

And the walls came a tumblin' down!

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Joshua fit the battle of Jericho, Jericho, Jericho. Joshua fit the battle of Jericho and the walls came a tumblin' down.

This peppy spiritual refers to the story of when the children of Israel entered the Promised Land and began to occupy it. The city of Jericho was one of the first cities that they came to. God told Joshua (Moses' successor) that God was giving them Jericho but they were not to just charge it. It was heavily fortified. Its walls were very strong. No, they were not just to charge in because then they would think that they had conquered it. Instead they were to follow God's instructions. For six days the warriors were to march around the city once. On the seventh day they were to march around seven times with the priests blowing the trumpets. When they finished, the priests were to give a long blast on the trumpet and all the people were to shout with a great noise. They did this, and the walls of the city fell down flat. Just like that!

On November 9<sup>th</sup> the world will commemorate the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall. After decades of separation between East and West Germany, this event signified newfound freedoms for the people of East Germany and a reversal from years of division between East and West Germany caused by the wall and an oppressive regime. This time the fall of the wall did not happen because of trumpets and shouts. (Those came afterward, as sounds of jubilation.) Once again, however, God was definitely involved. The lead up to the fall involved brave people engaged in prayer and carrying candles. You can read more about it farther down.

As we celebrate the Peaceful Revolution in Germany and its Lutheran roots, let us pray for and advocate on behalf of those divided and oppressed by other walls. Let us hold in prayer the people of Palestine, those on the U.S.-Mexico border, and all places where we build barriers, in our communities and in our hearts.

Some of us experience walls in our hearts and between members of our families. Some do not look forward to holiday dinners because they may encounter people with whom they feel very uncomfortable. Some fear that certain topics such as politics might be brought up, things about which people may hold strong opposing opinions. Some have been hurt by another person and find that the only way to survive an encounter is to emotionally hold that person at a distance.

Galatians 3:28 reminds us that in Christ all that separates and divides us no longer holds sway over us. All are made one in Christ. Experiencing oneness does not happen magically, nor should we necessarily just take a wrecking ball approach to whatever barriers we encounter. Some walls are needed temporarily for safety. It took time for the walls of Jericho to come down and they didn't come down because of a battering ram. It took time and lots of prayer, planning and discussion for the Berlin wall to fall. Yet, as each of us encounters our need for forgiveness and experiences God's gracious response, we may come to see whomever we wall out as a sibling, a fellow child of God, also beloved and forgiven, and God may help break down whatever divides us.

Let us join together in proclaiming the truth that we are one human family. Just as tens of thousands of people gathered in nonviolent protest in the streets of Leipzig, Germany, in the Peaceful Revolution of 1989, so, too, we are called in this moment to advocate for an end to division and oppression in our own families, our communities, our nation and throughout the world.

#### A MESSAGE FROM DEACON MARLANE DRUCKENMILLER

#### Greetings All,

Last Thursday and Friday I took some time to do volunteer work at the Lutheran World Relief warehouse in New Windsor, MD. I delivered 100 health kits and 28 quilts from EBMD

congregations. When I arrived they told me they were especially grateful for the health kits as a large shipment when out to disaster areas last week and



their supply is now very low. Cleanup Buckets are ready to be shipped, but the time to send them is not yet. At this moment the warehouse has a good supply of them. Pastor Bruce and Linda (a member of Zion, Perry) worked with me on Thursday. We prepared 73 cases of Personal Care Kits, School Kits, and Baby Kits for shipment which totaled 4,112 lbs. On Friday I worked with Melissa (who came with St. Luke, Reading folks). We completed 39 cases with a total of 2.252 lbs. The staff on Thursday were at the train station unloading a box car of donations and bringing them to the Warehouse for final processing. Volunteers are needed all the time to keep the cycle of donations, processing and shipment going and ready for the next disaster. I hope to return in Spring to do more work in the New Windsor warehouse.

