

For all the saints

Saints.

How often we think of saints as only those who have died in the Lord, as in "the sainted (dead) Mr. Jones." Or we think of them as extra holy people, as in "she must be a saint to put up with that!"

In the Apostles Creed, when we proclaim to one another that we believe in the communion (fellowship) of saints, we are referring to all those, *living as well as those who have died*, whom the Holy Spirit has called and enabled to put their trust in the Triune God, to know their need for forgiveness and to accept the grace of God's forgiveness,

So "saints" include the living and the dead.

In November, particularly on November 1, we celebrate *all* the saints. As we gather and as we come forward to share Christ's meal, we can "see" and "feel" not only those who are with us in body, but also those whom we have known and heard of who now "rest in the Lord." Some describe this as experiencing a "thin" place, where the distinction between life as we know it and what is beyond thins out.

For All the Saints

On November 8th we will hear the gospel story of the widow who gave her all and also learn about the saints of "Widow's Might" in Arusha, Tanzania. There will be a time after the service to view and purchase handicrafts from Widow's Might. On November 14th the saints of this congregation and the wider community will gather to install me as the pastor of this congregation. The next day, November 15th, the saints of our congregation will again gather stewards of God's blessings to consider and vote on the budget for the coming year. On November 25th saints in our local area will gather at Hope Bowers to give thanks together for God's rich blessings. And on November 29th we join saints around the world to begin our journey into the Advent season.

We are *all* called as saints, recipients of God's grace and called to proclaim and serve God with our daily lives. We are *all* called to be saints, from the newest baby to the eldest member. Our roles, how we follow God, will vary according to person and will change through our lifetimes, but whatever role to which God calls is important to God and God's church.

Give thanks for God's saints! Gather with us as often as you can to help us better be the communion/the community of saints!


OFFICE CLOSED - The church office will be closed on Thursday, November 26, in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

HELPING YOUNGER MEMBERS GET USED TO CHURCH

A number of parents have mentioned to me that they don't bring their children to church because they don't sit still and might wander or disturb others. The speaker at a conference I attended recently reminded us that children learn to participate in worship the same way they learn other things, gradually and through exposure and repetition.

Even adults can find attending an event to be daunting for adults if they are not familiar with what goes on. So let's explore together how we can introduce and incorporate children into our worshipping community. Would bringing them to the first part—say through the first hymn or the first reading and then leaving before they get too antsy be a start? That way they aren't "rewarded" for bad behavior, just gradually introduced to what our "family" does when it gets together. On my part, I will do what I can to explain a little bit of what is going on and help the children become more comfortable. In addition, bringing children to Sunday School and social events can help them get to know and become more comfortable with other members of our "family" and come to feel that they are a part.

WE HONOR OUR VETERANS

On Veterans Day we honor men and women who have served and sacrificed in one of America's armed services. The holiday is also meant to highlight America's quest for world peace and our nation's desire for justice and freedom throughout the world - our nation's higher goals.

Veterans Day is actually rooted in Armistice Day. On November 11, 1918, America and her allies met with German leaders to sign a truce ending World War 1. In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson decided that our nation should remember with gratitude the end of that war and honor those who served in the military. He called the holiday, Armistice Day. Armistice means "truce."

In his proclamation the president wrote that Armistice Day was an "opportunity - given to America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations."

The name Armistice Day was kept until 1954 when Congress changed the name to Veterans Day honoring veterans of every era. President Eisenhower called on all citizens to observe the day remembering the sacrifices of veterans and "the task of promoting an enduring peace."

CONFIRMATION CLASS HAS BEGUN - Can You Keep Up With our Youth?

On October 11th, 8 youth and two pastors met for the first confirmation class. Wow! Pastor Liz and Pastor Ruth were amazed at the observations and questions raised by the confirmands! This is going to be an exciting ride!

We were encouraged on our way by the Sunday School children who popped in to "make a joyful noise."

So, what will we be studying? We've already started learning about the Bible, how it is a collection of books and how faithful people through the ages have agreed and disagreed about what should be included in the *canon*. (Note, that is spelled with one "n." It means what has been judged to be accepted as legitimately belonging in the Bible.) For homework the youth were assigned to read the first three chapters of *The Story* which essentially covers the entire book of Genesis. (Did you know that the name "Genesis" means "beginning," as in "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth," the very first words of the Bible.)

So, can you keep up with our youth? You can read what they are assigned in *The Story* or read the book of Genesis in your Bible. Their next assignment will cover chapters 4, 5 and 6 which summarizes the book of Exodus.


I'M GRATEFUL FOR...

October 19th Meeting

- ➤ The Mutual Ministry Committee continues to work on the job description for the custodian.
- ➤ Council approved a motion that the remaining money in the Robert and Verna Memorial Fund, previously authorized only for restoration of the chandeliers, also be used to cover the expense of installing the chandeliers and the new lights.
- ► The committee to update the constitution will meet the week of October 25.
- ► In light of now having a Protection from Abuse policy in place, Council approved a motion to add supplemental insurance to cover sexual misconduct.
- ► As stewards who understand that we are members, not only of our local congregation, but of the wider church, council amended the benevolence section of the proposed budget for 2016 to include \$2000 as our congregation's pledge of support to the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. These funds not only support ministries on our territory, but 45% is passed on to support the mission of the national church. Offering envelopes for 2016 will include a line to indicate what portion is to be designated for "benevolence." Should the amount received for the benevolence line item exceed what is budgeted, council will decide how to distribute the excess.

Thankful Hearts


Make table decorations that serve as Thanksgiving conversation-starters.

What you need:

- Paper and pencil
- Scissors
- · Cloth or felt
- Needle and thread
- Sewing machine (optional)
- Fiber fill, cotton balls or rice
- Adult help

What you do:

- Cut out a heart pattern (any size) on paper. Allow 1/4" for a seam if you'll be using a sewing machine.
- Cut out material hearts, placing pieces right sides out if sewing by hand and right sides together if using a machine.
- For hand-sewing, use a running stitch or an overcast stitch. Leave an opening for stuffing.
- 4. With a machine, sew along a 1/4" seam, allowing a 1" opening so you can turn the heart inside out and insert stuffing. Trim close to seam but don't cut stitching.
- Fill with stuffing. Sew the opening shut by hand.
- Put a heart at each place setting. Before dinner, have guests pick theirs up and say why they have a thankful heart.
