

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Psalm 46:1

These are the opening words of Psalm 46, the psalm appointed for Reformation Sunday. This was one of Luther's favorites, and, in fact, the one on which he based the hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is our God".

God is our refuge and our strength, a very present help in trouble. . . [even t]hough the waters rage and foam. . ."

What an appropriate psalm for this October!

As I write this, our brothers and sisters in the Carolinas and the Philippines are watching the waters rage and foam, the rivers swell and mud slides down their hills because the clouds have dumped unimaginable rain upon their land.

As I write this, we are also preparing for October 14 when we will observe Vocation Sunday, a time to thank God for and rededicate ourselves to the many tasks and settings to which God has called us. Vocations are not necessarily the same as, but can include, employment. This year we will be giving special thanks for first responders in and outside our community. We have invited those who are involved with fire companies, law enforcement, EMS and ambulance to join us in worship as we ask God to strengthen us for service. Please invite anyone you know.

God is our refuge and our strength. . . . Therefore we will not fear. . . .

It's hard to not be afraid when things – tasks, challenges, bad news, you name it – keep pouring down upon us. It's so easy to feel like we are drowning in responsibilities and anxiety. Yet the psalmist and Luther remind us, that God is our refuge and our strength.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth be moved, and though the mountains shake in the depths of the sea; though its waters rage and foam, and though . . . [t]he nations rage, and the kingdoms shake. . . . The Lord of hosts (the angel armies) is with us; the God of Jacob (our ancestors) is our stronghold.

The Lord, the commander, of "the angel armies" is with us. What a neat way to picture those who come to help when there is trouble, as members of the angel armies sent by God!

Psalm 46 continues with these words, "Come, . . . behold the one who makes war to cease in all the world; who breaks the bow and shatters the spear, and burns the shields with fire." It closes with: "Be still, then, and know that I am God" and reaffirms, "The Lord of hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge."

This month let us take time to not only thank God for the angels, human and divine, who come to help us. Let us not only rededicate our lives to be among those who help. Let us also take time to just be, to just be still, and feel the presence of the God of the angel armies, the Lord of hosts who is and promises to always be with us.



PLUMB LINE

In the writings of the prophets Isaiah and Amos, a plumb line is a symbol of God's judgment of Israel: "I will make justice the measuring line and righteousness the plumb line" (Isaiah 28:17, NIV); The Lord was standing by a wall that had been built true to plumb, with a plumb line in his hand. ... Then the Lord said, "Look, I am setting a plumb line among my people Israel; I will spare them no longer" (Amos 7:7-8, NIV). When Jesus is portrayed as Judge of the world, he is sometimes shown holding a plumb line.

YOU'VE GOT MAIL: THE LETTER TO THE HEBREWS

October worship includes four readings from the Letter to the Hebrews. It's not the easiest letter to read if you are not a first century Jew, but if you give it a try, you'll find many beautiful passages and important messages.

Written around 70 CE, Hebrews was written to second generation Christians, including Jews who believed Jesus is the Messiah. They were under pressure to renounce Jesus and return to more traditional Judaism. Understandably, the letter contains a lot of references to the Old Testament.

The letter stresses that belief in Jesus is not only in continuity with the Old Testament, but brings even better news. It starts, "Going through a long line of prophets, God has been addressing our ancestors in different ways for centuries." *1:1 The Message Bible*.

Wow! God speaks, using many different ways appropriate for the time and the audience.

What's "even better"? "Recently he (God) spoke directly to us through his Son. . . . This Son perfectly mirrors God, and is stamped with God's nature. He (Jesus) holds everything together by what he says. . . ." 1:2-3, The Message Bible. Not only that, the One who created everything is also the One who experienced human suffering and death in order to open the way of salvation for us. And, since Jesus is fully human, he understands our weaknesses, so we don't need to hide anything, but can confidently tell God what is going on and ask for mercy.

The letter uses illustrations from the lives of the patriarchs and the role of a high priest. One of my favorites refers back to Genesis 18:1-15, the story of Abraham and Sarah unknowingly welcoming God and angels disguised as humans, who had stopped by for a visit. Hebrews 13:1-2 says, "Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that, some have entertained angels without knowing it." *NRSV*.

If you get stuck trying to understand some of these illustrations in this letter, you are in good company. Ask for help.

God will continue to use a variety of ways, including ways that more closely fit our experiences, to help us learn, rejoice in and share the good news. Will you help me discover how to be a part of this? – *Pastor Ruth*

STEWARDSHIP OF OUR WORK LIFE

And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him. -- Colossians 3:17

The priesthood of all believers has been characterized as Martin Luther's most underappreciated theological insight. Simply put, Luther observed that God calls all Christians—not just pastors—to lives of holiness. Every one of us, not just priests, accomplishes God's holy work, regardless of what we do for work, whether employed or working at home.

It's a simple idea, and one that certainly elevates our "job" to a new status, but it can be hard to live out. Here are some tips:

Think *disciple*: You may know to be a disciple in church, but prayerfully imagine how you can be a follower of Jesus at work, too!

Think *excellence*: There's satisfaction in doing your best. Knowing that your work is holy can provide not only incentive but also a satisfaction boost.

Think *relationship*: They're not just your coworkers, they're also the neighbors whom Christ commands us to serve and to love as ourselves.

Think *service*: Every workplace holds challenges for your employer, coworkers and customers. How can your experience and gifts help?

Think *priest*: You are called to be a holy person 24/7. How does this awareness invite you to change your behavior and attitude toward your work?

We spend so much of our lives in our jobs, we can't park our faith at the door. Instead, we bring the light of Christ to the workplace as holy people of God's reign!



From our Property Committee hanging a new wooden cross, to our quilters creating beautiful heirlooms, to the work of the Basket Social event, to the children in our Child Development Center. And since we had such beautiful photographs, we also plan to make a 2019 church calendar and note cards, which can be sold at our Fall Apple Festival and Christmas Bazaar.

Camp Noah in Reading for Refugee Children from Puerto Rico



After the devastation in Puerto Rico from hurricane Maria, over 400 refugee families ended up in the Berks County area. Thanks to a generous grant from ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response, Lutheran Congregational Services was able to connect many of these families with agencies and churches who could provide help.

A group of Berks County churches, with generous financial support from the Reading Lutheran Parish, came together to host a Camp Noah during the week of August 13 at St. Luke, Reading. The churches also partnered with Centro Hispano, a nonprofit organization that serves the Latino community in Berks County.

The goal was to provide children from some of these families an opportunity to share their experiences with others who had lived through the same devastation, and then help the children to learn skills needed to move ahead with their lives. There were nearly 40 campers; over 40 in-person volunteers; and in-kind donations from over 50 congregations/ministries/benevolent organizations from Philadelphia to the Poconos.





Pr. Rebecca Knox reports: "A favorite moment was as I was driving a vanfull of campers home the first day and a child was reading a unique bilingual birthday card created for each camper by St. John's Lutheran, Hamburg. The camper said, "These

people do not even know me, why did they gave me a card?"

l replied, "Because they love you like

Jesus does." The camper replied, "Cool!" and showed the card to the camper sitting in the next seat... "Look what they made just for me!"

Julia Menzo of Liberty Lutheran recruited volunteers and charitable donors; and Luci Bower was the staff coordinator. Pr. Katie Lyon (Christ, Reading) was a key organizer and hopes to work with Liberty Lutheran and its congregations to offer a Camp Noah experience next summer for refugee families in the Philadelphia area.
