THE MISSION OF NEW JERUSALEM LUTHERAN CHURCH:

We are a group of people who gather together in friendship and love to worship God, to spread God's Word, and to care for God's people.



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Several times as I have been thinking about this letter, it has been pouring outside: April showers! That phrase, of course, reminds me of an old joke, a groaner: "If April showers bring May flowers, what do May flowers bring?" Answer: "Pilgrims" (I told you it was a groaner!) Of course that joke comes across better when spoken than when written because it is a play on the "Mayflower," the vessel which brought the pilgrims to Plymouth, Massachusetts. Still, it yields a way into thoughts for this month: life as a pilgrimage.

A pilgrimage is a type of journey undertaken by individuals and groups. It is usually undertaken thoughtfully, with a goal in mind, a goal that may be a specific geographic place or a process, such as wanting to deepen one's spiritual life. Those who undertake the pilgrimage know they are heading out into the unknown and anticipate times of challenge, maybe deprivation or struggle, as well as surprises. They also anticipate that they will grow during the process and find some kind of "reward" or "enrichment" for having embarked on the endeavor. They expect the pilgrimage will have an impact, that it may even profoundly change their lives.

We as New Jerusalem Lutheran Church are marking the 175th year of this congregation's pilgrimage. Many of the phrases in Bishop Zeiser's sermon on April 19th speak to that image. He told us that early on the congregation's experience "made it clear that *there was no looking back.*" He spoke of the resiliency and spiritual energy that was needed during the journey. He reminded us that at no point, especially not today, could survival be taken for granted. The bishop spoke of how coming together in this place helps us define ourselves in ways that bring joy and meaning. He urged us to *not* consider this celebration as "a tribute to what has been the best that New Jerusalem will ever be." Instead, he told us to see this anniversary as a celebration of and a recommitment to "what the gospel can accomplish in uncertain circumstances," and to carry on our heritage of being "agents of transformation."

Just as the flowers of May will not blossom abundantly unless watered in April, so our spirits and ministry will not flourish unless fed by the gifts of the Spirit which include the waters of baptism,

bread and wine, word and community. The *Mayflower* with its pilgrims could not have reached Plymouth without the waters of the Atlantic or favorable winds, so our pilgrimage is not possible without the Spirit (wind) of the Holy One. This month we will remember our baptism each Sunday and celebrate the gift of the Spirit on Pentecost.

May God continue to bless our pilgrimage.

175 Years...This far by Faith...Still on the Journey

April 19, 2015 - Celebrated the 175 years of the placement of the first cornerstone in April 20, 1840.

We were pleased to have Bishop Samuel Zeiser, Bishop of the Northeastern PA Synod, Pastor James Dunn, pastor of New Jerusalem United Church of Christ, and Pastor Ruth Doty of New Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church with us. We sincerely thank each one of the pastors and Bishop Zeiser for working together to lead us in a beautiful and meaningful worship celebration. Bishop Zeiser, in his sermon reminded us that, "Today's event is a sign that God's love is actively present in our world because this congregation takes seriously its faith and its mission". Bishop Zeiser's sermon also stated how this celebration today points us to the past in order to give thanks for the people whose perseverance and resilience has brought this congregation to our time and gifted us with the responsibility to carry out its ministry in a new day. He said, in effect, 'You have found that coming here helps you define yourself and in being together, you discover a joy and meaning that you do not have by yourself and that is what it means to be part of the Body of Christ.'

It was GREAT to share this with our UCC neighbors and friends, our church family, former church members, and friends of our congregation. Worship attendance was 101! How great was that?!! Approximately 90 shared in the luncheon which followed worship.

We give thanks to God for the blessing of newfound friends, laughter and reminiscing over lunch. We felt God's blessing while browsing displays of confirmation pictures dating back to April 15, 1905, as well as the picture board displays, newsletter articles, books and an old bible, and miscellaneous memorabilia. We felt blessed when looking at a stitched replica of our church building made by Susan Schlenker for our celebration and to grace our church walls later.

