# Dear Friends,

In a recent Confirmation Class meeting with Diane and Justin Keller we began our study of The Acts of the Apostles (aka Acts) which picks up the story that began with the Gospels. We read in our workbook:

"All the new followers of Jesus needed ways to get together to share their experiences and encourage one another at a time when it was truly risky to be a Christian. God's solution was the church."

So, we asked ourselves, "What does being the church include?" "What would you say?"

We do not live in a time and place where it is necessarily risky to be a Christian, but we *always* live in a time when we risk losing sight of what it means to be church. We know from a favorite Sunday School hymn,

"The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is a people."<sup>2</sup>

Our confirmation book goes on to say that for the people who came to believe in Jesus,

"building the church often meant changing their ideas about who was included and what it meant to follow Jesus." 1

Changing ideas about who is included and what it means to follow Jesus has been an ongoing challenge for the church and takes a new twist today. We are not only challenged to expand our ideas about *who* is included, but also about *how* folks are included.

At the beginning of the pandemic our leaders made a decision not to gather for worship in the building. This decision was made because it was the way to care for ourselves and our neighbors. (The government never ordered us not to meet, though it did advise against gatherings.) As a result of not meeting in our building, we not only figured out other ways to meet such as Zoom and communion on the parking lot, we also discovered these new forms enabled some folks could be part of the worshipping community who have not been able to enter the building because of health or transportation concerns. At the same time we have been aware that many among us long to return to worship in our building, in the place that holds so many memories, sights and sounds that enhance our experience of being in the presence of God.

Each adaptation for gathering and worship has its limitations and challenges. These times call not only for adaptation, but for *continuous* adaptation and innovation.<sup>3</sup> And so, on Pentecost Sunday, May 23<sup>rd</sup>, we will again offer a short worship service in the building. This will be followed by communion on the parking lot, so that as many as possible can participate in the Lord's Supper.

We, like early Christians and the church throughout the ages, are challenged to be open to changing our ideas not only about what it means to follow Jesus and who is to be included, but also *how* they are to be included. How do we honor, rejoice with, and provide for those for whom worship in the building is not only possible, but deeply meaningful? How do we continue to include as full participants in the worshipping community those who cannot enter the building? (Currently there are at least 30 on my active "shut-in" list.) How do we expand this sense of full participation to those who do not have the technology or skill to join in things like Zoom? How can we continue to touch, to reach out to and show hospitality to those who are hungry for Christian community and have or might be willing to try out following our worship offered digitally?

Like other servant leaders, as I seek to provide care for each member of our parish and those God brings to my attention, I come up against limits. While focusing in one direction, I risk seeming to neglect another. Please know that I and other leaders in the congregation care for each of you, as well as for sharing God's love and good news beyond our membership. We pray for God's Spirit to guide and inspire us. We welcome ideas and offers to help prepare and seek innovative ways to help us followers of Jesus get together to share our experiences, encourage one another, and worship our creative God whose love has no limits.

## **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

The following items were discussed and decisions made at our council meeting on April 12:

- Rita Kayhart, representative for our Boy Scout Troop and Pack #585, provided council with an update as to how the scouts are doing.
- Council agreed to hold in-person worship on Sunday, May 23, Pentecost Sunday. Plans for how future worship services will be held are still in progress.
- A meeting has been scheduled with Pastor Rachael Dietz, the Executive Associate to the Bishop for Leadership, to allow her to assist us in discerning the ministry to which God is calling us as a congregation.

## WORSHIP AT NEW JERUSALEM

At their meeting, members of the Worship and Music Committee discussed in-person worship and made the decision to worship in the church building on Sunday, May 23, which is Pentecost Sunday. As was our practice in the fall, this will be a short service and we will be following social distancing guidelines. The service will be immediately followed with communion on the parking lot so that those who are not able to enter the building can at least share in the Lord's Supper.

# **Communion on the Parking Lot**

A healing service including communion will be held Saturday, May 1, at 5:00 p.m. In addition, on May 23 the 10:00 a.m. worship begun in the building will be concluded by sharing communion on the parking lot at 11:00 a.m.

