OF SEEDS AND CLOUDS

My dear Partners in Christ,

A few days ago, I had the privilege to drive through the side roads from New Jerusalem through the Oley Valley and back. When I came out of church the sky was a gorgeous blue with one huge bright white cloud high up in the sky. It was brilliant, but also a very unusual form: a tall rectangle with a straight side and a few odd shapes at its corners. It was so unusual I had to stop and really look at it. Clouds. Clouds can be fascinating.

As I drove through the hills and beautiful woods with tall trees and changing leaves, I was struck by the beauty that surrounds us. Then, when I drove through the valley, I noticed how some of the fields had been harvested, and others, corn and oats, were still waiting. Seeds surrounded me, seeds waiting to be harvested. Most will provide food: corn for many products for us and for livestock, and some oats will even appear on my breakfast table. But not all of the seeds will be used in the short term. Some will be stored to be planted next year. What beauty, what bounty surrounds us!

By the time of my return trip, the clouds had changed. There were a lot more of them, and they were elongated across the horizon, lower hanging, layered on top of one another in various shades of grey, but not threatening. They were more the kind of clouds that accompany the changes in temperature we are experiencing.

Clouds. A recent lesson from Exodus recounted how when God came down to meet the Children of Israel in the wilderness, the mountain God descended upon, Sinai (also known as Horeb) was covered in thick clouds. The clouds were there to protect the people from seeing God's *full* glory, for that glory would have been too much for them to bear. You may also recall that when Jesus was transfigured, the disciples glimpsed that he was changed, even radiant; but before God spoke to those gathered, a cloud descended upon them.

Clouds. They can be high and white and puffy and glorious. They can also be grey and obscure the sun.

Sometimes in life the present and the future seem bright and clear, and we feel a sense of freedom and vigor. Other times, however, it seems that the future and even the present is clouded-over and threatening storm clouds are on the horizon. Sometimes it seems that we are actually *in* a cloud, in a fog, scarcely able to see clearly enough to take the next step. For some among us, that's the reality of their lives at this moment.

I learned a new word today: caliginous. It means misty, dim, obscure. I'd add "cloudy." For this congregation the future and even the present can seem caliginous: misty, dim, obscure, cloudy. It can be disheartening, discouraging, and anxiety provoking *unless*, unless we remember that God's glory may be hidden in such "clouds." What God may be working in the present, in the time of many unknowns, may be like seeds sprouting underground, may be more wonderful than we can ever imagine.

When clouds cover our area, as much as we'd like to see blue skies and sun, we can't do anything about the clouds. We just have to wait, wait for the skies to clear and have confidence that the sun is there even when we can't see it. In the meantime, we can look around for the beauty and bounty still around us: those fields, literal and figurative, those fields full of seeds, some to feed us now, some to grow what we need for the future.

Just as our farmers are working hard, even in cloudy weather, to harvest the seeds in our fields and sort out what will be used in the future, be assured, members of New Jerusalem, that council members and others are hard at work sorting out and engaging in what we know at this time needs to be done to help open up the future. At the same time, we are trusting that even though what we know of our future is caliginous, somewhat obscure, God has not abandoned us. Just as the sun still rises every morning even if we cannot see it, God is saying, "I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

Do you like to do volunteer work? The Brandywine Food Pantry is also in need of volunteers who are willing to man the pantry when it's open to patrons (1 volunteer per day / 1 day per month). The pantry is open 5 times per month for a total of 18 hours. The pantry is also in desperate need of volunteers who would be willing to help stock shelves (usually on Mondays). Please contact Jill Shade, the Pantry Administrator if you would like more information about volunteering at the Brandywine Food Pantry.