#### A MUCH-NEEDED MESSAGE

National Bible Week, now observed every Thanksgiving week, got its start on a turbulent day. Founders of the National Bible Association were

reading Scripture over the NBC radio network on Sunday morning, December 7, 1941, when Pearl Harbor was attacked. Because of



the traumatic events, the network asked that the Bible-reading continue all day, in between news updates. Radio stations throughout America picked up the programming, allowing countless listeners to receive words from God—"who comforts you" (Isaiah 51:12)—when they needed it most.

#### OF CANDLES AND PRAYER The Beginning of the Peaceful Revolution Leipzig, East Germany, October 9, 1989

Mentioning *Leipzig* might lead you to believe that this article will be about J S Bach. It *was* in this city that the vast majority of his music was composed and first performed. Bach used the words "Dona nobis pacem," at the end of his Mass in B Minor. Perhaps he was inspired by the angel of peace that was above the altar in the Nikolaikirche.

In the early 1980s, over 30 years into the rule of communism in East Germany (GDR), the only place where people could discuss and reflect on the arms race and other issues was at meetings held within churches. Young people started attending prayer services. One youth group decided to make discussion of political issues and prayers for peace a regular Monday evening event at the Lutheran Nikolaikirche.

Eventually these prayer services were led by peace groups comprised of former "Bausoldaten" (people who rendered their compulsory military service by serving in special, unarmed units), environmental activists, and people interested in third world issues. Together they sought to stir the public's conscience and encourage action. Since these grass roots groups had different objectives it was not always easy to maintain a pastoral atmosphere. Still, by working together the participants were able to discover how the message of the Bible, especially the prophetic texts from the Old Testament and Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, was very pertinent to the issues they faced. Critics of the regime and Stasi personnel (State Security Police), Christians and non-Christians, gathered beneath the outspread arms of the crucified and resurrected Jesus Christ.

From May 8, 1989, the access roads to the Nicolaikirche were blocked by the police. Monday after Monday there were arrests or "temporary detentions" in connection with the peace prayers. Despite these ominous actions, the number of visitors flocking to the church continued to grow to a point where the 2,000 seats were no longer sufficient. Then came October 9<sup>th</sup>.

Two days earlier the country had observed the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the German Democratic Republic (GDR). That observation was far from peaceful. For 10 long hours uniformed police battered defenseless people who made no attempt to fight back. Hundreds of the protestors were locked up in the stables and an article was published in the press

saying that it was high time to put an end to "counter-revolution, if needs be by armed force." That is how things looked on the morning of October 9<sup>th</sup>.

Soldiers, industrial militia, police and plain-clothes officers made a show of force in Leipzig that day. 1,000 SED (Communist) party members were ordered to go to the Nicolaikirche. Apparently no one in authority had thought about the fact that by going to the church these persons would be exposed to the word, the gospel and its impact!

Despite what was meant to be an intimidating presence of political and military might, the prayers for peace took place in what is described as unbelievable calm and concentration. Shortly before the bishop gave his final blessing, the chief conductor of the Gewandhaus Orchestra and others appealed for non-violence. For the people of Leipzig, this solidarity between church, art, music and the gospel in such a threatening situation was important.

As the more than 2,000 persons came out of the church that night they were met by the sight of tens of thousands who were waiting outside in the Square, tens of thousands of people with candles in their hands. Why were the candles so significant? If you carry a candle, you need two hands in order to keep the candle from going out. You cannot hold a stone, or a club or a gun.

Some termed what happened next, or, more accurately, what did not happen, a miracle. Jesus' spirit of non-violence prevailed. The troops, industrial militia groups and police were drawn in and became engaged in conversations. They then withdrew. There were no victors or vanquished, no one triumphed over the other, no one lost face. Not one shop window was broken. There was just a tremendous feeling of relief.

The non-violent movement which spread across the country lasted only a few weeks, but it caused the party and ideological dictatorship to collapse. On November 9<sup>th</sup>, the Berlin Wall fell.

Shortly before his death a member of the Central committee of the GDR, Sindermann, said. "We had planned everything. We were prepared for everything. But not for candles and prayers."