Some of the MATURE New Jerusalem Lutheran and UCC members were reminiscing about the time period when the Children's Sunday School had outgrown classroom space. One remembrance in particular was the removal of ground under what is now the offices on the first floor to increase basement space for more Sunday School rooms. Some remembered holding Sunday School throughout the excavating process by placing sheets or something like that on the ground walls that were showing because of "work in progress". One UCC member reminded us that this excavation was a MANUAL labor of love, pick and shovel.

There were MANY hands and hours given for the Glory of God to make this event possible. Many thanks are due to many people, including the Anniversary Committee, Worship & Music Committee, especially Faye Dey as our organist and Choir Director, and Helen Schellenberger for directing our Bell Choir. This list of thanks will no doubt expand as we move forward with our celebratory year. I don't want to miss anyone.

It has been a privilege and FUN to learn more about our forefathers and our Church history by serving on the Anniversary Committee. Because of space, look for a continuation of this article in next month's newsletter.

Taking a quote from Pastor Ruth's Salt article, "In thankfulness to our faithful God and the hard work of those who have gone before us, we celebrate that we have come this far by faith, and are excited to still be on the journey."

Since we have seen how God's Spirit works through this program to bring healing and growth not only for campers, but also to communities and members of the volunteer teams, we hope you will join us in this exciting work by:

- 3) Making tied fleece blankets for campers.


SPECIAL FREE WILL OFFERING MAY 10 & 17


Triquetra

Since you asked:

What was that the bishop was carrying at our anniversary service? It's called a crozier. And, yes, it looks like a shepherd's staff.

A bishop's crozier is a pastoral staff that is conferred on bishops (and abbots) at their installation. In the West,



the top of the crozier is curved to mimic the look of a shepherd's crook which symbolizes his pastoral care of the people entrusted to him. The crozier is a reminder of the bishop's need to keep watch over this entire flock.

Some of you may have noticed Luther's seal within the curve of the staff. Watch this newsletter for more details about the particular crozier that Bishop Zeiser carried.

The Amazing Power of Pentecost

When Jesus was arrested, his apostles had fled in fear. Peter found himself in a situation where fear compelled him to deny that he even knew Christ. All of Christ's followers were in hiding—broken-hearted, totally confused, feeling absolutely hopeless.

Then, on the Jewish Day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came mightily upon them.

Suddenly, they were empowered. Immediately, they were galvanized. Right then and there, they were filled with enormous courage. Boldly, forthrightly,



not far from the site of the crucifixion, they began to proclaim that Christ had been raised from the dead and that he was most certainly the long-awaited Messiah.

The fire of the Holy Spirit burned so vividly within them that people from all over came to see and hear what the apostles were claiming. Peter told them the story of Christ as best he could. Then Peter offered his hearers the opportunity of becoming Christ's followers. Amazingly, three thousand people responded to the offer at that very minute. (See Acts 2:41) We call that event the birthday of the Church.

Suzanne de Dietrich writes this about Pentecost: 'A great wave of faith and love swept through this newborn community; people gave their hearts to God, and shared their possessions with their brethren. These Christians could not keep silent. Their joyful liberty had broken down all the walls behind which people would like to keep them; no prison could silence them.' The power of God upon them and within them was truly astounding.

STEWARDS OF CREATION

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture has asked us to be on the lookout for a new invasive insect. Lycorma delicatula, also known as lanternfly. This pest has the potential to severely affect the health of

trees and vines, especially grape vines. It has also been found on apple and peach trees, hardwoods and pines. All of



these plants are important in Pennsylvania's economy. (Did you know that our states ranks is the number one exporter for the U.S. in hardwoods, number four in Christmas tree production, and fifth in number of jobs related to grape production?) Clearly we have much to lose if this pest is not eradicated.

Parts of Berks County are under quarantine due to this pest. We are asked to participate in its elimination by 1) learning to recognize and report spotted lanternfly, and 2) volunteering to band trees. We must also be very careful not to move outdoor items from this quarantine area and learn to check for and eliminate spotted lanternfly egg masses, adults and nymphs.