The Brandywine Food Pantry is always in need of the following items:

Breakfast: cereal, oatmeal (regular and instant), pancake mix, pancake syrup

Canned items: (especially those with meat) Beef stew, chicken a la king, chicken breast, chili, ham, Spam, soups (all kinds), tuna

Meals (**meat/tuna needed**): Hamburger Helper, Tuna Helper, sloppy joe sauce

Microwave/Canned meals: Chef Boyardee meals (beefaroni, beef ravioli, lasagna, spaghetti)

Canned vegetables: beans (all kinds), carrots, tomatoes (diced and stewed)

Canned fruit: applesauce, fruit cup, mandarin oranges, sliced peaches, pears, pineapples, etc.

Condiments: ketchup, mayonnaise, mustard, pickles, salad dressing

Beverages: apple juice, grape juice, cranberry raspberry juice, coffee (regular), hot chocolate, tea, dry milk

Extras: jelly, marshmallow creme, peanut butter

Baking items: brownie mix, cake mixes (boxes), cooking oil, evaporated milk, flour, sugar

Snacks: cookies, crackers, snacks (individual packs)

Gluten free and/or sugar free items

Dry Goods: rice (preferably in boxes), noodles, pasta (all kinds), Ramen noodles, potatoes (mashed), potatoes (scalloped)

Paper products: paper towels, tissues, toilet tissue

WARS AND RUMORS OF WAR

Once again. Once again—or is it endlessly? Once again we hear of war, this time in Israel and Gaza: war threatening to spread quickly to other areas in the Middle East. And even as our attention is captured by the news from this area, war has not ceased in the Ukraine and major conflicts which can so easily spill into war continue in so many places we can scarcely name them all. Our nation struggles not only with how to govern itself, but how to respond to these crises.



Interconnected, Diverse, and Wild Creation

Have you ever worked on a crochet or knit project, and got to a point where your yarn ends up tied in a bird nest-looking mess? Or maybe you're one that works with a fishing line, and while re-spooling a reel you end up with a knot with loops and swoops that make you scratch your head and wonder, "Now what?"

I've noticed that when I experience the dilemma of a knotted skein, I feel frustration and anger. If I'm not in my clearest headspace, I will reactively pull one loop at a time, looking for one with any ability to move. "This one moves? Great!" I'll pull it in either direction until it stops. Still knotted? Find another! And again, and again. If I'm not careful I can end up tightening the knot even further, never to be unwound and destined for the scrap pile.

On my clearer days, I can take a jumbled mess of a knot and get it unwound and collected into a smaller ball of yarn without even needing to cut it from the rest! In Times like this, I have found, that the frustration and the anger are still present, yet in letting them pass while I pause, I create the opportunity to take care and intention in my untangling.

I wonder if God feels like that sometimes when, as the interconnected, diverse, and wild Creation that God so deeply loves, we get ourselves all knotted up through broken relationships, judgments, and ignorant acts. I wonder, does God reactively start pulling at us to take action? Does God accept our jumbled mess, allowing us to make different choices and seek right relationships that honor our connectedness? Does God enjoy the feeling of seeing us come together to co-create something new and beautiful?

May you know and trust that the One who has knit you together in the womb is the One who is eager and ready to create goodness and mercy in and through you this day and always. Blessings on your detangling.








Handicrafts can spark appreciation for simple items. Weave this basket as a gift.




What you need:

- Paper plate
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Yarn (different colors)

What you do:

- 1. In the center of the plate, trace something round. Draw 9 lines (evenly spaced) from the circle to the plate's edge.
- 2. Cut along each line, stopping at the center circle. Trim more of the plate off so the cuts make a gradual V shape.
- 3. Fold the plate's sides upward to form basket sides. Keep these upright as you weave a bowl-shaped basket.
- 4. Begin weaving a length of yarn at the circle's base. Hold the end of the yarn in place as you spread the length over and under each side of the plate.
- 5. Switch colors to make a pattern. Keep the yarn tight as you weave up the sides.
- 6. To finish, bend down any remaining paper. Leave a tail of yarn and tuck it under a woven portion. Share your craft with a friend!