"You will succeed, not by military might or by your own strength, but by my spirit, says the Lord." – Zechariah 4:6.



#### A MONTH OF THANKSGIVING

# I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly. – John 10:10b

Thankful people are happy people. It's not just a feel-good slogan on a refrigerator magnet or bumper sticker; it's proven science.

"Gratitude helps people feel more positive emotions, relish good experiences, improve their health, deal with adversity, and build strong relationships," reports Harvard Medical School's *Healthbeat*. That sounds like the abundant life Jesus describes in the gospels, doesn't it?

So why aren't Christians more thankful and happy? While we all sometimes face hardships that can avert our thankfulness, many of us simply take our blessings for granted. Perhaps we have succumbed to the lie we hear from 24/7 advertising – that we never *have* enough and never *are* enough.

Hopeful news from researchers is that thankfulness can be cultivated. Those who consistently *practice thankfulness* develop gratitude and happiness.

This November, the month of Thanksgiving, make thankfulness a daily spiritual practice. Here are some ideas for "A month of Thanksgiving":

- **Pray thanksgiving.** In your morning and evening prayers, thank God for your life and whatever specific blessings come to mind.
- Keep a thanks diary. Every day write down what you are thankful for and why. Challenge yourself to find and pray about 10 things daily.
- **Express thank you.** Go out of your way to express thanks to the people you encounter every day with a kind word or a note.
- **Create a thankfulness calendar.** Every morning write something on your calendar for which you are grateful to God, and think, pray and meditate on it until bedtime.

Practice thankfulness consistently and you might be surprised to find yourself enjoying the abundant life Jesus promises us.

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#### WE HONOR OUR VETERANS

On Veterans Day we honor men and women who have served and sacrificed in one of America's armed services. The holiday is also meant to highlight America's quest for world peace and our nation's desire for justice and freedom throughout the world our nation's higher goals.

Veterans Day is actually rooted in Armistice Day. On November 11, 1918, America and her allies met with

German leaders to sign a truce ending World War I. In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson decided that our nation should remember with gratitude the end of that war



and honor those who served in the military. He called the holiday, Armistice Day. Armistice means "truce."

In his proclamation the president wrote that Armistice Day was an "opportunity ... given to America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations.

The name Armistice Day was kept until 1954 when Congress changed the name to Veterans Day honoring veterans of every era. President Eisenhower called on all citizens to observe the day remembering the sacrifices of veterans and "the task of promoting an enduring peace."







#### Always Being Made New campaign concludes with a total impact of \$250 million.

Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA, has concluded after more than five years with a total impact of \$250 million, including \$195 million in cash gifts and gift commitments, as well as \$55 million for planned gifts to campaign ministries.

"The Campaign began in 2013 with a goal of nearly \$200 million," said the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, ELCA presiding bishop. "That was a big goal. But with God's help and our members' generous support, we made it. I thank God for what this church has done for the ELCA's ministries – here at home and around the world."

The campaign focused on areas that include growing this church's communities of faith, forming new leaders, welcoming neighbors, overcoming malaria, confronting hunger and poverty, and accompanying our global churches.

#### Renew Your Required Background Checks for Employees and Volunteers



At the end of 2014 new laws took effect that require all employees and volunteers working with children to receive background checks. Laws were amended in 2015 that changed the requirement from every three years to every five years and made some of the background checks free for volunteers.

*If you completed this process in 2015 it is time to think about renewal of these checks.* Our synod website has links and other information you can use to renew these clearances (<u>http://nepasynod.org/child-safety</u>).

The laws that came about in 2014 also put into place the new reality that our church volunteers now are mandated reporters if they become aware of or even suspect abuse or neglect toward a child. If your employees and/or volunteers have not been informed or trained in what this requires, now is as good a time as any to make that happen.

Finally, if your congregation does not already have a policy that outlines how children and youth will be kept safe in your church, you should be working on one. If your insurance carrier has not yet required you to do so, they probably will in the near future. Many insurance websites have resources, or you can browse the internet for "Safe Church Policies."
