

1 Thessalonians 1:2

Throughout the year we will have the opportunity to help fill backpacks with items that local food-insecure elementary children can take home with for meals on weekends. God provides these and many other opportunities for works of faith and labors of love.

On November 19th we have the opportunity to give thanks with our brothers and sisters of New Jerusalem United Church of Christ, for their many years as a faith community. YOU'VE GOT MAIL — 1 THESSALONIANS

Through the middle of November and again in December our second lesson will be from Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, one of the earliest Christian writings that we have.

Who were the Thessalonians? On his second missionary journey Paul visited the city of Thessalonica, an important Greek port city famous for its loyalty to the Roman emperor. Acts 16 and 17 give us a picture of what it was like when Paul introduced the gospel in places where it had never been heard before.

1 Thessalonians is Paul's letter to the young church. This association of Christians were living in the midst of a society, including friends and neighbors, which was not only unsupportive, but thought the values and behaviors of these believers were a threat to their way of life, a threat to the emperor and empire. Consequently the believers were experiencing various kinds and degrees of rejection and persecution. So Paul is writing to show his care and concern, to clarify some of the questions the young church was struggling with, and to encourage them.

As you read through this short letter, you can't help but notice how much Paul loves this church. "We give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering. . .your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ."(1: 2-3) "We longed with great eagerness to see you face to face." (2:17) "How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy we feel before our God because of you?" You can't miss the tenderness with which he addresses them and the many ways he tries to encourage them in the face of doubts and sufferings. And, you can't miss Paul's joy: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God. . . ." (5:16)

As we read from this letter, let us also rejoice in God's gift of fellow believers and give thanks. Let us also look for ways that we, like Paul, can encourage one another as we seek to live as God's beloved. Our society may not seem like it is actively persecuting the message of Jesus, but it presents many subtle and not so subtle challenges.

A note in *The Student Bible*, New Revised Standard Version, states:

The church in Thessalonica, like many of Paul's churches, was born amid violent upheaval. An angry mob took offence at Paul's work and chased him out of town, accusing him of "turning the world upside down" (Acts 17:6). Generally, people do not start riots without a good reason, and in Paul's case they had one. Almost everywhere he visited, an enthusiastic church came to life, provoking the jealousy of [the current religious] and Roman establishments.

May God continue to help us grow to be "an enthusiastic church come to life" through which God is "turning the world upside down", bringing life for all closer and closer to the way God always wanted it to be.

GENEROSITY GROWS FROM GRATITUDE

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances! — 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Would you like to be a more generous person, possessing a generous heart? Then try embracing gratitude as a spiritual practice. Since Thanksgiving is on the 23rd of this month, November is a great time to give it a try.

Gratitude and generosity go together naturally. Whether you're a millionaire or just middle-class, when you are grateful for what you have, you'll likely be happier and more satisfied with your life. You will tend to see the world through the eyes of abundance and be more likely to give of yourself.

And it has nothing to do with wealth. Some of the most generous people you meet are poor, and some of the wealthiest people in the world are stingy. But generous people, rich or poor, tend to look at their lives with gratitude.

How can we embrace gratitude as a spiritual practice? Paul gives us a good start in the Scripture verse above. If we reverse his order, things flow pretty well:

Give thanks in all circumstances: It's easy to give thanks when everything is going along swimmingly, but much tougher when we face problems (and we all do). Notice that Paul says give thanks <u>IN</u> all circumstances, not <u>FOR</u> all circumstances. In hard times, we can be grateful for the parts of our life that are going well and for the resources, relationships and faith that will help us get through.

Pray without ceasing: You can communicate with God anytime and anywhere. Pray in the shower, in your car, on the beach, on your lunch break, at a stop light, in a grocery line. God hears all your prayers, whether spoken, whispered, or just thought. So pray without ceasing.

Rejoice always: Look for everyday celebrations every day. Do you have hot water? A car? Clean socks? High-speed Internet? Enough to eat? Friends? Loving relationships? Then rejoice!

For a disciplined approach, keep a journal of your daily thanks, or a "gratitude list" that you can pray over every night and revise as necessary. Or just make it a point every day to enter into a time of thankful prayer.

Commit to a disciplined approach for a period of time – say, from Thanksgiving to Christmas. And it's a good bet that your developing "attitude of gratitude" will result in your developing a generous heart and seeing the world through a lens of abundance.

- □ Seven **sponges**, including one large (no cellulose sponges due to mold issues)
- □ One scrub brush
- □ Eighteen **reusable cleaning towels** (e.g. Easy Wipes)
- □ One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of **liquid laundry detergent**
- □ One 16-28 oz. bottle of **liquid disinfectant dish** soap
- □ One 12-16 oz. bottle of **household cleaner** that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- ☐ One package of 48-50 clothespins
- □ **Clothesline**, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- □ Five **dust masks**
- ☐ Two pairs of non-surgical latex gloves
- □ One pair **work gloves**, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- □ 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon **trash bags** on a roll and removed from carton
- □ One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent

All cleaning items must be new.

INSIGHT ON CONFIRMATION

Many churches celebrate confirmation, a practice with biblical roots. For example, Peter and John are sent to "[lay] their hands on" new believers and "[pray] for them, that they might receive the Holy Spirit" (Acts 8:15, 17, NRSV).

In the early church, new Christians, most of whom were adult converts, received baptism and confirmation as one ceremony. As more children were brought for baptism, the practice became for pastors and priests to baptize but for only bishops to "confirm" a baptism, or make it official, granting the baptized full membership in the church.

Later, confirmation became a rite by which adolescents, often following intensive Christian education, profess for themselves the faith into which they were baptized. Some denominations prefer the term "affirmation of baptism."

Confirmation serves as a milestone of faith, when young adults begin embracing a life of discipleship with a sense of purpose.

Donated items most helpful right now: Coffee, ketchup, mayonnaise or miracle whip, sugar, snacks, and laundry detergent.

The pantry is currently in need of the following items:

Canned Fruits: sliced peaches, mandarin oranges, pears, fruit cups, etc.

Canned Items: especially those with meat, such as beef stew, chili, chicken breast, chicken a la king, tuna, ham, Spam, spaghetti, ravioli, lasagna, etc.

Potatoes: instant mashed or scalloped, or other potato products




