship of time, relationships and health improve your financial abundance?

When you examine your stewardship of these and all your gifts in dynamic interconnection with one another, you can find more meaning and purpose as a disciple of Jesus.

To get there, for the days of Lent focus on just five major categories of the blessings God has given you easily remembered by the shorthand word FAITH.

Family and friends – nurturing relationships Abundance – finance and material possessions Intelligence – your mind and special talents Time – living fully 24/7 Health – physical and emotional wellness

Spend 15 minutes every day to prayerfully ponder and meditate on these FAITH blessings. A prayer journal or notebook may help you process and connect.

- Take stock of your blessings in each category, thanking God for them.
- Reflect on how they interrelate to give you joy and purpose and meaning.
- Ask God to help you use these gifts more wisely and fully for God's purposes.
- Imagine God blessing and enriching your life as you learn to steward these gifts in a way that they will support and enhance one another.

This Lent, let holistic stewardship help you envision your gifts and life more fully in God's reality, the reality called the Reign of God. It's the Reign that Jesus preached and proclaimed, and that he brought to fulfillment with the victory over death that we celebrate at Easter.



Café Esperanza - Domestic Hunger Grant Recipient



Café Esperanza, a pay-what-you-can model community café, is scheduled to open in late Spring 2019. It is our vision that all people, regardless of financial means, deserve an opportunity to eat delicious, nutritious food. The café will serve breakfast and lunch, utilizing local, organic and seasonal foods as much as possible, highlighting the delicious products of local farmers.

Located in a densely populated neighborhood in the Northwest section of Reading, a city with a poverty rate of 43%, Café Esperanza will provide a place for people of all walks

of life to gather and get to know one another. Most of the labor will be provided by volunteers, including those who are offered a chance to exchange an hour of work for a meal, as well as others who simply enjoy serving their neighbors in this way. There will also be a job training aspect of our work. Young people will learn all aspects of food service, including the opportunity to receive barista training.

We are grateful for our recent grant from the ELCA Domestic Hunger program, as well as support from this Synod, the East Berks Mission District, the Reading Lutheran Parish, the Berks County Community Foundation, and many congregations and individual partners. The goal of the ELCA's World Hunger Appeal is to work toward "a just world where all are fed." Addressing this goal includes not only providing food for hungry people, but perhaps more importantly empowering people to provide a brighter future for themselves through community development, job training, and advocating for a more equitable distribution of the earth's resources.

In addition to supporting projects in more than 60 foreign countries, the World Hunger Appeal also administers a Domestic Hunger Grant program. Last year 77 grants were awarded to ministries and organizations in the United States that both address the root causes of hunger and provide relief services for those in need. Our synod received the two grants featured in this edition of *Synod News*.

Domestic Hunger Grant applications will be accepted again in 2019. Please check the program's web site - <u>elca.org/domestichungergrants</u> - to learn about the process and timeline for submitting an application. The web site can also give you more information about ELCA World Hunger's strategic priorities, at home and around the world.

Domestic Hunger Grant Recipient Easton Hunger Coalition



Easton, along with the neighboring cities of Bethlehem and Allentown, comprises the area known as the Lehigh Valley, which is the third most populous region in Pennsylvania. While recently Easton has enjoyed a economic rebirth, largely on high-end restaurants, artisan food shops, and a hugely successful farmers' market, too many households rely on emergency food from pantries and free meal centers. Over 50% of the area school children receive the federally funded free/reduced meal, and close to 1/3 of the Easton households self-identified in the most recent census as earning below the poverty level.

In 2014 a group of activists came together to form the Easton Hunger Coalition with the urging of a member of Arndt's Lutheran Church. The church has a long-standing relationship with food and community, although it is located outside of the Easton downtown. Persistent engagement around hunger relief guided the congregation to support multiple programs to help households reduce food insecurity.

The Coalition applied for an ELCA Domestic Hunger Grant to strengthen the organization; increase collaboration; and develop new tools to increase compassionate response to hunger, reduce stigmas associated with poverty, and to support self-advocacy



programming and a significant public awareness program. Arndt's Lutheran Church as fiscal agent for the grant will support and guide this important work over the next three years. Their goal is "Hunger-Free in '23" for the Easton area, enabling a healthy community where all have access to nutritious food.