# REMINDER ABOUT WORSHIP IN THE BUILDING

Please be assured that we will practice safe reopening procedures. Here are some guidelines to help us:

- Please use the entrance ramp to the old door.

# THE PAST IS THE PAST. NOTHING AND NO ONE WILL QUITE GO BACK TO "NORMAL" — AND THAT CAN BE A GOOD THING.

Yes, many options that were available to us before the pandemic and were slammed shut in 2020 are now opening up, but most of us realize some things will never be as they were. So, what can help us deal realistically?

# Pastor Carey Nieuwof writes,

They say it takes 21 days (or 66 days, depending on who you read) to form a habit." [The pandemic has already passed 365.] That means a lot of new habits have been formed. Think about how much your patterns and the patterns of those you know have shifted in the last year. From work, to schooling, to shopping and eating, to travel and how you entertain yourself and your family — so much has shifted. Multiply the new and shifted habits by millions of people and you'll quickly realize that normal has changed a lot in the last year. Going back to normal only works if normal still exists.

The crisis of the pandemic has accelerated the rate of change in our culture.

As much as you may wish that weren't true... ignoring it, pretending it's not happening and arguing it shouldn't be the case will not reverse it.<sup>1</sup>

But there can be some good news. Accelerated change is pushing us to re-evaluate what we are doing. Do you spot the root of the word value in that sentence? The accelerated change is pushing us to compare what we are doing with our values, to ask what is really important. Just as many folks have taken the extra time at home to clean out clutter, the changes that have occurred are also giving us an opportunity to shed what is not working well or no longer important to do, to focus our energy on what better matches our values and situation, and to try new ways of doing things. Pastor Nieuwof also notes that home is likely to become the new hub. Instead of running here and there, many are and may continue to discover the many gifts of family life and work to strengthen their relationships.

So here's the deal: when it comes to dealing with change, we have choices. We can deny it is happening. We can spend our time and energy trying to recreate or revert to the past. We can admit change is happening and sigh in resignation. We

can adapt to it. And/or we can see the change, anticipate future changes and innovate. This doesn't mean that we won't grieve the loss of what was comfortable, of what we were used to, but it does mean that we do not have to be stuck in grief.

So let's let the past be the past. Let's celebrate and savor what was good about it. Let's admit and learn from what was not good. Let's sift out what might still be useful and true to our faith and our values. Let's try things out and learn from what doesn't work. And let's live as people of the resurrection, as people of hope.





# BRANDYWINE FOOD PANTRY NEEDS (updated as of January 19, 2021)

In the light of concerns about increased food needs in response to COVID-19 and possible challenges of delivering items to the food bank – please consider a generous monetary donation. We will keep you posted with information from the food pantry. You can make out a check to "Brandywine Food Pantry," and mail it to Brandywine Food Pantry, c/o St. Peter's United Church of Christ, 122 W. Franklin St., Topton, PA, 19562.

Donated items in "much" need right now: coffee, fruit juices, sugar, flour, mayonnaise, ketchup, spaghetti sauce, ramen noodles or cup of noodles, beef stew, Chicken-ala-King, canned meat (such as tuna, chicken breast or Spam), Chef Boyardee style canned items (such as beefaroni, lasagna, etc.), instant potatoes, pasta or rice sides, snacks of all kinds (cookies, chips, pretzels, pudding, etc.), shampoo, bar soap, body wash, and laundry detergent. We do not currently need: corn, green beans, mixed vegetables, or tomato soup.

The pantry is always in need of the following items:

Canned fruits: pears, mandarin oranges, fruit cocktail, applesauce, etc.

Canned vegetables: creamed corn, sweet peas, carrots, beets, sliced potatoes, yams

Canned goods: diced tomatoes, tomato sauce Condiments: yellow and brown mustard, pickles, salad dressings, vinegar, cooking oil

What comes to mind when you hear the word *Pentecost?* Many people think of a mighty wind, tongues of fire and multiple languages. But Acts 2

# WORTH CELEBRATING


Jesus commands us to be his witnesses. This craft is a reminder to reach out to all our "circles."
