O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good and his mercy endures forever.

-Psalm 118:1

Dear Fellow Members of God's Family,

When I was growing up, at the end of every Sunday dinner, my father would say, "Let us return thanks." We would bow our heads and say the words printed above: "O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good and his mercy endures forever." My father said, "Let us return thanks," but actually, it was *returning* to thanks, for we had said a thank you prayer before the meal, before we even got a taste.

Several weeks ago, we had the story of the 10 lepers whom Jesus healed. We heard how only one returned to say, "Thank you." We thought about how important it is to actually say those words because they acknowledge and build the relationship between the giver and the recipient. When we say "thank you," we acknowledge that what we have received is a gift, not something we deserved or earned.

That same Sunday I started the service by asking everyone to write down 10 things for which they were thankful since they woke up that morning. "Seriously?" "10 things?" "Just this morning?" "I can't think of 10 things!" But then someone called out, "Coffee!" and the wheels started to turn. Someone else said, "That I woke up!" and another, "That I stood up!" and the pencils started moving. A little humor always helps to get things going among our folks.

Later in the service people placed their pieces of paper in the offering basket, as a way of saying thank you to God. Now these notes – over 200 of them – are on display on one of our bulletin boards. Answers range from "coffee" (lots of those) to hamsters to having heat (it was a cool day) to clothes to wear to seeing friends at church. And they include "seeing the sun," "having a car," "food for breakfast," all things we often take for granted, but since I limited the choice to something that had been experienced that morning, folks focused in on these.

So, what would you add? For what would you thank God *today*? It's an important question because remembering to thank God, returning over and over to thank God, keeps us in relationship with God, keeps us in *proper* relationship with God, one that acknowledges that we neither deserve nor earn what God gives, and yet God blesses us.

Recognizing how much God gives us and regularly saying, "Thank you" builds the relationship of trust God desires us to have with God. When a child comes to trust a parent because its basic needs and more have been provided, then, when the tough times come, the child is likely to trust that it can depend on the parent to help it get through. It is the same way with God. As we continue to recognize and acknowledge how God blesses us, we come to trust God to be with us even when we can't see God, even when we don't seem to be getting an answer. It is important that we persevere, not just in asking for what we need, but also in giving thanks.

On Sunday, November 20, we will observe Stewardship Sunday and we will have the Congregational Meeting to vote on the proposed budget for 2023. We do this in November, not just because we need to plan a budget, but because it links stewardship with thanksgiving. Recognizing that all we have is a gift and therefore to be treasured, we seek to use what we have received in a way that pleases the giver, God. Pastor Joe Veres will be our guest preacher.

These are unsettling times. As individuals, a nation, a world and a congregation we face unsettling financial times. With inflation high and rumors of a coming recession and an ongoing war in Europe, it is tempting as individuals and a congregation to hold back more of our resources, rather than to give out of thanksgiving and with trust that God will provide what we need. Just like saying thank you to God before we even taste a bite of a meal, so we plan to give a healthy portion of what we receive, even before we receive it, trusting God will provide what we need. (Old Testament people called this giving "first fruits.") We also factor into our personal donations the fact that costs for the congregation and for those we support through our budget are rising, just as they are for us as individuals. As faithful stewards we as individuals are also not content with what we have always given. We update our plans for ways to support God's work among and through us.

Later in this newsletter you will find a hymn that may be new to us, "Have You Thanked the Lord." Enjoy it! You'll also find a translation of Psalm 118. May these offerings help us think about thanksgiving in new ways and help to nurture our attitude of gratitude.

And now I give thanks for each of you and celebrate that you are in my life.

BRANDYWINE



With the help of a Thrivent Grant our busy shoppers were able to obtain 156 items to donate to the Food Pantry last month. These were supplemented by additional items as well as fresh fruits and vegetables from our members. At present more than 30 family units and over 70 individuals are relying on the food bank for assistance.

Help, of course, is an ongoing need.

Donated items most helpful right now:

coffee (regular), instant coffee, fruit juices (all kinds), sugar, flour, cooking oil, evaporated milk, Spam, canned chicken and dumplings, beef stew, scalloped /other potato products, pasta and rice sides, Chef Boyardee-style canned foods, soups (ready- to-serve, vegetable beef, New England clam chowder), spaghetti sauce (plain and with meat), Hamburger and Tuna Helper, pancake mix and syrup, canned fruit, salad dressings, ketchup, mayonnaise, snacks of all kinds (including pretzels, chips, pudding, cookies, etc.)

Personal Care Items: toothbrushes, combs, brushes, deodorant, shampoo/conditioner

Cleaning and Disinfectant Products: including dish soap and laundry detergent.

COACH WOODEN'S FAVORITE MAXIMS

Pastor Gordon Gross, who is 90 years young, shared "Coach John Wooden's Favorite Maxims." Coach John Wooden (October 14, 1910 – June 4, 2010) was an American basketball coach, most famous for his 27 seasons at UCLA. His record there was 620 wins and 147 losses.

Here are Coach Wooden's Favorite Maxims:

- Happiness begins where selfishness ends.
- Discipline yourself and others won't need to.
- If I am through learning, I am through.
- Tell the truth. That way you won't have to remember a story.
- Don't let making a living prevent you from making a life.
- The best thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother.
- Do not permit what you cannot do to interfere with what you can do.
- Be slow to criticize and quick to commend.
- The time to make friends is before you need them.
- Treat all people with dignity and respect.
- Acquire peace of mind by making the effort to become the best of which you are capable.
- Make each day your masterpiece.
- Always remember that success is peace of mind obtained only through self-satisfaction in knowing you made the effort to do the best of which you're capable.

Pastor Gross commented: "These statements remind me of some of the numerous statements of wisdom contained in the biblical book of Proverbs. Here are a few that come to mind." There are others interspersed throughout this newsletter. See if you can spot them.

- "He who guards his mouth and his tongue, guards his soul from troubles." Proverbs 21:23
- "A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones." Proverbs 17:22
- "Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall." Proverbs 16:18

These are only a few. Proverbs is full of wise and pithy sayings. One that not many people remember reading or hearing is one of my favorites: "Getting involved in an argument that is none of your business is like going down the street and grabbing a dog by the ears". – Proverbs 26:17, *Good News Translation*

A BUDGET IS A STATEMENT OF FAITH

What does your church's annual budget represent? Is it a proud menu of the hopes, dreams and missionary ministries your congregation wants to accomplish in the year to come?

Or is it a life-support prescription for how the congregation expects to pay the staff, keep the lights burning, the staff paid, and property maintained? In a workshop when she was stewardship officer for the Episcopal Church, the late Terry Parsons gave this "Devil's Dictionary" definition of a church budget: "It is the means by which we notify the Lord of the limitations we intend to impose on his gifts for the coming year."

If we view the budget — and present it to our congregations —as an administrative necessity to ensure proper financial management, then we shouldn't be surprised to wind up with bare-bones measures that are grudgingly funded. If funded at all. But if we present the budget to our congregations as opportunities to invest in the Reign of God and stretch ourselves to see how much we can do with even the nickels and dimes God has given us, then the possibilities increase.

In the end, a budget is a statement about how a congregation views the future. Do your people trust that ours is the God of abundance who rewards faithful stewards and will stand behind servants who proclaim the Reign of God? If an outsider looked at your budget, what would he or she conclude about your congregation's faith?

And what would be a "God's Dictionary" definition of a church budget? How about, "It is the means by which we make the most of the abundance the Lord is giving us." Hmmm. That will look nice on the cover of the annual report.


